

Meanie Montgomery Faces Chick's Paralyzing Lariat Spin Tonight

RUFFIAN UNAWED BY CHICK'S REPUTE AS MEANIE TAMER

Hubka-Craig Encounter in Middle Bracket Promises Only Orthodox Match on Armory Mat Bill Tonight

Wrestling fans with sensitive nerves, weak hearts, or chair throwing proclivities when they get excited will be better off if they remain away from the Armory tonight, with two blood-curdling rough matches and only one clean one on the bill. Bob Montgomery's five week string of victories will receive the hydrochloric test in the main event roughhouse against Dude Chick, and Johnny Soos will attempt to hammer down the sail-like arms of Pat O'Brien in the mad cap opener.

The clean match, or at least the only one that promises to be clean, will be the middle event between George Craig, the Tulsa Blacksmith and Joe Hubka, big football ace from Nebraska.

Ruffian Unawed
Montgomery, after a week of training on road work, today announced himself ready for Chick. He has received ample warning as to what he may expect from the big ex-cow-puncher, and declared that the lariat spin that has accounted for an impressive list of men's victims holds no terrors for him. He stated that his own attack will allow Chick no time to get set for anything but defensive gestures.

Chick, one of the few men in the world who holds a victory over Alvin Britz since Britz became a junior heavyweight champion, arrived yesterday but gave out no information on what plans he intends pursuing. "If Montgomery wants to get rough I guess we can accommodate him," was the most he said.

The clean Hubka-Craig battle promises to be one of the best in several months, with both men having good reputations in their mat work. Craig will depend largely upon his anvil flip, he said, while Hubka will probably use flying tackles and his new somewhat bottoms-up scissors. The hours will be a desperate one for both grapplers, with each shooting for a main event appearance against Chick next week. The winner of tonight's scramble will probably draw that plum.

O'Brien Favorite
The ancient Siberian, O'Brien, made hundreds of friends last week in his gallant stand against the Hubka attack, and it seems a safe assertion that most of the fans will be rooting for him to down Soos in the opener. The matches start at 8:30, with the first two under the Australian round system and the main event under American rules.

COLLEGIANS, PROS CLASH TOMORROW

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The boys who've played for glory—and those who do their stuff for cold cash—play for keeps before 80,000 gridiron fans at Soldier Field tomorrow night.

The collegiate all-stars, a half hundred of the finest college and university football stars of 1936, oppose the Detroit Lions, world's professional champions, and both squads are expected to cut loose in an effort to throw some light on that old football puzzle—"can a good college team whip a good professional outfit?"

The former collegians rested today, having wound up an 18-day training campaign yesterday with a snappy drill and review of tactics expected to stop the national professional league titleholders.

There wasn't any question about which 11 players would start the tilt—the fans of the nation who selected the squad in a nation-wide poll participated in by 193 newspapers, have taken that job out of the hands of Coach Bernie Bierman and his four assistants.

PALACIO CAPTURES CALIFORNIA TITLE

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif., Aug. 31.—(AP)—California's 1936 state amateur golfing crown belonged to Matt Palacio, Jr., of San Rafael today, the result of a 1 up victory over James Rea, of San Jose, in 36-hole final played over the famous Pebble Beach course.

The final match, played before a week-end gallery of 1500, saw the 20-year-old University of San Francisco student take the championship on the last hole.

His par 5, gained through a forty foot approach putt which rimmed the cup and left the ball two inches away concluded a hard fought battle in which the lead saw-sawed back and forth with never more than two holes separating the contestants.

Rea missed a chance to remain in the running when his eight foot putt for a half on the 36th hole, stopped on the lip of the cup.

COQUILLE SWAMPS BASEBALL PUPILS IN HIT AVALANCHE

Nello Milosovitch, 73 year old hermit who lives in a mud hut several miles southwest of Coquille, was the only man from that city who failed to get a hit in the game with Medford here yesterday afternoon as Coquille scraped out a narrow 25-9 win over the locals. Milosovitch, who has been bed-ridden since the year of the blue snow, did not come to the game, and never heard of baseball.

Coquille really didn't need him. They landed on Tugate for five hits and eight runs in the first two innings, before Coach John Miller ran in "Smoky" Spencer at the first of the third as the "surprise pitcher" that had been promised the fans.

Coquille showed only mild surprise when they viewed the appearance of their erstwhile teammate, and paid little attention to his wagging of his left foot at the start of his impressive wind-up. The rest of the surprise was saved for the spectators, who saw Smokey's first offering clouded for a single. They were less surprised when the next man also singled and were merely awed when the third lad at the platter wanged out a triple. Another single and the hapless chucker was jerked and sent to relieve Coe in right field. While in the outer gardens he misjudged two fly balls in rapid succession and was again relieved, by Leever, in the same inning.

Ericsson took over the mound duties upon the departure of Spencer, but still tired from his service against the House of David Friday night, was helpless against the heavy sticking of the coast squad of boppers. In that third inning Coquille got 10 runs off 11 hits before Ericsson, too, was taken out.

Bob Smith, southpaw first baseman went to the hill at the start of the fourth and held Coquille hitless and scoreless for two innings. In the sixth they got one hit and one run but touched the relief pitcher for four hits and five runs in the seventh. The eighth inning saw the end of the holocaust as Smith held them to one hit and one run, and let them down without a hit in the last frame.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Tommy Hitchcock, polo's only player with the top handicap rating of 10 goals, again has demonstrated he is the outstanding figure of the galloping game.

And as a result his Greentree team seems headed for its second straight national championship.
