The international committee, although believing the help of Portugal essential to complete success for neutrality, was expected to consider stringent action to prevent foreign enlistments and to cut off cash aid from outside to either faction.

Madrid announced "complete" subjugation of Juesca in the northeast. The rebels said they had seized Arenas de San Pedro, 73 miles southwest of Madrid, spurring the campaign to encircle Madrid.

number of suggestions to allow the prediction among Mr. Roosevelt's friends that he will deal with his reorganization plans in one or more speeches toward the latter part of his re-election campaign. . . .

"The administration proposes to follow a definite policy of curtailing or dismantling emergency units that have outlived their usefulness," the paper continued, " . . . until a comprehensive plan is developed and adopted by congress."

"In some cases," the Times said, "workers actually are being discharged, but for full fruition of his general plan, the president feels he must have the action of congress."

FRANCE TO REFUSE HITLER DEMAND FOR RETURN OF COLONIES

PARIS, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Informed sources said today that France, in the face of Adolf Hitler's demand for Germany's lost colonies, would refuse to yield her share in Africa under the menace of the growing German army.

Officials previously had taken the attitude that France would keep Togo and the Cameroons (Kamerun), mandated jointly to France and Great Britain, at any price.

Officials have said France has sent "hundreds of millions of francs" improving Togo and the Cameroons under a League of Nations mandate.

The area, they declared, was a "paying proposition for France." France's share is a combined area of 188,382 square miles, little less than the 212,659 square miles of metropolitan France, and the foreign trade of the two territories is more than 250,000,000 francs.

compensation commission, attacking constitutionality of the Oregon jobless insurance law.

Krause alleged in his affidavit of prejudice, he could not receive "fair and impartial trial" here.

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
