SISKIYOU COUNTY PLACES PRICE ON BROTHERS' HEADS

Sunday morning sunlight at Horse creek in which two peace officers and a vacationer were killed, heard an eyewitness account of the fight; and then returned a verdict that Deputy Sheriff Martin Lange, Constable Joseph Clark, and Fred Seaton, former naval officer, were fatally shot in the oak "by John and Coke Britte, with intent to commit murder."

C. C. Baker, who testified he and Seaton had an encounter with the Brittes, told of the fight which flared suddenly when they returned with officers and a warrant for the Brittes' arrest.

Numerous reports that the brothers had been seen have been heard. Last night a man was picked up by a posse near Weed and held for several hours in the belief he was John Britte. He succeeded in proving his identity, however, and was released on orders of Sheriff W. G. Chandler.

The sheriff said the Britte brothers could live on game in the mountains until snow flies, needing only flour, salt and coffee from the "outside."

Rumors continued today to drift out of Siskiyou county, relative to the fugitive triple slayers, John Britte and his brother Coke, but there is no definite information regarding their whereabouts, Sheriff Syd I. Brown said today.

"All we know about the Britte boys is that they are somewhere in the Siskiyou," the sheriff said this morning. "There have been rumors and rumors, by telephone and in person, and none of them are worth the breath it takes to speak them."

Wednesday, a sensational rumor was in circulation that the brothers were preparing to surrender, as their mother implored, and another report was the slayers were being sheltered by relatives living in the Applegate. The Brittes have no relatives in this section, other than their parents, who live in Siskiyou county near the scene of the crime.

The sheriff said most of the rumors emanated from Yreka, but a number of southern Oregon points contributed their quota.

Three points in the Applegate are still under guard by possemen in charge of Deputy Sheriff Herb Moore. A number of Applegate residents and the forest service are assisting.

RADIO RIGHTS SOLD ON YALE GRID GAMES

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(Sp.)—The question of commercialization of college football cracked open along a new channel today with Yale university's action in selling the radio rights to its home games for 1936.

The contract was announced last night by an official of a Newark station (WOR). It gave an oil company exclusive rights to put Yale's home games on the air, and named the Newark station and a New England network as the outlets.

Reliable reports said the oil company paid \$20,500 for the broadcasting privilege.
