

STATE CONTESTS RIVAL CAMPAIGN FOR PRESIDENCY

Personalities and Issues Clash in Gubernatorial Races - Effort Made by Parties to Link Drives

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—As so often in the past, the clashes of personalities and issues in the 34 gubernatorial contests this fall bid fair to rival the presidential campaign in many sections.
Candidates have been chosen in 21 states. In some others, such as New York, where renomination of Governor Herbert H. Lehman by the Democrats late next month is taken for granted, the actual selections will be but a formality.
Reports from across the country tell an almost uniform story of at-

tempts by the major parties to interlock their state campaigns with that for the presidency. Here and there questions like the Townsend old age pension plan are getting attention comparable to that given the records of the new deal and of the outgoing state administrations, but without hard and fast party lines being drawn.

War Chest Provided

With Democratic and Republican national finances being built up for the September-October drive, a substantial share of the cash is expected to be allotted to the larger states outside of the south which elect governors and have 149 of the 531 votes in the electoral college. These are New York, with 47 electors; Illinois, 29; Ohio, 26; Michigan, 19; Massachusetts, 17 and Iowa, 11.

Twenty-six of the state where gubernatorial terms expire now have Democratic administrations. Six are Republican, Minnesota is farmer-labor and Wisconsin is under the progressives. However the parties fare election day, a heavy turnover in the personnel of the executives already is certain. Twenty incumbents are not seeking reelection, because the state constitution limits the time one man may serve, or the governor aspires to the senate, or for other reasons.

Discord Threatened

To date, none of the 14 seeking another term has been denied renomination. A few had or have contests on their hands, threatening party

discord in the campaign itself. Both Dakotas are in this category.
Beginning with the selection of the Republican candidate in Utah this Saturday, primaries or state conventions will continue until Rhode Island has completed the list, probably in October. Other states which have yet to act are: Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Mexico (Democratic), New York, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin.

DRAMATIST MASTERS SPURRED BY PLAUDITS AT 'MORONI' PREMIERE

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., Aug. 21.—(AP)—The reception of his new play, "Moroni," spurred Edgar Lee Masters to work today on a new book, which he said would be "of biographical nature."
Masters, former Chicago lawyer turned poet and dramatist, was present last night at the world premiere of "Moroni," an epic drama based on the recorded life of Joseph Smith, founder of the Mormon faith.
The play follows the career of Smith, Vermont farm boy who soon after migrating to western New York a century ago, proclaimed a new faith. Its teachings, he said, were inspired in mysterious golden tablets buried on Cumorah hill near Palmyra, N. Y., in finding and translation of which he was guided by the angel Moroni.
A moving story told with understanding, humor and occasional flashes of almost contemporary satire, "Moroni" relates Smith's career from his translation of the golden plates, through the persecution that drove him and his followers to Ohio and Illinois.

WORDS OF DEAD READ AT FUNERAL

SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 21.—(AP)—The words of a dead man read at his own funeral told mourners, "This is a time for happiness."
"I am at this moment probably more alive than any of you here," wrote Dr. Carl Holliday, 57, former dean of the University of Toledo College of Arts and Sciences and head of the San Jose State college English department. The funeral oration, written before he was fatally injured in

an automobile accident a week ago was read at his services yesterday.
"It is the belief of some scientists that everything on earth is constantly throwing off minute particles of itself," he explained. "That, in my opinion, is exactly what I have done in death."
"A thinner, lighter duplicate of my body, less subject to the law of gravitation, with my soul as the magnet holding this lighter, thinner body together, has floated off into a lighter atmosphere."
