LEEVER FUNERAL AT 2 P. M. SUNDAY SCIENCE CHURCH

Funeral services for Mayor William C. Leever of Central Point will be held at the Perl chapel here at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the Christian Science church being in charge. Burial will take place in the Central Point cemetery. The Masonic lodge will conduct a service at the graveside.

Mayor Leever died in Medford hospital Wednesday evening after an illness of several months. He was 78 years old.

Mr. Leever was born April 4, 1858, on a donation land claim two miles west of Central Point. His father, William T. Leever, had come to Oregon in 1853, settling near Seio in Linn county. Coming to southern Oregon in 1855, the father became identified with the educational interests of the valley.

William C. Leever was the eldest of ten children. His boyhood was spent in various parts of the Rogue River valley, where his father taught school. His elementary education was received in an old log schoolhouse just west of Central Point. Later he attended the Ashland academy.

After conducting a drug business in Washington for three years, Mr. Leever returned to Oregon in 1883 and became a supervisor on the construction of the Oregon & California railroad from Roseburg to Ashland.

Subsequently Mr. Leever opened a grain warehouse and lumber yard in Central Point. Later he sold his business to become a clerk in a hardware store. About 30 years ago he erected the building now occupied by the Leever hardware store and went into business for himself. He continued

Mr. Leever served on the board of trustees when Central Point was a town. On March 3, 1909, he was elected mayor of the incorporated city. He served as mayor until April 1, 1912. Subsequently he was elected county commissioner.

In 1920 Mr. Leever was again elected mayor of Central Point. He was progressive and civic-minded and many notable improvements were sponsored by him while he held public office. He was a director of the local bank and a prominent member of the Masonic lodge, Hiliash temple, and the Christian Science church.

Mr. Leever was married July 13, 1887, to Isabell Armstrong. Five children were born of the union, of whom two survive.

Mr. Leever is survived by his wife and two sons, Wayne H. of Seattle and

Earl C. of Ashland. He is survived also by three brothers and six sisters. They are Carl Leever, San Francisco; Tom Leever, Dixon, Calif.; Ed Leever, Port Klamath; Mrs. Lucinda Guy, Portland; Mrs. Elizabeth Meyer, Modesto, Calif.; Mrs. Winnie Hathaway, Visalia, Calif.; Mrs. Ida Bollinger, Santa Cruz, Calif.; Mrs. Ada Damon, John Day, and Mrs. Nellie Magee, Klamath Falls.
