GOVERNOR CALLS CONFERENCE ON RAILWAY TO SEA

(Continued from Page One)

The east-west agitation is for a railroad across the state from Burns to the Oregon coast, the terminus yet having been designated. Also the agitation for a line from Humboldt Bay, California, to Coos Bay, Oregon, will be under consideration at the meeting.

The governor will sponsor the movement to the extent of obtaining the desires of the communities affected. The interstate commerce commission, he said, asks for official recognition from the governor before taking the matter under consideration.

"It seems to me," Governor Martin said, "very desirable that a statewide organization be formed with a definite program in order that the best interests of the state as a whole may be determined in such matters."

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Governor Martin was urged today to change the site of his proposed statewide railroad project hearing from Salem to the center of railroad planning activity.

C. H. Demaray, official representative for the city of Grants Pass and the harbor district at Crescent City, Calif., making application for one of the railroads, issued the suggestion.

Governor Martin earlier in the day announced a hearing will be held in Salem on September 22 and that invitations would be issued to the chambers of commerce tomorrow.

The hearing is designed to coordinate plans and proposals previous to a formal hearing by the interstate commerce commission at Grants Pass about September 28.

Demaray, who is also receiver for the California and Oregon Coast railroad, declared that southern Oregon is geographically the best site.
