AGRICULTURAL LAW NEEDS CODIFYING. SALEM, Sept. 19.-(AP)-Need for codification of the laws governing the administration of agricultural activities in Oregon was pointed out in a memorandum submitted to the governor by the legislative interim committee on governmental and administrative reorganization.

The laws at the present time are conflicting and some under the consolidation act of 1931 are unconstitutional, the report stated. The need for codification, the committee pointed out, was to clarify these situations. It was suggested the work be done by the director of agriculture and the attorney general for submission to the 1937 legislature.

The 13 various departmental functions were consolidated under a director of agriculture during Governor Meier's administration.

BURKE FREED BY JOSEPHINE JURY OF ROGUE DEATH

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 19.-(AP)-Clarence Burke, accused of the first degree murder of Roland Burr two years ago and a fugitive under an assumed name until his recent arrest, was a free man today.

After deliberating five hours and ten minutes, a jury last night returned a verdict of acquittal and Judge H. D. Norton ordered him freed. "I can readily see grounds for such a verdict," Judge Norton said. "This has been one of those cases where there was very reasonable doubt, and some of the testimony has been obscure."

Burke said he will not go back down the Rogue river to his gold mine 45 miles northwest of Grants Pass or to the site of the cabin, now burned, where Burr was killed and Burr's partner, Martin Jennings, wounded. Burr's body was later found in the river.

Burke claimed he found Jennings and Burr in his cabin after he had warned Jennings to keep away. Defense witnesses established that Jennings had a reputation as a thief and "claim jumper," and that Burke's reputation was good.

Defense was based primarily on credibility of Burke and Jennings, and of Burke's right to defend his property, counsel declaring that a jury of miners of the district would certainly acquit him. There, it said, where food and tools must be carried on foot for many miles, property has increased importance.

It made no attempt to show how Burr met his death except that he was with Jennings. District Attorney Sherman S. Smith lost his first plea for hanging as he demanded "the rope" for Burke. He told the jury that not even when Bowles and Barrier killed State Officer Baucum several years ago did he ask for hanging.

The verdict was reached under the law in effect at the time Burr was killed, requiring unanimous decisions of murder and manslaughter cases. The jury was once called back to be given the revised instructions after Judge Norton first said a majority of ten would be sufficient in the lesser degrees.

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VANDENBERG HITS SPENDING, FARLEY, NEW DEAL PLANS

NEW BRITAIN, Conn., Sept. 19.-(AP)-Senator Arthur L. Vandenberg (R., Mich.) asserted today that "congress is utterly money dumb" in its spending of public funds.

"It has no more concern for a million dollars than Mr. Farley (James A. Farley, Democratic national chairman) has for a Jefferson Democrat," he said in an address prepared for delivery at the opening of the Connecticut state campaign at Lake Compounce.

Declaring congress had spent millions largely to the discretion of the president and his bureaucrats. On one debating occasion, the president, asking for three billion, actually has the temerity to say 'I suggest that you appropriate it to me.' And congress did!

"Although this autocratic process is highly familiar abroad, this was the first moment in American history when the personal pronoun began to dominate our democracy."

The senator charged that the president had failed in his inaugural promise to "put our national house in order and make income balance outgoing," and intimated "the treasury is become chiefly a device for manufacturing debt, while Santa Claus writes checks and Pollyanna pays for them."

"Upon my responsibility as a senator," said Senator Vandenberg, "I state to you my deep conviction that the Roosevelt party and Roosevelt spending - unless sharply interrupted next November - will bring you to the end of what the president himself described as 'the road to bankruptcy.'"

He said "Democrats no longer can recognize the Roosevelt New Deal party as their own."

"It is a new party - a third party - without fixed principles, as demonstrated by its own basic concept for its wholly broken promises of 1932," the senator charged.

PENSACOLA MAYOR FOR ALF - OUSTED. PENSACOLA, Fla., Sept. 19.-(AP)-Pensacola was majority today after a surprise ouster of its pro-Landon executive and the death of his "strong Democrat" successor.

Meeting in an unheralded session last night, the city council voted to replace Mayor H. Clay Armstrong, whose announced decision to support the Republican national candidate aroused Democratic leaders.

"I assure you gentlemen you have elected a good strong Democrat," Will L. Moyer said, when his council colleagues voted him into the \$25 a week office. He was stricken by a fatal heart attack a few minutes later.
