Comment of the Day's News

IN THIS extremely political year, there is a lot of wild talk about the wealth. The demagogues who are indulging in this talk (for the purpose of getting votes for themselves) seek to create the impression that NEARLY ALL the wealth of this country is owned by a few hundred people. They tell us that they propose to divide the possessions of the very wealthy up among the rest of us, so that EVERYBODY will be rich and happy. LISTEN: If the EXCESS of all individual incomes of more than \$5000 were distributed to the REST of the population of this country, each person would receive only \$28 a year. LETS see if we can make that a little plainer. If we took from everybody getting more than \$5000 a year the EXCESS above \$5000 and divided the total sum so obtained up among all those receiving LESS than \$5000, the share of each would be only \$28. SO MUCH for income. Now let's consider principal. If the PRINCIPAL of all individual wealth exceeding \$2,500,000 were divided up among those possessing less than \$2,500,000, as the late Huey Long suggested, the division would yield to each of us only \$136. IF WE went to all the trouble, we ask, of dividing up the wealth of the very wealthy and parceling it out among the rest of us, the sum we would receive would be so small as hardly to be worth while. BUT the damage that would be done by such a proceeding would be immense and ghastly, and would affect all of us DISASTROUSLY. Wealth, you know, isn't represented merely by silver and paper dollars which can be easily divided. In this country wealth consists chiefly of land and houses and machinery. The value of the Southern Pacific railroad, for example, isn't represented by so many dollars stacked up in a bank vault. Instead, it consists of right-of-way, roadbed, station and terminal buildings, engines, cars, etc. If we started dividing these things up, giving to John Smith a length of steel rail and to Jim Jones a car wheel, etc., we would WRECK the great Southern Pacific railroad and take away the jobs of those who now work for it, and at the same time we wouldn't be doing ourselves any particular good.

HALL ON GALLOWS ASSERTS OREGON LIFER INNOCENT

Mass Murderer Pays Penalty—Grins At Execution Crowd At Walla Walla.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Sept. 12. (AP)—The state hanged Leo Bernard Hall and wrote "avenged" today across the records of the ghastly Erlenda Point massacre in which six persons were slaughtered in a pretty summer cottage more than two years ago. Hall, once a seminary student, went calmly to his death on the gallows in the state penitentiary here Friday night, declaring the innocence of a man convicted of a murder in Oregon. Even as the trap banged in the witness-lammed execution chamber, Hall's brother, Gus Hall, was racing in an airplane from Walla Walla across the state toward Olympia in a last, desperate effort to win a reprieve from the governor. Tried and convicted only for the murder of one of the six, Eugene A. Chenevert, the erstwhile seminary student, boxer, shipyard worker and ladies' man, asserted his freedom from guilt to the end and spent his last hours with his spiritual advisor, the Rev. Father James J. Lynch of Walla Walla. The 34-year-old prisoner had no word to say for Mrs. Peggy Peterson Paulos, his accuser and co-defendant in the murder trial, nor of Miss Carrie Stickle of Memphis, Tenn., whose testimony aided the state in convicting him December 19, 1933, at Port Orchard. Smiling wryly, he walked from the death cell on the second floor to the execution gallery on the same level, with the gallows beam above. He grinned down at the upturned faces of the witnesses. Warden J. M. McCauley gave him an opportunity to speak his last words. They were in the defense of Jack Justice, convicted of hiring Hall to shoot W. Frank Akin in November, 1933. "I would like to say the Justice they convicted in the Akin case was an entirely innocent man," Hall said. "Jack Justice never hired me or, as far as I know, anybody else to kill Frank Akin. The charge they convicted him on was a bum charge." With this assertion in behalf of Justice now serving life in the Oregon penitentiary at Salem, Hall nodded and the executioner adjusted the hood and rope. The trap fell at 11 p. m., and Dr. Elmer L. Peterson, physician, pronounced him dead 10 minutes later.

LEMKE ON COAST HITS MONEY RUL; NEW DEAL WASTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—(P)—William E. Lemke, North Dakota U. S. representative and candidate for president of the Union party, will arrive in Portland tomorrow and speak at 2 p. m. in the public auditorium. His topic has not been announced.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12.—(P)—Congressman William Lemke carried his presidential campaign up the Pacific coast today after striking out in a Los Angeles address at international racketeers and gangsters' who he said manipulate the nation's currency.

The North Dakota representative, standard bearer of the new Union party, spoke here last night in Olympic stadium, whose 10,000 seats were three-quarters filled. Quoting frequently from the party platform of the national union for social justice, which sponsored his candidacy, Lemke declared: "More money should be placed in circulation, and let Wall street call it debasing the currency." The public credit, he said, should be used to retire the national debt by issuing currency in place of bonds, thus saving \$1,000,000,000 annually in interest. This billion, he declared, could be applied to "old age compensation."

Targets for criticism by Lemke were the New Deal's foreign trade policy and the \$2,038,000,000 in foreign goods which he said were imported last year. "We can't borrow or tax ourselves out of the depression or by huge imports," he asserted.
