HIGH SCHOOL HAS 10 PER CENT GAIN IN REGISTRATION

Registration figures at the Senior high school yesterday afternoon showed a total of 881 students attending classes at the present time, which is an increase of about 10 percent over enrollment at the end of the third week last year. Principal C. G. Smith pointed out that these figures cannot be taken as complete by any means, as many of the students are still employed in the fruit harvest and will be for several days. Between 60 and 70 of the students registered last year who are expected to return this fall have not reported as yet.

Girls outnumber boys 342 as against 518, which is about the same proportion existing last year. Smith said. The junior class, with 148 boys and 118 girls, is the largest in the school. This is due, Smith explained, to the fact that mid-year students must drop back into junior classification each year in order to graduate in June instead of January, which the greater number elects to do.

The sophomore class follows the junior in size with 92 boys and 121 girls, the seniors trailing with 73 boys and 108 girls. Post-graduate students number 26. It was noted that only the senior class has any appreciable amount of unit action and organization, and that the others are frequently shifting about according to total credits so that class distinctions have become comparatively unimportant in the last few years.

For the first time in several years Spanish is being taught in the Medford schools this year. A beginning class was organized in the Junior high school with the senior high to follow next year. The geology lecture course instituted at the Senior high school last year as a semester class has been extended over the entire year with B. R. Finch as instructor.

Enrollment in other city schools has also been increasing since opening date but exact figures are not available at present.

TO FILE CHARGE IN AUTO TRAGEDY

A complaint charging involuntary manslaughter was to be filed today by the district attorney against Maurice James (Jimmy) French, held in the county jail as the driver of the automobile in which Miss Edith Barry of Adel, Oregon, was killed last Saturday night, when the car hurtled from the Pacific highway, a short distance north of Jackson Hot Springs.

A coroner's jury sitting at Ashland, Monday afternoon, found that French was driver of the death car. Liquor and excessive speed were fixed by the coroner's jury as cause of the accident.

Relatives of French living in Josephine county, appeared yesterday and sought his release on bonds. The district attorney said the minimum recommendation for bonds would be \$2500.
