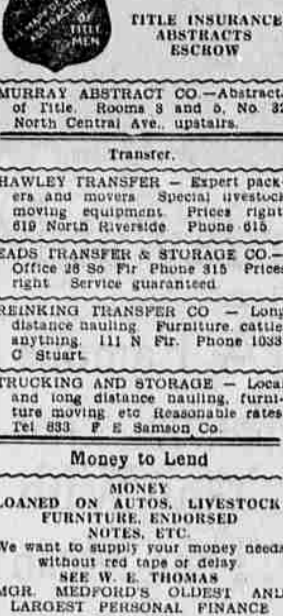

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FOREST SERVICE OUTLINES NOVEL TRIPS BY MOTOR

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest:

"Fishing is poor in most parts of the forest. Rocky Point continues to be good; Lake of the Woods is fair; Four Mile lake is yielding good catches of alibates by still fishing with worms and of rainbow by trolling.

"Good catches of native trout are being made in Rogue river above Brown's cabin and large rainbow and eastern brook are rising to rise in Rogue river between Union Creek and Woodruff Meadows bridge. Diamond lake and the North Umquam are fair. Spinner fishing in the Middle lake of the Seven Lakes Basin is very good. The upper middle fork of Rogue river is good; South Fork is poor.

"Huckleberries at Huckleberry mountain average about three gallons a day. There are about 450 persons picking berries in the region. In the vicinity of Huckleberry gap and Huckleberry lake on the Umquam divide, the berry patches are scattered, requiring considerable hunting for them. Residents there are averaging two gallons a day.

"For those interested in unusual drives into the forest, a trip to the Blue Rock lookout is suggested. This lookout point is about 20 miles from Butte Falls over a good mountain road. Directions for reaching it are: Follow signs to the South Fork of Rogue River CCC camp, then signs directing to Parker Meadows and Lodgepole, then about three miles up turn to right at a sign which directs you to Blue Rock. This lookout house is on a 40 foot tower which gives a good view of the Blue Canyon country. One may drive directly to the tower and the lookout man will be glad to receive visitors.

"The last four miles of the road are quite steep and a caution of water should be carried in case it is needed for the radiator; no other trouble should be encountered as the road is sufficiently wide. The slick leaf brush fields along this road were caused by a large forest fire which burned the timber years ago. Interesting hikes may be made into Blue Canyon from this lookout and some grounds at Moses bridge and Carberry may be enjoyed.

"Another trip of interest which is over less mountainous roads is to follow the main Applegate road past Star ranger station and Copper to Carberry, and from there down Thompson creek to the Applegate store and thence back to Medford. Swimming conditions on the Applegate are attractive and the new campground at Moses bridge and Carberry may be enjoyed.

"One of the rangers points out that most of the fire in his district have been started by boys between the ages of 14 and 18; so this week we are making a special appeal to boys to be careful with fire. If you take your family into the forest, please be sure that they obey the laws.
