

PEARS FOR TOURISTS
ABBAY'S GESTURE TO
BUILD UP GOOD WILL

A novel plan for spreading good-will and advertising the Rogue River valley is being carried out successfully by Walter Abbey, Inc., automobile distributor, 123 South Riverside avenue.

For some time the Abbey firm has been giving a gunny sack of Medford Bartlett pears to all tourists who call at its sales office or service station. Each motorist is told that the pears are grown here and that the gift is a memento of the valley.

"You'd be surprised how gratified the motorists are to get the pears," Mr. Abbey said. "The gift is accepted for what it is meant to be—a small token of hospitality."

News of the gift pears is spreading up and down the coast. Mr. Abbey said. The other day a motorist called at the Abbey sales office and said he had been told about the pears by a fellow tourist he had met 150 miles north of here, Mr. Abbey related.

Already the Abbey firm has distributed two tons of Bartlett and today another half ton was ordered. The company plans to continue the gift policy for the remainder of the season.

Mr. Abbey suggested that a great deal of good-will advertising could be accomplished by giving a small box of Medford pears with the compliments of the city to every motorist who registers at the AAA office here.

Stimulated by generally favorable business and industrial news, steels, rails, motors and specialties were the star performers. There was late profit taking but this was absorbed in the majority of cases without much difficulty. The close was strong. Transfers approximated 1,350,000 shares.

LANDON DECLARES CHILDREN FACING HERITAGE OF DEBT

"This is the most cockeyed piece of legislation ever imposed in a modern country, and if I am elected I shall recommend the immediate repeal of this vicious method of taxation."

After an overnight ride from the western New York metropolis the presidential aspirant returned to the rear platform of his special train to greet townsfolk at Joliet, Dwight, Pontiac, Bloomington and Lincoln, Ill., before reaching Springfield for a 40-minute halt to place a wreath on Lincoln's tomb.

"We are living in a fool's paradise—far beyond our income," he told his Buffalo audience, arrayed in a semi-circular grandstand and on chairs blanketing the baseball diamond.

Landon said that "hidden taxes," which he described as taxes on "such things as food, clothing, gasoline and cigarettes," now supply 81 cents of every dollar collected by the government as compared with 41 cents in 1932.

CONTINUE PROBE
IN RIND HURLING

Investigation by the state police into the watermelon throwing episode on the Pacific highway, in which Mrs. Joe M. Marsh of this city was injured, continues, it was announced. Lloyd Bonge and Lloyd Seagraves, sentenced to 30 days in the county jail for disorderly conduct, and Gilbert S. Dickinson, serving 10 days on an auto regulation charge, all of Plainview, Neb., are still under investigation. The trio deny any part in the incident.

"The investigation, insofar as it concerns these three Nebraska youths, is still in progress, and has not been completed," District Attorney George A. Coddling said this morning. He declined to amplify his statement. The authorities admitted a thorough investigation was under way, and that all youths with a known proclivity for throwing objects at moving autos were being questioned. The favorite ammunition seems to be water, but autoists have complained that they have been targeted for pears and in some instances rocks. The aim was bad in each instance.
