## LOCALS PRIMED TO AVENGE WHIPPING GIVEN BY LOGGERS

Coquille will have much the same advantage over the home team, with Billy Calvert doing the catching for them. Calvert was with the Medford club the first of the year, and knows pretty well what kind of curves and hops will make them miss.

Cap Stoddard, who caught for Medford against Grants Pass, will take the same duties Sunday. He and Tunge, ace Medford hurler, worked together for several years and Stoddard is given much of the credit for the remarkable pitching turned in by Tunge in the last game. Either Tunge or Erickson will start for Medford.

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## FAMILY SQUABBLE LOOMS AS ATHLETES NEAR HOME

ABOARD S. S. PRESIDENT ROOS EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The main squad of 339 American Olympic athletes, officials and coaches has decided to pass up New York's invitation to stay over a week after its arrival tonight for a civic reception.

But there's no indication they will pass up the opening for a big family scrap some time during the winter.

It was pointed out, however, that many athletes are obliged to leave immediately for their schools or work and as a substitute it was suggested the possibility of a reception on the dock before the team disembarks tomorrow.

Meantime the outspoken comments of several critics have pointed definitely to an internal battle in the Olympic organization. It's almost certain the Eleanor Holm Jarrett case and the dropping of two Jewish sprinters, Sam Stoller and Marty Glickman, from the 400-meter relay team, will be thrashed out among the officials.

Likewise the intermittent warfare between college leaders and A. A. U. officials for control of the Olympic organization likely will be renewed.

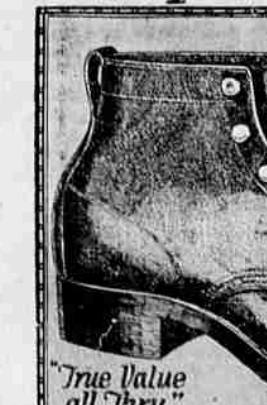
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## RIORDAN AND LIESY ON WHITMAN COACH STAFF
