

WINTER FARES ON TRANSCONTINENTAL JOURNEY REDUCED

Winter transcontinental first class round trip fares, both eastbound and westbound between the principal midwest points and the Pacific coast and southwest on the same low basis as the summer excursion railroad fares, but with 30-day limit, will be placed in effect October 1 and stay in effect until May 1, 1937, the start of next year's summer tourist season, according to announcement today by P. S. McGinnis, vice-president in charge of Pacific passenger traffic for Southern Pacific.

Fares to and from far eastern points will be slightly higher than summer fares but will be greatly reduced as compared with previous winter fares.

This is the most radical reduction in transcontinental fares made in many years and is not only of great importance to westward travelers to go east but of immense value to western communities as the fares will undoubtedly greatly stimulate the tide of winter tourist travel this next season. Last year a straggling winter fare was taken when for a limited period westbound excursion fares were placed in effect transcontinent-

ally on the same basis as the summer fares but with only a 21-day limit. These fares were also put in effect eastbound for the holidays.

"Coach and tourist class round-trip fares slightly higher than the summer fares but with six months limit will also be available during the same period," McGinnis stated.

He also announced another drastic change in stating that the local 10-day limit coach and tourist round-trip fares on the Pacific lines of Southern Pacific will, after October 1, have a 30-day limit.

"There is a growing tendency to spread vacations over the entire year," McGinnis stated, "and we have been working toward a lower winter basis of fares for some time. We have been steadily bringing down the level of fares on our lines some time ago making the 21-day limit round trip first class summer excursion fares between all points on our lines good the year around. Our eastern connecting lines have joined with us now in providing this new basis of winter transcontinental fares and I regard the change of far reaching importance not only to the residents of communities along our lines as regards their own individual travel expenditures but also to the communities themselves because of the importance of the tourist industry to the west and southwest."

DROUGHT PROGRAM TO RUN FOR 25 YEARS IS TALKED BY COMMITTEE

CHADRON, Neb., Aug. 21.—(AP)—A 25-year drought program was contemplated today by members of the great plains drought committee as they shaped recommendations for a report to President Roosevelt.

Morris L. Cooke, rural electrification administrator and chairman of the group, told a meeting of farmers here last night an effective plan undoubtedly would require that much time.

Cooke and his associates indicated they were considering the recommendation of rigid land and water conservation, state land zone laws, a stable system of credit for great plains farmers, and feasible irrigation and reclamation projects.

Lewis C. Gray, head of the land utilization division of the resettlement administration and special consultant for the committee on its 8,000 mile trip through the drought area, said he did not believe there was a need for extensive shifting of farm families from the arid lands to other districts. He added:

"Nature itself already has thinned out the population in the bad sections."

Gray said there is need for a new credit system.

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CONFESSED KIDNAPER REVEALS POLICEMAN'S LINK WITH GANGSTERS

ST. PAUL, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Byron Bolton, confessed kidnaper, told a civil service board today that the Barker-Karpis gang earmarked \$25,000 of the William Hamm ransom money for Tom Brown, former chief of police. Brown remained silent while Bolton told his story.

Bolton's testimony was the first taken as the board convened to hear Brown's appeal from his discharge as a member of the St. Paul police department. Gus Barbus, safety commissioner, dismissed the former chief, changing he relayed police information to the gang in both the Hamm and the Edward G. Bremer kidnappings.

Bolton said the abduction was plotted in a cottage where Fred Goetz, alias "Shotgun George," since killed, informed the gang "I want to meet a man in the police department who will give me some information on their activities in the kidnaping."

OPEN HIGHWAY BIDS PORTLAND THURSDAY

SALEM, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The state highway commission will open bids for \$1,500,000 of highway and bridge construction work at its meeting in Portland next Thursday, R. H. Baldeck, state highway engineer, announced.

The largest job will involve 14.96 miles of surfacing and bituminous macadam wearing surface on the Redmond-Bend section of The Dalles-California highway in Deschutes county.

There will be the last jobs awarded under the federal highway aid program for 1935 and 1936, Baldeck stated. The new federal appropriation for states will become effective within the next few weeks, and will carry through the remainder of the year and 1937.
