ASHLAND ASKS REFUND IN PRESCOTT PAYMENT. Action was under way today to recover \$3,638.53 paid into the state industrial accident commission by the city of Ashland on the understanding a like sum would be set aside for payment to the parents of Sam Prescott, city policeman slain by a bandit in 1931.

Through its attorney, Frank J. Van Dyke, the city alleges that the money was never paid to the parents because they could not qualify as dependents. Commission records, however, show that the sum was set aside for the purpose and charges to the city have been based on such a payment since that time. Mr. Van Dyke stated.

SETTLERS FROM DROUGHT SECTOR CAUSE PROBLEM

Large Percentage Seek Work in Competition With Oregon Workers—Many Forced to Go On Relief

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Heavy migration of farm settlers from the middle west is creating a serious relief and employment situation, a resettlement administration report said today.

When well located, new families are making a success, but unless the farm itself can supply their needs, they must seek employment off the farm," said Walter A. Duffy, regional director. "A large percentage of the new settlers are seeking work in competition with our workers and many of them are going on relief."

Duffy said relief cases among the newcomers range from 13 per cent in well-settled areas up to 60 per cent in some poor farming communities. He estimated that not over 25 per cent of the settlers had been able to buy farms already in operation.

The bulk of the new settlement is in the Willamette valley and southern Oregon, Duffy said. Duffy reported out that outover timber land, of which much is being purchased, usually requires heavy clearing. Furthermore, he said, much of the land is not good soil and is far from market and labor opportunities.

PLENTY SEEDS ON NORTHWEST TREES

PORTLAND, Sept. 3.—(AP)—With the seed crop of practically all the commercially important trees in the northwest the heaviest in a decade, the U. S. forest service predicted today an abundance of forest regeneration this season.

Among species reported as having heavy crops were Sitka spruce along the coast and western pine along the west slope of the Cascade range from Mt. Jefferson north into Washington. Douglas fir, western hemlock and western red cedar are said to be bearing heavy and medium crops along the west slope of the Cascades and on the southern Oregon coast.

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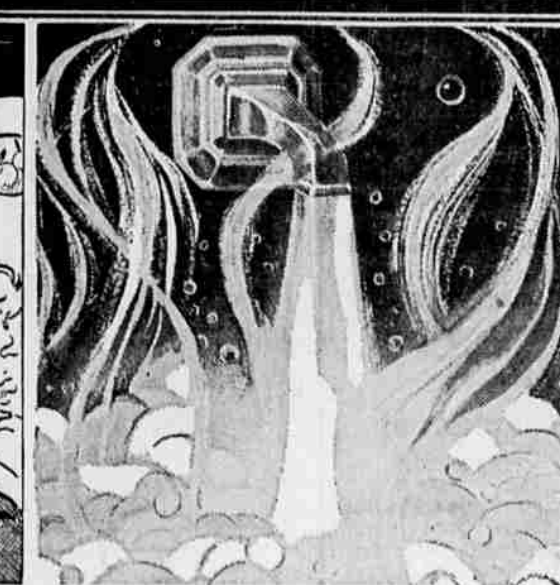
