GIANT ELBOWERS PROVE HEADACHE FOR BILL TERRY

The pitching problem, which has been the biggest kind of a nightmare to Frankie Frisch all season, finally has caught up with Bill Terry.

This hurling collapse, in which only Carl Hubbell and Freddy Fitzsimmons seem able to hold their own, has made anything but a song and dance out of the Giants' current home stand, to which they returned triumphantly only a week ago, and points to the year's most "crucial" series between the New Yorkers and the battling Cards in their three-game set Sunday and Monday.

The pitching passed out again in the late innings yesterday and the pesky Reds made it two straight over the Giants with a 7-2 decision off Gabby Gabler. The cards pulled out their second close one in a row over the troublesome Bees, 3-2, with a two-run rally in the ninth, and the

HUBKA'S FOLLOWERS SEE CHANCE FOR WIN OVER COWBOY CHICK

Can Dude Chick, who has won every Medford battle he has engaged in over a period of six months, with the one exception when he lost on a fluke to Ken Hollis, continue his phenomenal victory string when he meets Joe Hubka in the main event at the Armory Monday night?

Apparently there are many who have their doubts. Hubka supporters are becoming increasingly bold in their assertions that the blond ex-footballer from Nebraska has enough stamina, speed and skill to keep Chick entirely on the defensive, and they assert that with that as a starter he will be able to dump the big cowboy puncher with any one of several holds.

Strangely enough, all fans seem to agree on one thing—that the battle will not go for more than one fall. One dizzying trip on the shoulders of Chick is usually enough to settle any match, and argues on the other side of the fence believe that when Hubka gets an advantage he will take it with enough fervor to render his opponent hors de combat for the remainder of the evening.

EUGENE, Sept. 11. — (AP) — Two transfers came in for considerable attention on the initial day's grid practice at the University of Oregon.

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'SCOTTY' CAMPBELL PICKED BY BRITISH AS PLAYER TO BEAT

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 11. — The British Walker cup players pick Albert "Scotty" Campbell of Seattle over Johnny Goodman as the man to beat in the national amateur golf championship starting Monday.

Despite their glorious showing in the cup matches, the British players have taken heart at the sight of the Garden City course. Here the wind is high, and greens firm and fast.

Of the 19 foreign players in the field, the experts list three who have a definite chance of taking the title out of the country. They are Hector Thomson, Jock McLean, and C. Ross "Sandy" Somerville of Canada. Every one knows what Somerville can do. He held the American title in 1921, and has put up a great fight every year since.

Though Thomson is generally regarded as the better player, McLean has more confidence and is better placed in the draw.

Ever since the Walker cup matches, the British players have forgotten competitive golf and have been touring New York night and day. Dr. Tweddell said that this was all very pleasant, but he thought these tours were about over.

NO BREAK SEEN IN PORTLAND STRIKES

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 11. — (AP) — Union pickets patrolled the wholesale drug companies and 13 iron foundries today as Portland's two latest labor controversies continued without apparent signs of an immediate settlement.

Drugs were moving unmolested, however. Governor Charles Martin earlier this week threatened to rescind the licenses of three truck companies unless they hauled the merchandise. Striking members of the teamsters' union at the drug firms said no effort to halt shipments would be made.

Two hundred and twenty iron foundrymen remained idle when employers refused demands for 92 cents an hour base pay. The recent scale was 80 cents. Three foundries signed agreements with the union and were operating. Others remained closed.
