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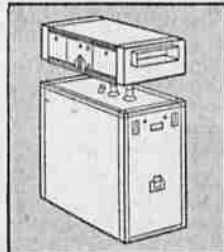
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## KNOX IN CHICAGO FOR BRIEF VISIT

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Col. Frank Knox, Republican vice-presidential nominee, came back to his home city today for his first brief visit since August 8, when he began a coast-to-coast campaign itinerary.

After an overnight run from Alma, Mich., he planned to set out again at 11 a. m. for E. S. T. tomorrow to begin a tour of Minnesota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Business was to occupy most of his Chicago stop.

The candidate concluded the first phase of his campaign, after speaking in New England and Allentown, Pa., with a Labor Day address yesterday in Alma, Mich., on the campus of the little college he attended 40 years ago. Saying that the administration "professed great friendship for labor," Knox charged its policies had "done labor harm."

Kyanite, used in manufacture of fire brick, having high heat resistance, is mined in northeast Georgia.

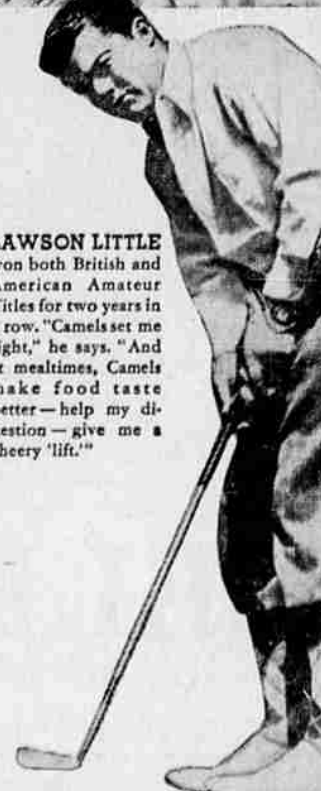
