JAPANESE CLASH WITH CHINESE IN LANDING ATTEMPT

stabbed September 3 by a party of Chinese who burst into his home and attacked him.

Japanese navy officials in Shanghai declared they would be forced to act unless the Chinese subdued their rebellious countymen at Pakhol who oppose the landing of the investigating agents.

Previous reports declared rebels from the old 19th army were leading the opposition against the Japanese and had also expressed strong determination to oppose a Chinese investigation ordered by the Nanking government.

NANKING, China, Sept. 15.—(AP)—China's foreign minister, General Chang Chun, declared today the national government was ready to make "reasonable amends" for the mob killings of Japanese nationals at Chengtu and Pakhol within the last month.

Asked what sort of settlement Nanking was prepared to make, Gen. Chang Chun replied cryptically: "The international relations of history afford us examples of what statesmanship, in such circumstances, would consider a reasonable settlement."

How Party Chiefs See Maine Results

response throughout the nation," the presidential nominee added, terming the election "significant."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The few senators and congressmen in the capital today viewed the Maine election this way:

Senator Pranger, (R., N. D.): "I expected the state to go Republican. It is normally Republican, and I believe things are swinging back towards normalcy."

Senator Thomas, (D. Okla.): "The result was to be expected. Nobody is surprised and no Democrat is disappointed. Maine is a Republican state and it is natural that the voters should express their party sentiments. Maine has got on its feet and there is a tendency on the part of the voters to fall back to their old party lines."

Senator Hull, (D. Fla.): "I am not disturbed by the returns. The news papers supported the Republican cause and they are powerful moulders of public opinion. I assume the prolific writers so muddled the waters that many people thought the world would come to an end if they voted Democratic. I don't think it will have any effect on the election in November."

Representative Fuller, (D. Ark.): "The Maine returns are indicative of Democratic success. The state normally is overwhelmingly Republican. The reduced Republican majority in the senate race showed growing approval of the present administration, as for the representatives, we knew we had no chance to elect them anyway."

Attorney General Cummings, had this to say: "The result is distinctly encouraging to the friends of the administration throughout the country."

Republicans See Oregon Victory

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Republican leaders, gathering to plan the final weeks of the presidential campaign, prefaced their meeting today with National Chairman John D. M. Hamilton with predictions of victory in Oregon and other western states.

L. E. Blandine of McMinnville, Ore., secretary of the Oregon state central committee, was quoted in a statement from national headquarters as predicting his state would return a majority for Landon and Knox.

KEROSENE HURLED ON LETTUCE LOAD

SALINAS, Cal., Sept. 15.—(AP)—A milling crowd of about 500 men and women pickets hurled kerosene in three truckloads of lettuce today and were driven back by a tear gas shell fired by a special policeman.

The violence in the strike of about 3,200 lettuce shed workers occurred as the truckloads of lettuce were driven into a barricaded shed under protection of armed guards and highway patrolmen.

Cutting of the lettuce by Filipino and Mexican workers began at 5 a. m., with guards protecting the workers in fields on the Everett Knowlton and Kondo ranches, about three miles south.

FILM FOLK TO PAY THALBERG HONORS

SANTA MONICA, Cal., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Friends and associates of the late Irving Grant Thalberg, who started the film industry as a "boy wonder" and who lived to be one of its master producers, will gather tomorrow to pay him final tribute.

Funeral services for the 37-year-old production head of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios, who died yesterday from lobar pneumonia after a brief illness, have been set for some time tomorrow. The exact time and place are to be announced later today.

His widow, Norma Shearer, whom he elevated from obscurity to stardom before he married her, was in seclusion today, prostrated with grief. The death of Thalberg ended one of Hollywood's most successful marriages.

LEMKE WOULD CHANGE COURT IF NECESSARY

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 15.—(AP)—With a warning against "the present system of economic slavery," Rep. William Lemke, union party presidential candidate, turned toward the mid-west today after closing his west coast campaign with thrills at the major parties in speeches here and at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.

Departing from his prepared text here last night, the union party nominee declared, "If I have to, I'll appoint a few liberal judges to the supreme court in order to get certain legislation on the statute books."
