WAR HELD FRUIT OF WORLD TREND FROM DEMOCRACY

G.O.P. Nominee In Fighting Speech Challenges F. D. R.'s To Admit Errors 'In Plain Language.'

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 12.—(AP)—pledging himself "to save our system of free enterprise" Gov. Alf M. Landon said tonight the New Deal would be leading the nation toward a "centralized government of unlimited power" during a world trend from democracy "that means but one thing—war."

'Fuehrer' Opens Verbal War On Bolshevism—And Praises Nazi Efficiency.

(Copyright, 1936, by United Press) NUREMBERG, Germany, Sept. 12.—(UP)—Fuehrer Adolf Hitler boasted today that Nazi Germany possessed the "most natural resources of Soviet Russia, the Reich "would be swimming in plenty" whereas "Bolshevism cannot feed its people."



Hitler was bragging to the annual Nazi party rally that he had accomplished all his objectives. He had been 100 per cent successful. A leader in Hitler's shoes without a purpose must either arrange for a pair of slippers or another purpose.
