Under the critical eyes of head Coach Bernie Bierman, of Minnesota, and his assistants, Elmer Layden, of Notre Dame, Bob McMillin, of Indiana, and Lynn Waldorf, of Northwestern, the collegians will go through everything in their offensive and defensive repertoire. A light limbering up drill Monday will be the only activity in the all-star camp until Tuesday night.

The all-stars will take the field as decreed by the fans. It was decided that instead of permitting the coaching staff to pick a starting lineup, the 11 men, leaders at their positions in the voting, should get the first crack at the professional champions.

## YANKEE ATHLETES BACK HOME WITH OLYMPIC HONORS

New York Provides Treat—Lady Diver To Enter Films, Blasts Committee.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Back home and broke with plenty to say about it all, more than 100 of Uncle Sam's Olympians stayed over in New York tonight to have a good time at the town's expense.

Free board, room and elaborate entertainment were afforded the athletes who somewhat toned down their bias against the Olympic committee heads as they enjoyed themselves.

The homecomers, quartered in 21 hotels over the city at no personal expense, generally summed up their situation with:

"Those of us who didn't have a good time in Germany are going to catch up over here."

The only news of the day was furnished by Mrs. Dorothy Poynon Hill, of Los Angeles, Olympic three-meter springboard diving champion, who announced she would turn professional.

Mrs. Hill said she would leave for Hollywood at once for a movie test and then go back to Europe, probably next month, for a series of exhibitions.

"I'm through as an amateur," she said. "Three Olympic games are enough for me. Yes, thank you, I had a perfectly punk time on the Olympic trip. I was glad to get home. The Olympic committee didn't do a thing for us except to take us over and back."

Miss Dee Beckmann, coach of the women's track and field team, said the relay team of Helen Stephens, Harriet Bland, Betty Robinson and Annette Rogers would compete in a meet at Toronto, Canada, September 5, 6, 7 and that Miss Stephens would give an exhibition at Washington, D.C., on September 12.

Olympic officials who returned on the S.S. Roosevelt last night made Detroit's colored team of Negro pool players, who were scattered all over the city, feel that they were glad it was all over—but the shouting.

Bob Montgomery, ace meanie of this sector of the wrestling map, was still industriously peddling a bicycle about the valley yesterday, getting in trim for his main event appearance Monday night against the bullying cowboy, Dude Chick. Apparently adopting the policy of "forewarned-is-forearmed," Montgomery is taking no chances of facing the airplane spin of Chick's unless his biceps and other muscles are in condition.

The meanie said yesterday that he had no intention of abandoning his usual whirlwind attack despite the formidable reputation of his opponent. "Chick has been knocking 'em over up here, ah?" he said. "Oke. But he hasn't met me yet, and I'm going to give him a licking if I can. He might beat me, but I'll be the most surprised guy there if he does. 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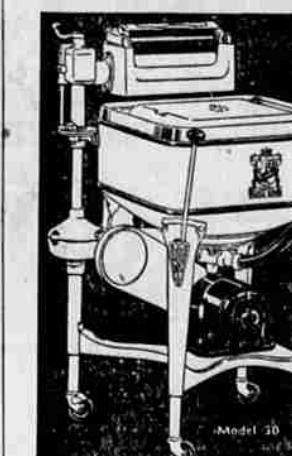
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
