

EXHIBITS, SPORTS WILL DRAW HUGE THROW FOR DAY

This year will be housed in five different buildings instead of only two, as was done last year. In the city hall the needlework and school children's exhibits will be located, with the lower half of the Odd Fellows building to house the home canning and baking departments. Grange booths and agricultural products will take up all space in the Denel building, with the art and hobbies displays to be in the offices of the Gold Hill News. The old dining room at the Gold Hill hotel building will be utilized for floral displays. Judging of fair exhibits was done this afternoon.

One of the biggest attractions of the fair will be the free barbecue to be held at the kitchen on the city hall grounds. Last year about 2500 people attended the open-air dinner and an even larger crowd is anticipated tomorrow. The barbecue will start at 5 o'clock and continue until 8:00.

550 Pounds Beef Bought
Charles Kell, chairman of the barbecue committee, announced that 550 pounds of choice beef has been purchased. It will be cooked in one by Harry Eaton and R. S. Kies, the two men who supervised the proceedings and won their spurs as cooks last year. All the trimmings that go to make up the meal have been arranged for, largely by donations. Gold Hill ladies will serve the big throw. Tables have been placed on the city hall grounds, and flood lights will illuminate the scene.

At 9 o'clock activity will shift to the Gold Hill pavilion, where dancing will continue until 2 a. m., or later.

An afternoon amusement feature will be donkey baseball, with two teams picked from Gold Hill.

More than \$300 in premiums has been posted by the county court for winners at the fair. Cash prizes will go to first and second places. In addition to cash premiums merchants have donated prizes which will go to the best entries in the parade and winners of the sports events.

THEFT OF LIQUOR**
Chester Joseph, 38, a transient cook arrested by city police last night charged with petty larceny from a parked car, pleaded guilty to the charge in Judge Wm. Coleman's justice court this morning and was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail, and pay court costs.

MORE PORTLAND KIDS**
PORTLAND, Sept. 11. (AP) — Superintendent of Schools Charles A. Rice said the number of freshmen registering in high schools Tuesday was 117 per cent of the June grade school graduates, a new high mark.

"We have previously had percentages as high as 112 per cent, but this is our top record," said Rice.

"Some of the surplus comprised January graduates, some entered from parochial schools and some recently moved to the city. At any rate, high school attendance is more general than ever before."

Perhaps we'd better stop right now to make a distinction between meringues — the kind of which we're speaking — and meringues. The smaller shapes are those known as kisses. They are very often sprinkled with chopped nuts, grated chocolate or candied fruit and served as tea wafers or confections.

The meringues, which are usually made larger, are commonly known as meringue rings — you know those hard, crunchy meringue "nuts" which are so good when filled with ice cream, fresh fruit or whipped cream. Low Temperature Required
The most important of the steps in making them is in the baking. ARTIST CONFESSES ATTACKING WHITE, TAKING EARNINGS

Elmer Johnson, 28-year old artist arrested in Portland as a suspect in the death of William H. White 42, signed a confession Thursday afternoon that he attacked White in front of a Portland beer parlor where he was found dead, with a beer jug nearby, last Monday morning, Portland police announced.

The death was at first attributed to natural causes. The widow, Mrs. Florence G. White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McParlane of 619 South Central street in Medford was called north by a coroner's notice of the death of her husband.

Upon her arrival there she suspected that her husband had met with foul play, and demanded an inquest. The inquest showed a severely fractured skull. A warrant was issued and several suspects were arrested.

Johnson, after his confession, told police that he had knocked White down and took his wallet, removed \$25, and bought whiskey with part of it. He said he went to Salem later Monday because he had entered paintings at the state fair, and knew nothing of White's death until his return to Portland.

Mrs. White had been in Medford for several months nursing her mother, who broke her hip in a fall on the city hall steps about a year ago, and was again injured in a fall about a year ago. Mrs. White is well known here, having been a frequent visitor here for many years. Her parents formerly owned and operated the Cloverleaf service station at the corner of South Riverside and Thirteenth streets here. Mr. White has visited several times in Medford, and had friends here.

Funeral services were held for him at 2 o'clock this afternoon in Portland, with burial in Lincoln Memorial park. He was a driver for a Portland freight company. He leaves his widow and three sisters.

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2000 LOYALISTS SLAUGHTERED IN ISLAND ATTACK

de Cervantes had been damaged and abandoned by its crew in the south.

Renewed bombardment, following an ultimatum demanding surrender of the city by noon, was reported at San Sebastian this afternoon, but the rebels' aim was not so good at first.

President Luis Companys of autonomous Catalonia warned Spanish government supporters he would resign unless terrorist acts by individuals ceased altogether.

Diplomats accredited to Madrid who are stationed at Saint Jean de Luz, France, were understood to have refused a British request that they ask Spanish rebels to refrain from using poison gas against Madrid.

Pillaging was reported at San Sebastian and the basques, numerically superior to the anarchists who would burn San Sebastian rather than give up to advancing rebel columns, were reported pressed to keep the power they have seized in the city's defenses.

On the front west of Madrid, the usually conflicting claims by socialist government and fascist rebels, who call themselves "nationalists," clouded the real picture of battle.

The government said it had "halt-

ed" an advance by several rebel columns, "forcing them to stop" at Arenas de San Pedro, in Avila province, 73 miles west by south of the capital.

Rebel commanders, however, jubilantly claimed that the "capture" of Arenas de San Pedro had led to other victories which joined three columns from northern and southern armies in their march on Madrid.

Government officials, meanwhile, said flatly that surrender or truce in the war was impossible—that the civil struggle, now nine weeks old, was a "fight for life or death."

One high socialist leader declared all "genuinely" foreign industries seized by the government had been returned to their owners.
