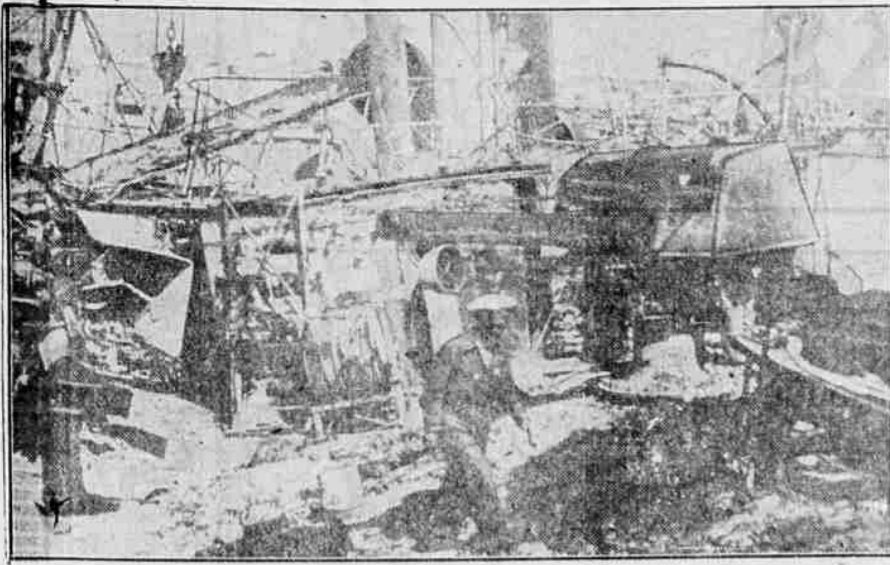


SPANISH REBEL BOAT DESTROYED BY LOYAL SHIP

CAT SAVED AFTER WEEK IN SEWER

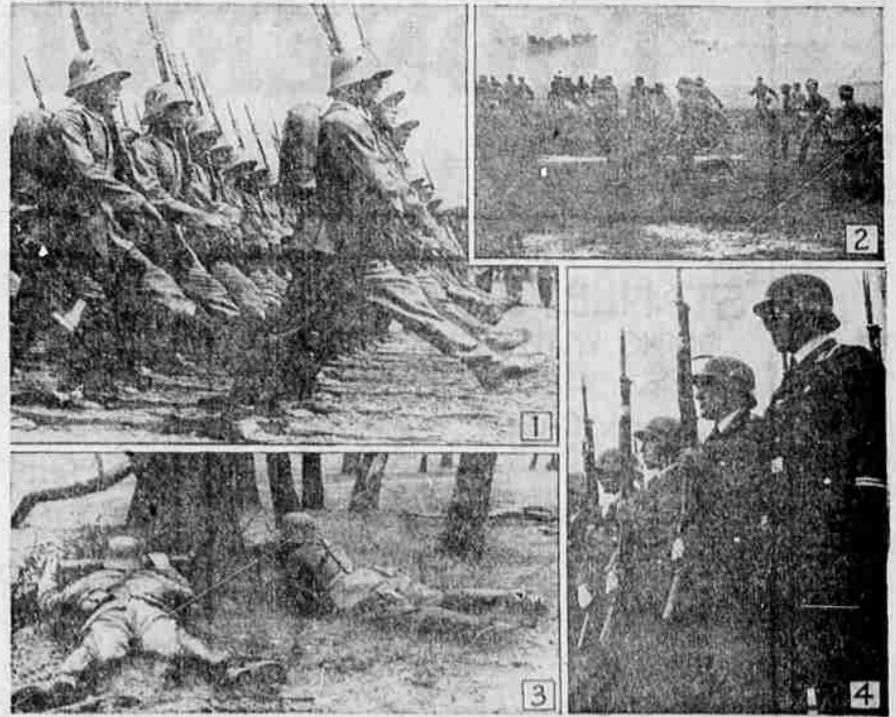
MILITARY TRAINING DOUBLED FOR NAZI YOUTH

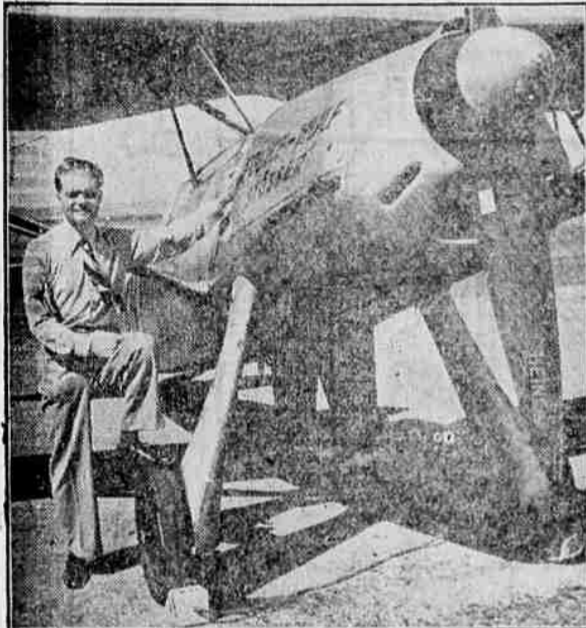

Within a month, Nazi Germany will have more than a million men under arms or receiving virtual military training. It was estimated on the heels of Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's decree increasing the time of compulsory military service from one to two years. The decree means an extra year for thousands of young men (1) goosestepping before state and military officials, (2) and (3) mimic warfare against imaginary enemies, and (4) formal inspections by reviewing officers. SAYS HUSBAND IS "TOO PERFECT"



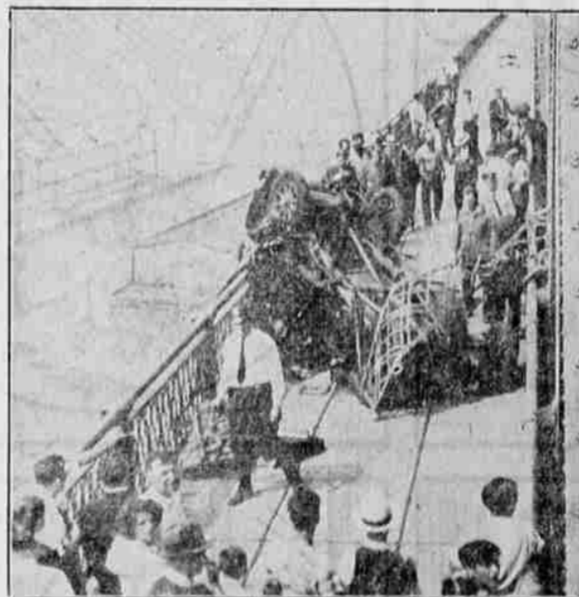

AUTO MISSES RIVER BY INCHES



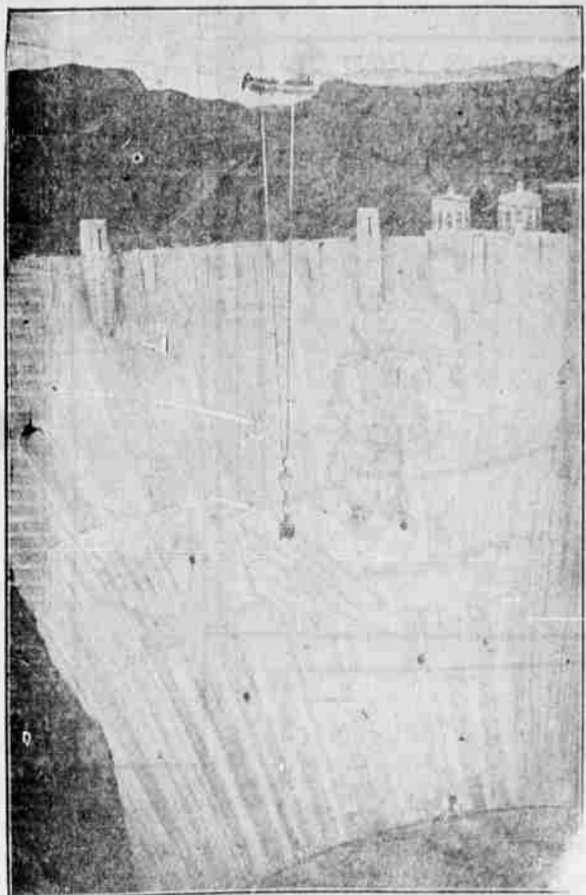

THE MIGHTY FACE OF BOULDER DAM



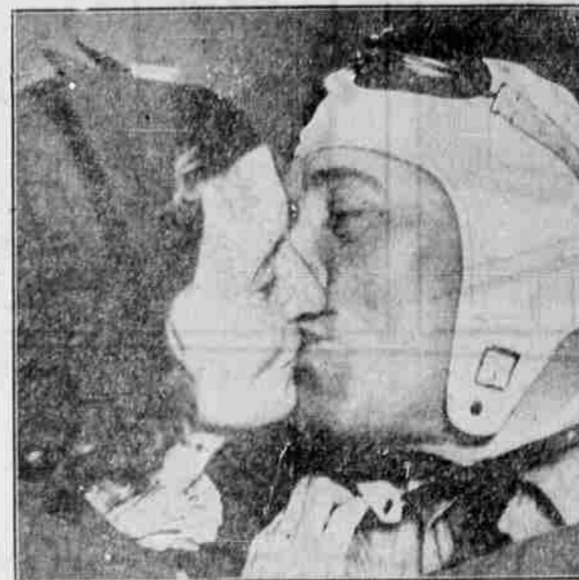
