

# Meanies Grace Extra-Torrid Mat Card Slated at Armory Tonight

## MONTGOMERY AND CHEROKEE INDIAN MEET IN TOP SPOT

The wrestling fan who can't find something on tonight's card to send the red corpuses bouncing about through his system is indeed hard to please, and should have his system checked for incipient anemic decay, according to Mack Lillard, promoter, who arranged one of the most hat-raising slug fests yet witnessed here. No less than four meanies, all of them with a wake of ruined ears and fingers behind them, grace the card.

Bob Montgomery of Alabama, who has apparently been snatched bald headed by irate opponents who cared not for his foul tactics, will meet Cherokee Ike, primitive Indian, in the main event. Montgomery has clawed, bit and slugged his way to four straight victories, and Cherokee Ike has clawed, bit and slugged his way through four straight matches, although he has his first win here to perform. He has announced he will climb to the win column tonight over the prostrate form of Montgomery. Montgomery has laid much the same plans, only his speculations have pictured the Indian playing the part of the door mat.

Fat O'Brien, with the kick of Irish whiskey in his big fists and a hate for other wrestlers such as a good Corkman has for the Duke of Buckingham, will square off against Joe Hubka, big blond footballer from the University of Nebraska, in the middle event. The Hibernian is hailed as one of the roughest of his trade, but Hubka has frequently displayed a marked taste for turning the tables on such gentry. Last week he almost beat the bullying Cherokee. He is dead by way of a reprimand for the Indian's slugging.

Johnny Soos, fresh from a trip to his home in Indiana, meets the Tulsa Blacksmith, George Craig, in the opener. The bow-legged little Soos stated this morning that he would "plant a couple of horseshoes on that blacksmith" right at the start, and finish him off with a few new holds that he picked up on his travels. Craig may have independent notions along this line, but Soos discounted them wholesale today.

Last week a big crowd of rabidly yelling fans saw three meanies on three bouts for the first time here, and they seemed to enjoy it. With four instead of three this week, enthusiasm seems due to be even greater. Advance ticket sales are the best in seven weeks, according to Lillard.

McMinnville and Tillamook, Portland No. 1 and Marshfield, Silverton and Eugene play tonight, with Salem No. 1 and Mount Angel, Milwaukie and Lebanon, Salem No. 2 and Astoria playing Tuesday, and Albany and Toledo, Portland No. 2 (1935 champions) and Dallas playing Wednesday night.

The quarter-finals will be played Thursday, the semi-finals Friday and the championship will be decided next Saturday.

## 1000 AMATEURS SEEK GOLF TITLE

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The United States amateur golf championship, left without an owner when Lawson Little decided to play for cash instead of cups, will be the objective of a record collection of more than 1000 players when the sectional qualifying rounds start on 30 sun-browned courses tomorrow.

The entry list, increasing annually, touched the new high mark of 1120 this year, but 30 of the 210 places in the tournament at the Garden City, N. Y., golf club Sept. 14 to 19 already have been allotted.

Exemptions awarded to eight former title-holders and 16 British invaders, including the ten members of the British Walker cup team, accounted for 24 places, while six qualified in California two weeks ago.

Rickert, a fast third baseman, who has been playing outfielder for Grants Pass, moved over to Medford and held down his familiar spot in the absence of Leever. He brought his brother-in-law, Flanagan, with him, and Stoddard filled the weak spot behind the plate.

Grants Pass failed to score until the seventh inning, when Medford already had six runs. The locals gathered four more in the eighth and then made a grandstand finish with a double play, Lewis to Hess to Smith. It was the second double of the game.

The first man up had fled out when Riebel got a Texas leaguer to center field for a single. Ostrum hit a hot grounder to Lewis, who scooped it to Hess for a force play against Riebel, and Hess threw Ostrum out by a wide margin at first.

Lanning, lanky right hander who worked the mound for the Cavemen, whiffed 10 men, but was touched for 15 hits. Tungate only fanned three.

The outstanding individual hitting record of the day went to Bob Smith, Medford first sacker, who clouted four for four and made three runs.
