

IMPORTS IN JULY EXCEED EXPORTS BY HUGE MARGIN

Seasonal Decline in Incoming and Outgoing Goods Fails to Materialize—Factory Shipments Grow

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP) Reporting a contra-seasonal rise in imports during July, the commerce department said today that imports exceeded exports by \$15,085,000 last month.

Exports for the month were listed at \$178,324,000 compared with \$184,909,000 in June and \$173,230,000 in July, 1935.

With imports for the last month placed at \$193,409,000, an increase was shown over both the previous month and the same month a year ago, when the drop in export trade under June was listed at 4 per cent, with imports increasing 2 per cent.

As a general rule, the department said, both exports and imports show a small seasonal decline in July.

Increase in exports over July, 1935, was attributed chiefly to larger shipments of finished and semi-manufactured articles, including machinery, electrical apparatus, aircraft, iron and steel manufactures, wood and paper.

The increase of exports of packing house products marked a reversal of the six months trend, these shipments having declined during the first half of the year.

Increase in imports were said to be distributed among a range of commodities, with upturns in fur, whiskey and spirits, cotton and wool manufactures, wood pulp and paper and nickel and tin among the most important.

Gold exports were reported at \$60,000 compared with \$77,000 in June and \$59,000 in July, 1935, while gold imports totaled \$16,074,000, \$277,851,000 and \$18,287,000 respectively.

Silver exports were listed at \$138,000 last month, \$197,000 in June and \$1,847,000 in July, 1935, while silver imports were at \$2,250,000, \$4,574,000, \$23,281,000 and \$30,230,000.

For the first seven months of this year, the department listed exports at \$1,232,471,000 and imports at \$1,356,552,000, an excess of imports totaling \$24,081,000.

For the same period last year, a \$245,000 excess of exports was shown, exports being listed at \$1,197,340,000, and imports at \$1,171,097,000.

DATA REQUESTED ON MINERALS IN JACKSON COUNTY

Every miner in Jackson county was requested today to fill out a questionnaire obtainable at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

The request was issued by A. H. Banwell, secretary of the Jackson county planning commission, who explained that the questionnaires will form the basis of mineral surveys to be conducted in the state with the aim of providing for development.

The surveys are to be made by geologists on the staff of Col. Thomas M. Robbins, army engineer for the north Pacific division.

"If your commission would be of assistance in the survey it is of the utmost importance that you secure the largest possible returns from the mining questionnaires now being distributed in the county," it was stated in a letter to Mr. Banwell from the state planning board.

"From the questionnaires returned, Col. Robbins is expected to select those areas in the state which appear to offer the largest possibilities for development."

"Inasmuch as the future development of its mineral resources will mean real financial returns to Jackson county, it is hoped that the planning commission will see to it that these questionnaires cover every known mineral deposit of any importance in the county."
