

BANNER YEAR IN HEALTH WORK IS COUNTY OUTLOOK

Miss Carlton, President of Association Reveals Plans At First Fall Health Meeting — Reports Are Read

Advancements in public health work, indicative of the "banner year" predicted for Jackson county in 1936-37 by Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the Jackson County Public Health Association, were revealed yesterday at the first fall meeting of the association, held at the county courthouse.

Reports from health officer, nurses and community chairman. Introduced by an inspiring message from Miss Carlton, whose illness has necessitated her prolonged absence from the association, reports revealed: Jackson county will have a sanitary inspector, assuming duty October 1, a fourth nurse on the public health staff, beginning January 1, and extensive programs in health work in all corners of the county.

Hayes in Training The sanitary inspector, James C. Hayes, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. James C. Hayes, is now taking advanced work in California, through provisions of Social Security. Half his salary will be paid by the United States.

government through Social Security legislation, and half by the county and the health association. Dr. C. I. Drummond, county health officer, reported. The fourth nurse, to be added to the county public health staff, will receive her entire salary through Social Security. The position has not been assigned. The three nurses, now serving the county, will continue in their present capacities with Miss Blanche Runnels continuing as supervisor.

Words of praise for Oregon and Jackson county were heard in reports of both Dr. Drummond, who spent the summer studying at the Harvard university school of public health on scholarship from the Rockefeller foundation, and Miss Runnels, who received a scholarship to the University of California for advanced public health study through Social Security. Both stated that Oregon and this county were outstanding in health work, when compared with other localities. Represented, New England, Dr. Drummond stated, is paying much more for her rural public health program and receiving results inferior to Jackson county's. He found programs costing two or three times as much money as is allotted for the work here with many more nurses on duty. The clinics, held there, however, which he visited on field trips, he said, were not patronized to the extent that they are here. City health departments, he stated, are well operated except for intrusion of politics.

Land's Harvard School The Harvard school of public health, he listed as one of four in the world to devote all time to public health. Eminent physicians from all corners of the world were on the summer staff. The health chairman of the League of Nations also addressed the students. Great strides and important changes in the prevention of disease were noted by Dr. Drummond, all students having access to the medical school.

Miss Runnels, who was one of 80 nurses from the United States studying at California under Social Security provisions, said she found Oregon and Jackson county outstanding in their public health endeavors when comparing programs with other public health nurses.

Enthusiastic reports, revealing ambitious programs, outlined for the new year, were made by the following community chairman: Miss Helen Bullis, Medford; Mrs. Elwood Hed-

berg, Ashland; Mrs. R. H. Wilcox, Phoenix; Mrs. Lively, Gold Hill; Mrs. John Hamaker, Jacksonville; Mrs. Charles Taylor, Central Point; Mrs. Fred Middlebush, Prospect; Mrs. Glen Spurlin, Sams Valley; Mrs. P. Corning Kenly reported progress of the dental clinic.

Mrs. Fuller Presides The meeting was called to order by Mrs. J. H. Fuller of Ashland, vice-president of the association, and Mrs. R. E. Green presided as program chairman.

Greetings from each member, with a promise of united work to carry out the health program, anticipated by her, in the inspiring message sent the association, were extended Miss Carlton with an expression of sincere regret at her prolonged absence from her organization. Her message was read by Mrs. J. E. Schuler, Mrs. J. C. Wells, representing Mrs. Lewis Ulrich, presided as secretary of the meeting.

The program was followed by a social hour, during which tea was served by the Phoenix committee.

The tournament is expected by Kenneth S. Wood, debate instructor, to increase interest in debate as an activity and serve as training for prospective members of the school team.

CCC MEN, TERM UP, DEPART FOR EAST

The first of the special trains carrying CCC enrollees to their homes in the east and middle west for discharge at the end of the present enrollment period was to leave the Medford district today.

The train was to take 158 fifth corps area men from the district to Fort Knox, Ky., for discharge. It will pick up 49 men in the Redding district, 88 in the Sacramento district and 12 in the Fresno district en route.

Capt. Glen J. Key is in command of the train with Capt. Alvin M. Sibula of the Redding district as his assistant and Lieut. John M. Stanley, also of the Redding district, as train surgeon.

The men will be replaced by new enrollees from the fifth corps area.

tured Toledo were denied categorically. All the capital's newspapers urged the militia to stand resolutely to "the end." One editorial said:

"The German soldiers who took Liege were not heroes who could boast of their victory. The Potsdam cadets who obtained that victory are filling pits around Liege with their dead bodies."

Waters Peril Munitions From the Alberche dam, more than 10,000,000 cubic yards of water rushed with tremendous force toward low ground, where much rebel war material and artillery was reported concentrated.

Bridges over the Alberche river, in the path of the flood, were believed indispensable to the insurgent advance on Madrid. The Alberche river skirts San Martin de Valdeiglesias on the north and east, separating it from both the Madrid and Toledo battle sectors.

Following a wide arc, it empties into the Tago river just east of Talavera de la Reina, insurgent stronghold.

TOKYO, Sept. 24.—Settlement of differences between China and Japan, heightened by the killing of a Japanese marine in Shanghai, was placed today in the hands of Shigeru Kawagoe, Tokyo's ambassador to Nanking. If Kawagoe fails to halt anti-Jap-

anese attacks, it was understood, the government of Emperor Hirohito would insist the dispute be tackled by Chiang Kai-Shek, military overlord of the central Chinese government.
