

LOYALTY PLEDGED TO ROOSEVELT AT BRISK RALLY HERE

Close to 300 persons last night attended the initial rally of the fall campaign in Democratic headquarters at 217 West Main street and heard four candidates pledge their undivided loyalty to President Roosevelt and his administration.

The meeting was one of the largest political gatherings held in Jackson county for a long time, attendance being present from all parts of the district as well as from Josephine county. Loyal sunflowers indicated that at least two of the audience were Republicans, voters of all parties having been invited to hear the candidates by J. H. Marshall, county chairman.

The meeting took on the aspects of a spirited rally through a bit of heckling during the address by E. W. Kirkpatrick, candidate for congress from millis district who conducted his primary campaign as an opponent of Townsendism.

Mr. Kirkpatrick charged his Republican protagonist, James W. Mott, with insincerity in espousing the Townsend cause, saying he spoke wholeheartedly for Townsendism in counties where the old-age pension movement was strong and shifted in favor of the McGroarty bill in sections where it was weak.

At the mention of Mr. Mott, a group of apparent Townsendites applauded and a little later Nelson Dunn, local advocate, arose to question Mr. Kirkpatrick and to expound the theories of the \$200-a-month plan. When the audience indicated its preference for Mr. Kirkpatrick's speech, Mr. Nelson sat down and the meeting continued without further interruption.

U. S. Burt, candidate for state treasurer and immediate past state president of the Young Democratic club, declared that Franklin D. Roosevelt was the first president ever to give young persons an opportunity to participate in conducting the affairs of the government.

"Today," Mr. Burt said, "the Democratic party is the liberal party, working for the benefit of all the people. It is pledged to aid the entire nation. It is pledged to bring to this country a real prosperity and prosperity is returning."

Mr. Burt emphasized the recovery that has been made, pointing to daily newspaper stories telling of business improvement. He singled out the Oregonian as an example of what he termed a Tory Republican daily which cannot escape publishing news of economic betterment.

"The front page of the Oregonian is filled with news of business improvement while the editorial page is filled with Republican propaganda that the country under Roosevelt is going to hell," Mr. Burt said.

"Evidently," he concluded, "the editor of the Oregonian does not read the front page of his own newspaper."

Mayor Willis Mahoney, of Klamath Falls, candidate for United States senator, reiterated that he is for the principles of the Townsend plan but asserted that the best way to accomplish old-age assistance was through the federal security act. He declared that any Townsend advocate who cannot support President Roosevelt should get out of the Townsend movement.

Alfred P. Dobson, candidate for state attorney general, described what he called irregularities of Attorney General J. H. Van Winkle's office and asserted that if elected he would conduct the office efficiently and honorably.

James Stevens, Medford baritone and candidate for the state assembly, added a novel touch to campaigning. Instead of giving a speech he sang two songs and many in the audience commented he was destined to sing his way into office.

Attorney Porter J. Neff presided and introduced the speakers. The candidates complimented Mr. Marshall on the size and enthusiasm of the meeting.

SPANISH LEADERS PREPARE TO FLEE PERILED CAPITAL

Worried by the fighting just across the Bay of Biscay, French gendarmes and mobile guards set up field telephones with direct communication to Paris.

Planes were held at Biarritz airport ready to protect French nationals in case of a recurrence of incidents similar to a rebel plane's bombardment of Biarritz Sunday.

BERLIN, Aug. 18. — (AP)—Germany is ready, it was announced officially today, not only to place an embargo on arms, airplanes and warships to Spain but to prevent volunteers from participating in the civil war.

The Hitler government, however, stipulated the fulfillment of two conditions before making effective the arms-airplane embargo suggested by France.

A German transport plane confiscated by the Madrid government must be released; "all states which possessed considerable industries for the manufacture of arms and airplanes, must likewise bind themselves, and in particular private persons and private firms, to come under the embargo."

GORE'S EVICTION SOUGHT BY BANK

The California Joint Stock and Land Bank of San Francisco today filed in Circuit court a motion for an order to show cause why a writ of assistance should not be issued, directing the sheriff to remove W. H. Gore and Sophronia Ish Gore from the farm property on the Jacksonville highway, upon which the bank holds a foreclosed mortgage.

The bank seeks "complete possession" of the property. Setting of the date for the hearing rests with the court. The present action is eviction proceedings.

The bank came into possession of the property upon foreclosure of a mortgage for approximately \$75,000 and leased the farm property to Thoren Bros., who have been cultivating the land this season, but permitted the Gores to occupy the house, attorneys for Gore said.

The property has been in the Gore family since pioneer days, and is regarded as one of the best farm properties in southern Oregon.

The land has been involved in civil litigation the past five years.

BRIDGE REHABILITATION RUSHED BY COUNTY AS WINTER DRAWING NEAR

The county bridge rehabilitation program of the county court is now in full swing, according to County Engineer Paul B. Rynning, and is being rushed to have the work completed before winter.

In the neighborhood of 40 bridges, out of a total of approximately 600 in the county, will be repaired and rebuilt.

Bridges in the Prospect, McLeod, and Elk creek district are undergoing repairs this week.

The bridges include all sizes, and are those most in need of repair. The spans for a number of years were not maintained, with the result all had to be fixed at the same time.

Bridges listed for repair the remainder of this season are located at Beaver Creek, Star Gulch, Thompson Creek and the Big Butte at Butte Falls. The Lake Creek bridge will be re-decked.

The county engineer's office is now concentrating on the bridge work. Road oiling has been completed for this year. Road work contemplated within the next month, includes the rock surfacing of the road between the two Table Rocks, and graveling the Evans Creek road in the Wimer Creek district.

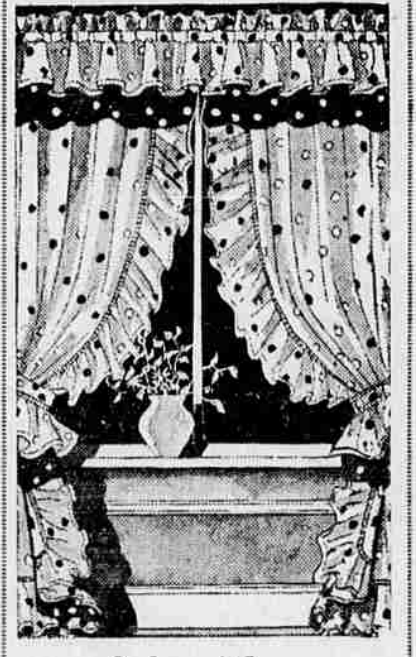
