Rebel forces had pushed to the very edge of the city. Fighting continued throughout the morning along the Iron-Ban Sebastian sector, but government supporters claimed they had recaptured virtually all vital spots permitting access to the city. Government forces, in hot engagements with fascist rebels, established a new line of defense about 100 miles southwest of Madrid. Navalmar de La Mata was reported in flames with rebels in headlong flight before victorious government troops.

ROME, Aug. 20.—Italy ordered 200,000 troops into war game maneuvers today as reliable informants declared Premier Mussolini was delaying demobilization of class of 1914 recruits because of the increasingly critical situation in Spain.

Troops of the Naples and Bari corps were ordered to Avellino for the maneuvers intended to demonstrate practicality of a motorized "war of movement"—the type Mussolini believes eventually will afflict Europe. It was asserted here.

Premier Mussolini, authoritative sources said, was determined to present a strong front against any possibility of socialist government triumph in the civil war, even if he must do it alone.

Nevertheless, a press ministry statement reiterated fascist statements of yesterday that an Italo-French agreement on the neutrality matter was "near." A spokesman, however, said he could give no details.

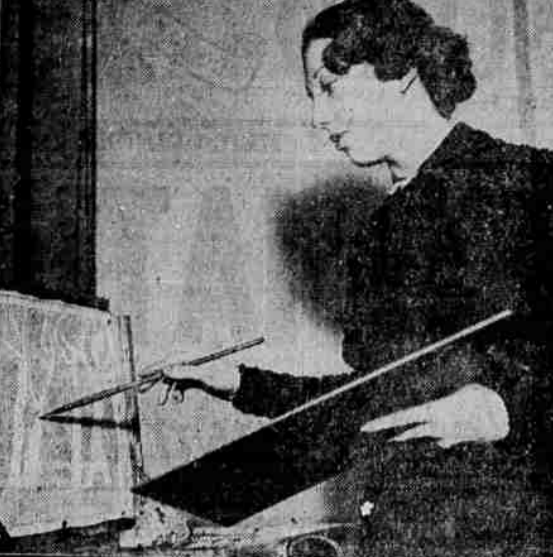
"The Douglas county relief committee will no longer certify able-bodied cases for public works until seasonal work lasts," the resolution adopted today.
