

Army Of Hunters Ready For Deer Season Opening Sunday Morning

**BEST CONDITIONS
IN YEARS PREVAIL
IN FORESTS HERE**

**Authorities Issue Warnings
to Be Sure of Target Be-
fore Squeezing Trigger—
Big Buck Prizes Posted**

Hundreds of hunters will pack their artillery Saturday night in preparation for the opening of the 1936 deer season at dawn Sunday morning. Sporting goods stores report the largest sale of new and used rifles since 1929, hunting licenses have been sold by the hundreds, ammunition has been laid in, and all signs point toward the largest battery of gunners in years.

Reports as to the number of deer this year are vague, as they always are until the first hunters have reported back with their kills. Several spots in southern Oregon will draw their quotas of snipers, with the Fish Lake country, the Green Springs, the Applegate, Elk creek, Evans creek and Prospect districts all having their quotas.

State police, game authorities and other officers have issued blanket warnings to all hunters to be sure they are firing at a buck deer having at least a pair of horns before loosing their fire. Many inexperienced hunters will be in the woods and the danger of killing another hunter while shooting at moving brush is ever present, it was warned.

Hunting conditions are expected to be ideal. The rain of a few days ago, which carried a day longer in the hills than it did in this valley, has softened the earth and taken much of the crackle out of underbrush and twigs lying on the ground. Leaves are bedded down nicely in most sections and the footing is expected to be much quieter than it has been for the opening day of the last several seasons.

The storm in the high areas will probably have driven the deer down to lower levels, and the hunting on high mountain ranges is not expected to be good.

Many hunters from Medford and the Rogue River valley will travel to eastern Oregon for the opening day, in the hope of bringing back a mule deer. The eastern Oregon hunters will probably travel from here in parties of from three to ten as has been the custom in past years.

Sunday will undoubtedly be the heaviest day of the season, with many of those in this district hunting black-tails staying out for only one day. The parties going to eastern and central Oregon will probably remain a week or longer.

Two Medford firms, Lamport's Sporting Goods and the Hubbard Hardware, are offering prizes for the biggest blacktail and the biggest mule deer shown. The contests are expected to enliven the season greatly.

The tournament was the windup of the one for ladies started as a feature of the recent southern Oregon-northern California amateur classic which was won by Mrs. Belle Thompson, who turned back Mrs. Dorothy Black of Livermore, Calif.

The southern Oregon women's championship matches will be held some time in October, it was announced yesterday.

THREE AMERICANS AND SCOTCHMAN IN SEMI-FINAL ROUND

**McLean Is First Overseas
Golfer Since 1928 to Make
Real Bid for United
States Amateur Honors**

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 18.—(AP)—Three jacks and a "poker" remained in the deck today as the U. S. amateur golf championship approached the showdown.

Two American jacks, Goodman and Fischer, matched wands in the semi-final at 36 holes, while a union jack, the 25-year old Scottish whisky salesman who doesn't drink, McLean, drew the 42-year old George Voight in the other match.

First Since 1928

The passage of McLean, who made his first American showing in the Walker cup matches at the Valley, N. Y., two weeks ago, to the semi-finals made it the best advance an overseas contender has achieved since 1928 when Phil Perkins went down to a crushing 10 and 9 defeat before Georgia's great Bobby Jones in the final.

Beating his spectacular march through the first six rounds of the hilly-turf tournament, McLean, the sandy haired Scot, was a strong choice to hurdle Voight and gain the final against either Goodman or Fischer with Omaha Johnny favored to beat Cincinnati Johnny.

Makes No Mistakes

"McLean is not so long as Goodman or Fischer of the tee, but he has a sound and compact three-quarter swing and makes no mistakes," said Willie MacParlane, one of the shrewdest judges of the game. "He makes no mistakes and apparently can't be erratic. You can almost always depend on him to patch par. Only a real golfer will beat him and I don't think Voight is strong enough or has the strokes to do it." McLean was two under par for 31 holes yesterday.

MacParlane would be strong for McLean in final against Fischer, but if Johnny Goodman beats his midwestern rival, as is expected, Willie would switch his choice to Goodman to win the title and become Lawson Little's successor.

2 FULLBACKS BATTLE FOR SPOT AT OREGON

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 18.—(AP)—The battle between the veteran Bud Goodin and 203-pound Jean Baptiste Lacau for fullback and tomorrow's University of Portland-Pacific university grid game in Portland held the attention of University of Oregon grid fans today.

Lacau, star of last year's frosh team, has been giving Goodin plenty of competition in practice.

Oregon plays Portland here next Friday night and coaches are looking to tomorrow's game to give an inkling of the downstate team's power.

FIVE KAYOES PEP FIGHTS; GRUNTS GO TO HUBKA, PRINCE

Five knockouts in five fights, something of a record in local boxing circles, featured last night's CCG card at the Elks' picnic grounds. The 3-C battlers, fresh from a summer's lay-off from fighting, tore into each other with more enthusiasm than good judgment and delighted the crowd with a series of kayoes.

Eugene Ellis, 150, of Selad, knocked out Clarence Meester, 151, Oak Knoll, in the main event of the card which had everything from comedy to high drama. Jess Avila, 137, Selad, knocked out Al Lubin, 133, Annie Springs, in another feature event.

Billy Chapman, 129, Bonanza, measured Julius Braun, 130, Annie Springs, in the first round of their scheduled three-rounder, and Braun's seconds experienced some difficulty in bringing the boy around. He was reported well and happy today, however.

Frank Kidd, 131, Annie Springs, who made such an impression on the flaccid crowd last spring, came through to knock out Sammy Curren, 131, of Selad in the second round. Wally Ames, 127, Prescott, knocked out Bob Welch, 130, Oak Knoll, also in the second round.

In the wrestling matches that climaxed the evening, Joe Hubka again demonstrated the effectiveness of his somewhat bottoms-up hold in downing George Craig one fall. Craig attempted only one avul flip, which missed. The bout was a fast one, both grapplers trying to keep warm.

Prince Silki Mihalakis forgot to bring his shoes to the ring, and wrestled barefooted against Pat O'Brien. When the Irishman persisted in attempting to dislocate one of the Arabian's pedal digits, Mihalakis got sore and threatened him with flying mares and a camel lock.

SOUTHERN OREGON FOOTBALL SEASON GETS UNDER WAY

The southern Oregon football season by for the time being, gets into stride tonight and tomorrow, with Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and Ashland each taking on a not too dangerous opponent.

Grants Pass will meet Dunsmuir at Grants Pass for the first game in the new lighted field tonight. Many from Medford expect to go to the Climate City for the game, the first under lights in the Rogue valley.

Klamath Falls opens the campaign against Bud McDonald's Lakeview eleven at Klamath Falls, also under lights. The Pelican team, expected to give Medford the toughest game of the season when the two meet here October 31, is made up largely of inexperienced men in the line. With a fast, heavy and experienced backfield, Coach Les Arvitt hopes to be able to play his second string against Lakeview in an effort to build up his reserve strength.

Ashland will be the only southern Oregon team playing tomorrow. They will meet Crescent City at Ashland.

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GIANTS RUN WILD AGAINST DODGERS FOR 17-3 VICTORY

Now that the Giants are getting around to backing up Bill Terry for the first time in three years, they're apparently out to make it unanimous. First off, they're supporting him so well that they're virtually assured him a pennant winner this season. Now they have gone a step further and just about proved him right in regard to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

As a result, the Giants put on their heaviest hitting and run-making spree of the year, walloped five Brooklyn pitchers for 23 hits and a 17-3 victory, and took a commanding five-game lead over the rest of the National league pack.

With the second-place Cardinals and third-place Cubs idle, the victory made it virtually an impossibility to overtake Terry's troupe. With only ten games to play, they need only .500 ball the rest of the way. Here's the set-up as of today:
