

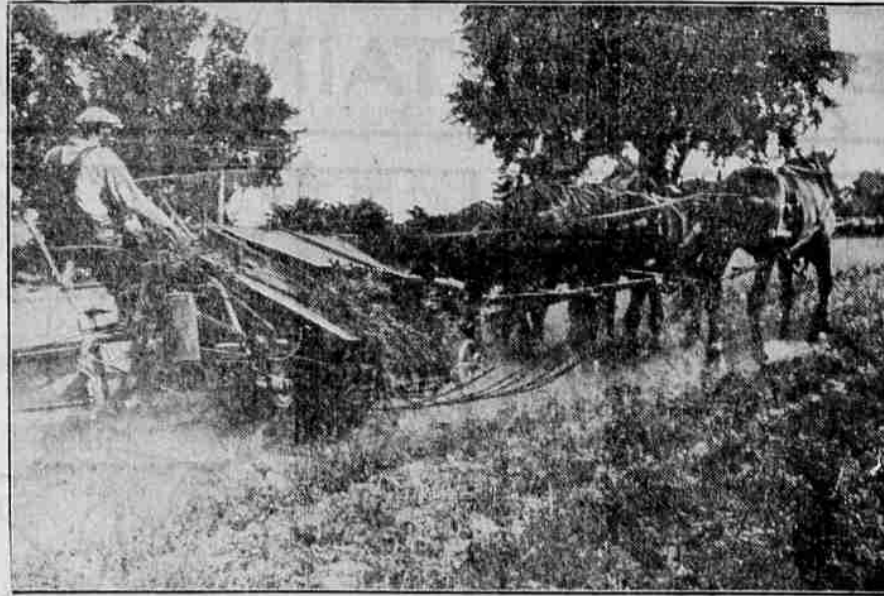
SALLY FORTH TO MEET REBELS

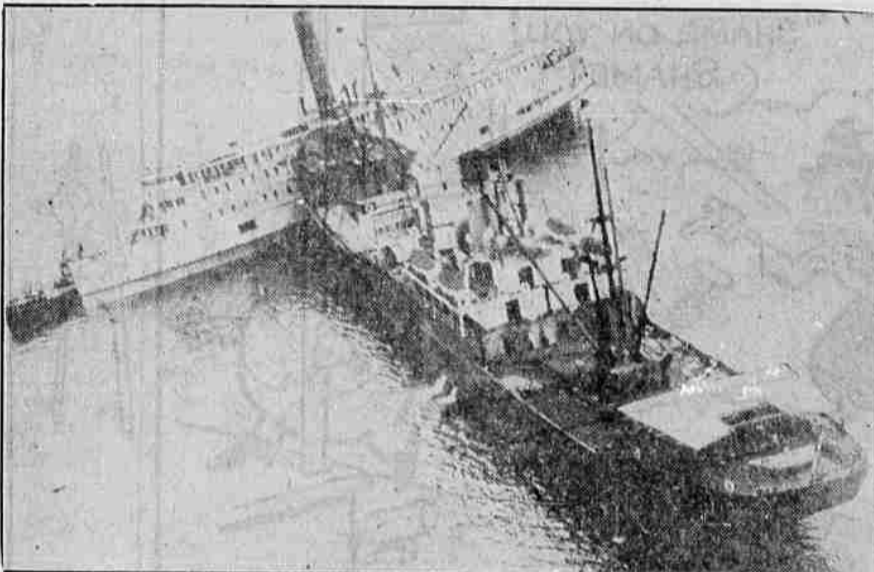

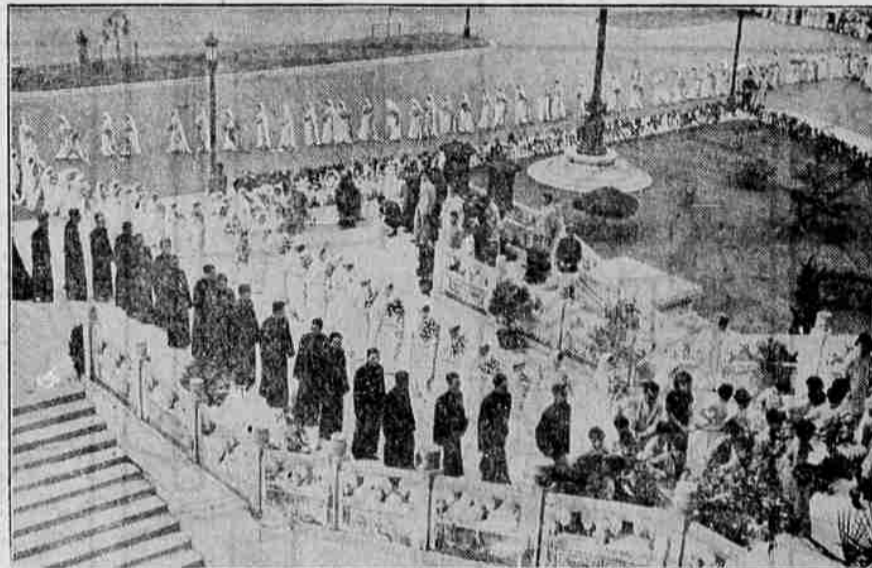
