

OUTLAY FOR YEAR BY ROGUE FOREST TOTALS \$566,345

Largest Single Expenditure, \$196,324, Invested in Fire Breaks, Hazard Reduction—\$62,837 in Equipment

A total of \$566,344.89 was expended during the fiscal year ended June 30 by the Rogue River national forest service, a summary report today showed.

Largest single expenditure, \$196,324.55, went for construction of fire breaks and hazard reduction work. Second largest item of expense, \$78,917.52, was for construction of buildings and telephone lines. This includes erection of guard and ranger stations and dwellings. The forest has a rather extensive telephone system of its own for fire control and other business.

Equipment during the year cost \$62,837.27 while tools and supplies in stock cost \$33,880.07. Another large item of expense was the construction of roads and trails, the cost being \$50,187.01.

Fire control cost \$50,293.42. This includes the expense of pre-suppression and prevention, preparation for fires, suppression, patrols and fire-fighting tools.

Maintenance of roads, trails, buildings and other improvements cost \$47,437.22. Other expenditures included:

Administration of timber and Christmas tree sales, \$1,430.01; administration of grazing, \$4,543.37; administration of fish and game, \$1,953.81; administration of special use (summer home permits, resort permits, etc.), \$1,519.12; administration of recreation activities, \$4,389.42; land acquisition and exchange, \$5,867.70.

Also reforestation, \$1,296.42; surveys and maps, \$642,271; insect control, \$119,411; cooperation with other agencies, \$11,534.84; and other investments, \$4,370.06.

SALES OF MOTORCARS IN NORTHWEST STATES SET NEW HIGH RECORD

A sharp upswing in Pacific northwest automobile sales, which soared to a new all-time high for the first seven months of 1936, was reported today by Motor List Headquarters, automobile statistical company.

Twenty-three thousand more automobiles were sold in Washington and Oregon over the period from January to August of this year than in the same period a year ago.

Sales in the two states totaled 60,597 new automobiles compared with 38,562 for the first seven months of 1935 and the all time record of 49,562 sales recorded in 1929.

The rise in automobile sales was accompanied by an increase in Washington and Oregon gasoline sales which rose from 45,803,585 gallons in May to 54,339,145 gallons in June, the latest figures available.

Oregon sales were 25,775 compared with 18,297 sales made in the period between January and August of last year.

British Radical Is Denied Entry
WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Secretary Hull today declined to reconsider the state department's action in declining to permit William Gallacher, communist member of the British parliament, to enter this country because of his political belief.

Answering a protest by the American Civil Liberties union, the secretary said Gallacher was well known as a member of the executive committee of the communist international and that "his position in the international communist revolutionary movement brings him within the excluding provisions" of the immigration law.

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LEGION OFFICERS WILL TAKE CHAIRS ON SEPTEMBER 8

Plans for the annual installation of officers were perfected at the last meeting of Medford post No. 15 of the American Legion, held at the K. P. hall Tuesday night. The affair will be a joint installation of the Legion and Auxiliary, on Tuesday, September 8, and will be followed by dancing and supper. All Legionnaires are urged to reserve the date and to be present. Plans for the annual observance of Armistice day also were outlined and Cass Wymore was appointed chairman of the celebration program which is expected to eclipse any similar event held here for many years past.

Joe Filegel was called upon for a report of the recent state convention and gave a comprehensive review of the many accomplishments of the state and national organizations. Quoting from the address of National Commander Ray Murphy at Roseburg, Filegel stated that, among other things, the American Legion had immunized over one million school children against disease during the past year, had sponsored 32,000 Boy Scout troops, one-ninth of the entire enrollment; had sponsored "Sons of Legion" organizations totaling over 60,000; had provided junior league baseball activities for over 500,000 boys and had made over 7,000 merit awards in public schools. In addition the Legion has played a most important part in the community life of the nation and has waged vigorously against the over-growing menace of communism and fascism which is sweeping Europe today. Commander Murphy stated that the American Legion, contrary to general belief, is not a militaristic organization but a pacifist order, believing in adequate national defense as a means of avoiding war.

Filegel reported that Medford made a fine showing at the convention, Lee Garlock being elected delegate to the national convention and grand chief de gare of the state 40 at 8 organization. Cass Wymore and H. O. Bromley also were named as state officers of the 40 at 8, and Medford's 40 at 8 train was awarded a silver trophy as the best entry of its kind in the convention parade.

Cass Wymore reported on the trip to the veterans' hospital, which was made by local Legionnaires and auxiliary members, and complimented the institution highly both as to personnel and modern facilities. The 40 at 8 train of Medford made frequent trips to the hospital during the convention, bringing disabled veterans in to Roseburg for the various activities.

Commander Holmes reported on the Boy Scout troop sponsored by Medford post, stating that the troop had doubled in membership during the past year and had made a fine showing in interest at the regular meetings, an average attendance of 80 percent being registered. The Legion troop also had the largest attendance at the recent Boy Scout summer camp, said Holmes.

Walter Looker of Portland was a visitor at Tuesday's meeting and told his former comrades many interesting things of Legion and Boy Scout happenings in the state metropolis.

R. P. Quarles of Santa Cruz post No. 84 was also a visitor at a session.

An interesting entertainment program was provided by Carol I. Hays, manager of the Associated Oil company, who displayed sound pictures of the Golden Gate bridge. The films reviewed the building of the huge structure and recounted many interesting phases of the construction problems encountered.

Because of an authorized increase in the United States navy personnel, larger enlistment quotas for the southern Oregon district are expected to receive approval, it was stated today by Ernest M. West, recruiting officer here.

The largest monthly quota during the past year was four recruits and sometime the quota was held to three, Mr. West recalled. Because of the expected increase in the quotas, Mr. West is now receiving applications for enlistment at his office on the second floor of the Medford post-office building. The Medford list of applicants is now depleted, he stated.

To qualify for enlistment applicants must be between 17 and 25 years of age, of good character and reputation and capable of passing mental and physical examinations, Mr. West said.

INCREASED NAVAL QUOTAS EXPECTED

CANADIANS FOR F. D. ROOSEVELT AS PUBLIC CHAMPION, DRY LEADER ASSERTS

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Canadians are for President Roosevelt, declared Alfred L. Marks, barrister and temperance leader of Edmonton, Alberta, in an interview here today.

"Not as an outgrowth of the Canadian-American reciprocal trade treaty, but because we feel that Roosevelt is the spearhead of the rights of the people of the whole world against the vested interests," Marks said.

Marks has spent the past three weeks on this side of the border visiting editors and sounding out political opinion.

Summing up his remarks on the political situation in his own country, he said concerning Premier Aberhart, "I think he is headed for the ashcan."

"Canadians are still having a depression and it's growing worse instead of better. It's fine coming to a country that can talk of the depression in the past tense," Marks declared.

Ship First Hops From G. P. Yards

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The first carload of hops out of Grants Pass this season of the 1936 picking has been shipped. Hops are of a high grade this year, but the yield is falling short of the estimated crop, growers announce.

One grower, who also operates a 27-acre blackberry patch, said his third berry crop could not be harvested because all his pickers were needed for the hop crop.
