

# Alice Marble, New Queen of American Tennis-British Champ Wins

## HELEN JACOBS IS DETHRONED; PERRY HARD PUT TO WIN

### Briton Ekes Out Victory Over Budge In Tough Battle-Lady Champion Nervous.

 PORTLET HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Alice Marble, 23-year old blond from San Francisco, became queen of American tennis today and Frederick John Perry, the black-haired Englishman, again mounted to the throne of world ruler in the men's division.

Miss Marble, whose brilliant career was halted by injury two years ago to the French hard court championships dethroned Helen Jacobs of Berkeley. Champion Perry gained the title which Wilmer Allison of Texas vacated this season by winning over J. Donald Budge, Oakland, Calif., red-head in a bitter five set struggle.

The pale-faced San Francisco girl defeated Miss Jacobs, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2, before a crowd of 14,000 in the huge concrete West Side tennis stadium. Then with its appetite whetted by that upset, the crowd went wild as the gangling Budge pulled to within two points of victory in the final set before yielding to Perry, 2-6, 6-2, 6-5, 14-16.

The triumph of Miss Marble, who was the third ranking player of the nation in 1935, spoiled Miss Jacobs' ambition of becoming supreme in the world. She had won the Wimbledon title this year and had hoped by a triumph today to become ruler of world courts. She also had hoped to make history by becoming the first woman to sweep the American title five times in a row.

Although defeated Miss Jacobs vowed to carry on.

Perry's victory marked another brilliant chapter in the history of the man who turned from ping pong to scale the heights of world tennis. Defeated in the semi-final last year by Allison, Perry today became the first foreigner ever to win the American title three times. He also retired from competition permanently the huge silver championship bowl. His victory over Budge, one in which he was extended far more than in any previous important meetings in the 1935 Davis Cup challenge round and the semi-finals at Wimbledon this year—enabled Perry to sweep both major world titles for the second time. He turned the trick in 1934.

Both of the favorites—Miss Jacobs and Perry—were rattled by the amazing display of their younger opponent. Perry pulled himself together before it was too late. Miss Jacobs went to pieces as the going became rougher.

Miss Marble who was idle for a year after her injury at Paris and who "came back" this year, defeated the champion with a sound game. She raked Miss Jacobs with such a withering barrage of cross-court shots and deep drives that the champion virtually was exhausted in the final set. Frequently, she had to pause to catch her breath.

In the first set Miss Jacobs was a shaky master of the situation. Miss Marble had better striking—but she appeared nervous. The champion showed her superiority in the second set.

GIANTS LAG BUT CARDS DILATORY

The Cardinals, with a doubleheader against the Dodgers, could have gained a half-game by taking both. Instead, they won only the opener, 12-8, as rookie Don uderidge belted out two homers and a triple, and then dropped the nightcap 8-4, their bats helpless before Van Mungo's strike-out elbowing.

White Sox Star In Tie For Top Place

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—A shakeup in the major league batting races during the past week found Luke Appling of the White Sox coming backing to tie for the American league lead, and Paul Waner of the Pirates and Babe Phelps of the Dodgers finish one-two in the National.

The two favorites for much of the season Ducky Medwick of the Cardinals and Lou Gehrig of the Yankees lost considerable ground.

The heavy hitting for the week was done by Waner and Appling.

PURDUE FOOTBALL PLAYERS HURT IN GAS STOVE BLAST

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Six Purdue university football players suffered painful burns late today when a heater above in their shower room exploded.

Tom Johnston, University publicity director, expressed belief fumes from gasoline, being used to remove tape from the players' feet and hands, had caused the blast.

Other players and volunteers quickly extinguished the flames, and the injured were rushed to St. Elizabeth hospital.

Attending physicians said some of the players might be confined to the hospital for "two or three weeks."

## BOWERMAN SQUAD TO PLAY ALUMNI IN GRID OPENER

The 1936 model of the Medford high school football team, made up of green men with a splattering of veterans, will take the field for the first time September 26, two weeks from yesterday, in a game against the Alumni. The high school band started last night by Coach Bill Bowerman. The game will see the new turf field and new big grandstand at the high school field in use for the first time.

The Alumni crew, possibly headed by Ray Henderson as director and manager, will start practice immediately. The high school band started drill last week, and tomorrow several "holdouts" are expected to abandon summer jobs and report.

Bowerman said last night that backfield prospects were excellent, but that line hopes were not good. He predicted that "if we can develop a line well really have the club to be proud of." Toward that end, much of the practice in the next two weeks will be pointed. For the seven positions on the line there are eight lettermen from last year's state championship team, but the lettermen will have to be shifted to fill the two major gaps in the line, left by the departure of Stan Kuzman at end and John Dickinson at right guard.

Bowerman took a pugnaous attitude toward the line that will have to face a stiff schedule this year. "In past Medford history we've had some lines that actually grew famous over their ability to take punishment," he said. "Last year we had some lads who could stick their chins out and get them awatted all day, and like it. This year we're going to do that, and do some dishing out instead of taking it. We're going to play the game carivorously, and we're going to get some awful beatings," said.

The best prospects for the line positions as Bowerman saw them yesterday were: Center, Baker and Stocks, with Baker holding an edge now; right guards, Todd and Stevens; right tackles, Blair, Santo and Clute; left guards, Baker and Erntreich; left tackles, Erhart, Bishop and Benford; left ends, Wilson and Tycker.

Backfield men showing the most promise now include: Quarterbacks, Maruyama and Bowman; right halves, Ettinger, Morris and Gillinsky; left halves, Lewis, Campbell and Olsen, and Art Hill at fullback.

Olsen, a halfback prospect, reportedly due duty yesterday. He is a transfer from Nebraska, where he was a track, football and basketball star. He is six feet tall, tips the scale at 170, and gives promise of working nicely into the Medford attack.

The Alumni team has not yet been organized but there are several prospective players now in the city, including "Leapin' Leo" Ghelardi, rabbit paced little ground gainer of two years ago. Keith Kates, husky tackle; Lloyd Hammack, star center and many others will probably play. Virgil Swanson, versatile former high school star, who did starting work in last year's Alumni game, will probably be back in harness.

## AMATEUR HUNTER WITH BOOZE AND BULLETS SCORED

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Muckleheads of the hunt—those egotistical amateurs who roam the hills at hunting time and shoot on sight—are going to learn "manners" or get out of the woods, western sportsmen vowed today.

Human fatalities, the killing of domesticated livestock and the shooting of deer have brought a common demand from sportsmen's associations and livestock growers throughout the west for a stricter-than-ever enforcement of hunting laws this autumn.

In addition, they've set a new tack—they're going to teach woods manners to those "indoor sportsmen" who see no difference between a doe and a buck and whose trigger fingers twitch.

"We're going to drive 'em out of the woods and keep 'em out 'till they learn to hunt—these indoor sportsmen from the cities who shoot anything on sight," asserted S. M. Jorgensen, a member of the Utah Fish and Game board and a stockman.

"They're our greatest hunting menace. They come out of the cities with high-powered guns, booze and plenty of bullets, and then they blaze away at the first deer they see regardless of its sex or age. Hundreds of deer, illegally killed, are left to rot in the fields."

JESS OWENS PLEA UNABLE TO LIFT AAU. SUSPENSION

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The record-smashing prowess of Jesse Owens, America's four-time Olympic gold medalist, was not sufficient today to carry him past the barriers of suspension, with which he is currently surrounded, in a sudden attempt to gain reinstatement for amateur foot-racing competition.

Sought as headline for the Caledonian games, to be held next Thursday night in the Yankee stadium, the famous negro Olympic star decided that all the talk about his turning professional was a mistake and intended by Owens, combined with pressure brought to bear by track meet promoters and Ohio A. U. officials, failed to alter the fact that the "Brown Bullet" remains under suspension on two distinct counts. These comprise (1) Automatic suspension, for an indefinite period, for "turning out" on an agreement to compete with an American team of Olympic stars in Sweden, and (2) Equally automatic suspension, for a period of one year, for publicly proclaiming his purpose to turn professional.

Later in the evening there will be a double-header ring show, opening with five three-round boxing bouts between the best CCC fighters obtainable. Captain Ryan is matchmaker, and promises to bring out some good boys for the first CCC ring show of the fall and winter season.

After the boxing bouts, Mack Lillard will take the blankets off four of his behemoths and present two professional wrestling matches. Lillard will draw his talent from the grapplers appearing regularly at the armory, and assures a good card.

Tickets for the affair were placed on sale several days ago, and ready demand for postcards indicates one of the largest crowds ever to attend an Elks' picnic will be on hand.

MR. HUBKA BOUND HE WILL WIN FROM WYOMING TERROR

Joe Hubka, ex-football flash from the University of Nebraska, who is to wrestle Duce Chick in the Army main event Monday, came all the way to Oregon for that express purpose, he said yesterday. Tales of Chick's prowess have gone all over the country and it is the major ambition of most junior heavyweights to down the big cowpuncher.

Hubka does not intend to miff his chance, he said. He will shoot the works from the opening gun in an effort to take an early advantage and keep it over his highly rated opponent. He realizes the deadly effectiveness of Chick's spin and hopes to stay out of it by keeping the Cheyenne muscle muncher on the defensive. He has several effective grips of his own, including a lethal flying tackle he has been keeping under wraps, a dangerous scissors, and a somersault botoms-up.

Fans believe that Chick will have to employ his own favorites if he expects to win. Those favorites are an airplane scissors, a flying shoulder butt, and the larlat spin, the longest and most dizzying ride ever seen here. Betting still favors the range rider despite Hubka's determination.

Prince Silki Mihalakis of Arabia will be meeting Les Wolfe for the first time in the middle event. Both have impressive records here, Wolfe having built his on the effective body figured hook scissors that paralyzes the stomach muscles, and the sneak gaining his best falls with a camel lock or a dragon scissors, and the dragon scissors is a complicated hold in which leverage is clamped onto the knee joint, inflicting such torture that the victim is usually anxious to yell uncle. WORLD SERIES TO OPEN SEPT. 30 IN YANKEE STADIUM

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The National League pennant winner—whether it's the Giants, Cardinals or Cubs—will be host to the New York Yankees and the first two games of the 1936 world series, September 30 and October 1.

Contending club owners decided that, among other essential details, a meeting today with Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis, a financial record-breaker appears likely if the New York Giants qualify to meet the Yankees in the first "subway series" since 1923.

Such is the combined seating capacity of the polo grounds and Yankee stadium, the American league's biggest park, that five games on a sell-out basis would result in a new record for receipts, with the \$160,000 for radio rights taken into account. The all-time series "high" of \$1,207,864 was set in a seven-game series between the Yankees and Cardinals in 1925.

The third, fourth and fifth games will be at Yankee stadium, home of the American league champions. The sixth and seventh, if necessary, will be played under National League auspices.

Exclusive broadcast rights have been purchased for \$100,000 by the Ford Motor company for the third straight year, Commissioner Landis announced.
