LAST RITES HELD IN SANTA BARBARA FOR ETTA VAWTER

William Vawter returned Tuesday morning from Santa Barbara, Calif., where he was called last Thursday by the death of his mother, Mrs. Etta Vawter, well-known Medford resident, who had been living in the California city for the past few months.

Funeral services for Mrs. Vawter were held at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon in Santa Barbara. Cremation followed the services, the ashes to be sent to Portland to lie beside those of Mrs. Vawter's husband, William I. Vawter, who died in 1916.

Mrs. Vawter is survived by two sons, William of this city and Vernon of Santa Barbara; two grandsons; three brothers, Farmer Hill, newspaper editor of Davenport, Wn.; George Hill of Arizona, retired missionary to Japan and China; and Dr. Clayburn Hill, president of the Pacific Coast Theological seminary in Berkeley, Calif., and his son, Cary Hill of Los Angeles and daughter, Mrs. Paul Yost, also of Los Angeles.

Members of the family able to be present for the services were Dr. Hill, Mr. and Mrs. Yost, Cary Hill and William Vawter.

Mrs. Vawter's sudden passing came as a distinct shock to scores of friends in southern Oregon where the Vawter family has been prominent for many years. Mrs. Vawter was born in Silver City, Idaho, but spent the greater part of her life in southern Oregon.

The Vawter residence at 310 West Main street, is among famous landmarks of the city and is regarded by Medford residents as a familiar and integral part of the community.

JOSEPH GOEBBELS ATTACKS SOVIETS IN BITTER WORDS

The Spanish non-intervention policy, "When he goes on in Russia, Spain, and other European countries, concerns the whole world," he said. "It is no longer a matter for political theorists, but concerns all statesmen and peoples, who must deal with this question—if they do not want to take the responsibility of being guilty of letting Europe be hurled into destruction."

"He who fraternizes with bolshevism is sure to die from it."

"The bolshevik question is a question of Europe's future existence."

"That the Jew created bolshevism and bears it forward today is no longer doubtful."

"Every inner bolshevik struggle is a family fight among Jews."

Dr. Goebbels declared that although bolshevism is impossible now in Germany, "we can warn against danger and cry: Jews guilty! Jews guilty!"

He characterized bolshevism as the "most crass blood terror and master that the world has ever seen." He said it was a "dictatorship of the least worthy; it comes to power through lies and maintains itself in power through force."

Throughout the nation other spade battalions assembled on their drill grounds. Commands given at Nurnberg were transmitted to them by radio and they duplicated maneuvers before the party of high Nazi officials which accompanied Hitler to the review.
