

KLAMATH WOMAN SETS ODD RECORD AS BERRY PICKER

Puts in 46th Straight Year As Gatherer in Noted Forest Patch — Area Yields 20,000 Gallons Thus Far

Mrs. Alice Hamilton of Klamath Falls today wears the mythical crown of champion huckleberry picker of the huckleberry mountain area 12 miles southeast of Union Creek in the Rogue River national forest.

Mrs. Hamilton this season put in her 46th consecutive year as a gatherer of huckleberries in the famous mountain berry patch. It was revealed today by Karl L. Janouch, forest supervisor, she has been going each year to the huckleberry mountain sector since she was seven years old, Mr. Janouch said.

The huge berry patch has proved more popular this year than ever before and the facilities provided by the forest service for 80 camps have been extensively utilized, Mr. Janouch related. Many persons, he said, drive to the area to purchase berries, the prevailing price being \$1 a gallon.

\$20,000 Crop
Up to September 3, Mr. Janouch stated, 20,000 gallons of berries had been gathered and the picking is still in progress. At \$1 a gallon, this represents a gross income of \$20,000 to the pickers, he pointed out.

Three gallons a day, the supervisor explained, constitute an average day's work. Recently, however, four persons in one camp picked 45 gallons in three days, representing a daily return of \$4.75 for each.

The huckleberry area, situated on top of the mountain which derives its name from the berry, comprises about 20,000 acres. The area contains no commercial timber and is productive of only the berries and Christmas trees, Mr. Janouch related. Its yield of berries and yule trees, however, is valued at more than \$30,000, he said.

Pickers From Afar
The supervisor stated that during a recent inspection at the berry campground he saw cars from Washington and California. Most of the berry pickers, however, came from eastern and southeastern sections of Oregon, where fresh fruit is not grown and is therefore highly valued, he said.

Some of the berry pickers set up their camp tents early in July and remain until late in September, Mr. Janouch related. The time of the season, he explained, determines the use to which the berries are best adapted, the early berries being best for jams and jellies while the late ones are superior for canning. The best canning berries are those picked late in the season after frosty weather, he averred.

"Huckleberry mountain provides the largest berry area on the Rogue River national forest and the best in the state," the supervisor declared with pride.

Code of Ethics
The berry pickers have developed an unwritten code of ethics and were told to him who violates it, Mr. Janouch said. Each selects the spot in which he wants to pick, for example, and no poaching is permitted, he explained.

No smoking is allowed under forest rules excepting in the camp area and the old-timers are ferret in abiding by this law, Mr. Janouch said. They realize, he added, that a fire would destroy the berry patch forever.

Turns Detective
Recently a picker who insisted on violating the smoking rule joined the camp. He was reported but he took great care not to smoke whenever a guard was around, Mr. Janouch related. The veterans continued to report him and to insist that he be punished. Finally a guard from another station joined the encampment as a picker, giving a good imitation of a O-man, the supervisor recalled.

Finally, when the offender was convinced that the newcomer was a bona fide picker, he became careless and started smoking. He was promptly cited to appear in justice court and later was fined.

Jack Crump and an assistant are stationed in the area as forest guards. They keep a record of the berry pickers and the amount of berries gathered, Mr. Janouch said.
