Prizes will be awarded the winners at the first fall meeting of the Table Rock Community club, Miss Grace Lydiard, who has supervised the project, informed the Garden club committee.

Viewing the various frontages, which have brought a wealth of beauty to the Table Rock lane, extending from the Table Rock store, west from the E. W. Carlton orchard to the lower Table Rock, were Mrs. Milton Ottoman, Mrs. Winfield Bailey and Mrs. Ralph Woodford.

The committee members stated they were surprised to find how much improvement had been accomplished by the residents of the community since last year, when prizes were also offered for the most attractive frontages. The lane is now one of the most beautiful in the county, they stated, voicing regret that the main highways have not achieved such attractive borders.

Green lawn, perfectly kept, and bordered with summer chrysanthemums in shades of burnt orange mark the frontage of the Hensley place. Inside the yard dahlias in harmonizing colors complete the pleasing setting with canna forming a more remote background.

Petunias and shrubs in a particularly pleasing color arrangement and semicircular planting won first prize for the Chase mailbox setting.

MRS. ALICE NICHOLS TAKEN BY DEATH AT RESIDENCE OF NIECE

Mrs. Alice M. Nichols, a resident of Jackson county for the past 40 years, passed away at the home of her niece, Mrs. W. J. Hockmeyer, on Bucksport hill road at 11 p. m. Wednesday, August 26, at the age of 78.

Auntie Nichols, as she was known to hosts of friends, was born at Mendon, Ill., June 8, 1858, and when a young child moved with her parents to Missouri, where she grew to young womanhood and moved back to Illinois, where she resided until 1893 when she moved to eastern Oregon to make her home. Three years later, in 1896, she came to Medford to make her home with her sister, the late Emma McKeever.

Her only son, A. Glen Nichols, enlisted in the aerial division at the beginning of the world war and passed away serving his country. She is survived by four sisters: Mrs. S. K. Loughlin, Mrs. J. McDavid and Mrs. Sabre Dodson, all of Missouri, and Mrs. Arlie Taylor, Port Morgan, Colo. Also two nieces and two nephews: Beulah Fletcher, Montague, Calif.; Mrs. W. J. Hockmeyer, Medford; O. Emmett McKeever, Port Klamath, and L. C. McKeever, Hoquiam, Wash.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger chapel by the Rev. W. R. Baird at 2 p. m. Friday. The remains will be forwarded later in the evening to Portland for cremation.
