LIQUOR STORE TO MOVE WEDNESDAY TO NEW BUILDING

The Oregon Liquor control commission store here, scheduled to transfer to new quarters in the Cooley-Neff building just being completed next to the Jackson hotel, will be moved Wednesday night. Manager Peter announced today. The store was to have been moved Sunday but the new space had not been completed. Manager Peter said the store will close at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening instead of 9, the usual closing hour. The transfer will be completed in one night, with trucks hauling the stock across the street from the present location in the Montgomery Ward building. The old location will be remodeled and occupied by the Ward company. The new store will offer 450 square feet more of floor space, and the storage and display bins will be larger. The room will be well lighted, with barred windows, and decorated in green. Two display cases, one at each end of the 30-foot counter, will be painted in contrasting orange, making the most up-to-date state liquor store. Every item listed on the state filing is held in stock at the Medford store. Peter said, giving Medford people as complete a stock as any store in the state. The manager said that sales in general have been climbing steadily since the store was first opened, and added that this year would see a substantial increase over last.

Funny Things Going on In Spain Says Uzcudun

Copyright, 1936, by Associated Press. PAMPLONA, Spain, Aug. 24.—Paulino Uzcudun, Basque heavy-weight fighter, trugged 50 miles through the woods and over mountains to "return from the dead" today. "Communists wanted to kill me," the fascist sympathizer said, "because I wore a clean shirt, and smoked good cigars." The word-chopper denounced as "communist propaganda" reports of his death given out by the people's front forces at San Sebastian. He said "funny looking people with guns" had been following him about for several weeks. "One night I had enough," he continued. "I hid into the woods with five communist riflemen tracking me. It took me four days without food and sleep to reach Pamplona." Paulino said he would accompany rebel troops in the advance on San Sebastian in an effort to see his aged mother who lives in a small town occupied by Spanish loyalists. "I won't do any fighting," he said. "I've had enough fighting to last me for the rest of my life—both in the ring and the civil war." Paulino, sitting on a cafe terrace surrounded by admiring rebel militia men, gave his opinion of the conflict thus: "Some funny things are going on in Spain. I think we'll hold the civil war championships for a long while."

'SUICIDE NOTE' IN PANTS NEAR DITCH TRACED BY POLICE

A crumpled note signed "Natalie," found in the pocket of a pair of white duck trousers lying on the bank of an irrigation ditch in the Talent district, today left state police puzzled as to whether the note was a hoax or whether it indicated the writer had really attempted to end her own life. The trousers were found yesterday morning by a farmer in the district. He discovered the note in the pocket and forwarded both to state police here. The contents of the note, written in a fairly large, round hand, indicated that the person who wrote it was either emotionally unstable or obviously attempting to "kid" someone. A search of the irrigation canal, which has running water in it although the water is neither deep nor swift, revealed no trace of a body. Police are still searching. The note: "Farewell cruel world. You have treated me wrong for the last time. Ah, I loved him so, but alas and alack, ah me, he wouldn't have me. Every time I proposed he said 'No. Ah, me, the irony of it all, Ah, but that is about over for me. I am going to end it all. Yes, by the time you read this it will be all over. Tell him I thought of him. I leave him everything. Ah, me—ah, my, thou cruel world. Oh why did this have to happen to me? Farewell, farewell." (Signed) "Natalie."

MONTREAL SALE OF FURS LURES MANY TRAPPERS

MONTREAL.—(UP) Although bathing suits and beachwear are holding the seasonal spotlight elsewhere in the world, furs are attracting attention here as this city prepares for its annual sale of pelts, a drama of trade during which nearly \$4,000,000 changes hands yearly. From the outlying districts of Quebec's great woods as well as from the dominion's 4500 fur farms, trappers are converging upon Montreal, the fur capital of the days of old, bearing with them fortunes in mink, ermine and silver fox. In St. Paul street here, where the time-weathered office of the first John Jacob Astor still stands, barter goes on much as it did in 1760 when the old French traders paddled up the St. Lawrence river in canoes. Still, standing, too, are the great chateaux built by William MacGillivray for his bride, the beautiful Magdeline, daughter of John MacDonald of Garth, and the monument erected to Simon McTavish, one of the great fur barons of the 18th century, by his nephews, William and Duncan MacGillivray. Many Americans visit Montreal to watch this drama of trade unfold. While the manner of selling has changed little since the days of the first Astors, the hazards to the trapper have been reduced with fur farms. Today, in the province of Quebec alone there are more than 2000 fur farms, which annually yield approximately 20,000 pelts, valued at more than \$800,000. Pelts of an average of 23,000 cultivated silver foxes yield fur farmers an annual income of \$1,200,000, while the frontier trappers yearly snare more than 250,000 animals, of which approximately 21,000 are the prized mink, alone valued at more than \$1,000,000.

TWO LOSE LIVES IN OUTMODERN AIRPLANE

PROSSER, Wash., Aug. 24.—(AP)—An old airplane which the owner cautioned them not to fly carried two young amateur aviators to their deaths near here Sunday in full view of the brother of one. The victims were Calvin Hodges, 20, a mechanic, and Jim Barber, 24, a pilot, with less than 10 hours' solo flying. Both were of Prosser. John Barber, a brother, saw the ship go into a tail spin from low altitude, and he was first to the wreckage to pull out the victims. Barber died shortly afterward. Hodges and his brothers were buying the plane from Cormack Thompson of Prosser. Thompson said he had advised against flying the old ship.
