

"Subway Series" Will Be Reminiscent Of Famous Battle Of 1923

PUPIL OF MCGRAW DRAFTS STRATEGY TO STOP SLUGGERS

Yankees Still Operate On Theory That Home Run Is Best Strategy — Giants Retain Defense Feature

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The more or less terra-wracking approach of the New York Giants to the world series with the neighboring Yankees finds the dramatic outlook somewhat reminiscent of the last of three baseball wars fought out on opposite banks of the Harlem river in 1923.

Instead of the battle of wits between the most famous of all master minds, John Joseph McGraw, and the greatest of all sluggers, Babe Ruth, this year's strategy finds a pupil of the old master, William Harold Terry, devising strategy to meet the slugging ensemble led by Larapping Lou Gehrig, the new home run king.

Terry and his infield mate, Travis Calvin Jackson, were just two young fellows being ripened for regular duty when the last "subway series" was played. Giants Wait Breaks.
The Giants, possessing a brand of power that fades somewhat by comparison, still play "McGraw baseball." They aim for the breaks, feature a tight defense, and rely upon the resources of a pitching staff headed by the great Carl Hubbell. Under Terry's scheme of operation, Hubbell occupies much the same role as the talented Arty Nehf did for McGraw. Both rank with the great southpaws of post-war days. Hubbell, rated off his marvelous 1935 season, belongs among the all-time flinging craftsmen.

It remains to be seen whether one great moundsman can carry the Giants to victory in the world series. Except for the veteran knuckle-baller, Freddy Fitzsimmons, the National League has no other pitcher who now appears capable of giving the celebrated exponent of the screwball much support.

The presence of Hubbell in the box, however, will make the Giants favorites for the opener next Wednesday at the Polo Grounds. If he measures up to expectations, the occasion also may see the end of the Yankee winning streak in world series competition.

EBERHART FINDS WORLD OF TALENT FOR SONS SQUAD

Enough Candidates for Three Full Teams Answers First Grid Call — Seven Lettermen Are Back in Fold

ASHLAND, Sept. 24.—(Sp.)—Three full teams of husky grid talent answered Coach Joan Eberhart's call to arms Monday as Southern Oregon Normal's SONS officially opened their 1936 practice schedule.

With the start of school Monday, Eberhart's squad was increased by almost a full eleven, giving the SONS, in direct contrast to last year, plenty of good reserve strength.

Returning for their second year under the former university of Oregon basketball star, are seven lettermen. Arba Ager, line backer from Portland; Hedrich Baughman, former Ashland high center; Everett Sandberg, center from Reedsport; Percy Williamson, lanky end from Hayward, California; Justin Carey, Coquille, tackle; Bob Dusenberry, quarterback from Cottage Grove and Clyde "Tubby" Dickinson, a full-back letterman of two years ago.

Along with the above letter winners of last year's fairly successful team are high school stars from almost every point in Oregon. Jim McBride, a 192-pound, six-foot-four, end from Franklin high of Portland is one of the most promising of the lot.

Another player, who according to Eberhart will bear watching, is Ken Schilling, last year's Ashland high-captain. Because of his rather small size for an end, Eberhart has been working him at one of the wide open halfback jobs.

In the entire squad's opening workout Monday, Eberhart has two teams going through dummy drill at each other for over an hour. Lining up for the first eleven, which may be a fairly accurate criterion of the starting team October 3, were Lawrence Kaiser, and McBride at the ends; Walter Rutherford, 193, from Glandale and Bob Napier, 192, from Klamath Falls at the tackles; Van Diver and McNeely at the guards and letterman Everett Sandberg at center. The backfield was composed of Cornett, quarterback; Arba Ager and Harry Skjersaa, from Bend, halfbacks; and Dickinson at full.

On the second team were Behl and Bushnell at the ends; Jack Rhodes and the huge 263-pound Harry Johnson from Eugene at the tackles; Ronald Weighbright, former Ashland high, and Hagland at the guards and Baughman, center. Back of that line were Bob Dusenberry, quarterback; Ken Schilling and Allen Eoselstrom from Reedsport, halves; and Al Simpson, Eureka, California, at full.

The SONS this year will follow the same colorful system of attack they employed last season. In addition to the backfield shift, Eberhart will have his entire line with the exception of the center hop step into intricate formations. Although it is too early to make predictions, it appears that Arba Ager will take care of the throwing end of the SONS' aerial attack, and Cornett the kicking end.

WOLFE UNDAUNTED BY PROSPECT OF FLIGHT ON CHICK'S WINDMILL

Lex Wolfe, the fair-haired boy of the wrestling game, who turned bad man two weeks ago against Prince Mihalakis, still has a touching faith in his figure-4 hook scissors, the one grip that he possesses which is considered dangerous. The Texan clashes with big Dude Chick in the main event at the Army Monday night, and he announced today that Chick's spin holds no terrors for him for the simple reason that Chick won't be able to hold him for the long ride.

"My hook scissors is a better hold than Chick's spin because I can put it on from any position," Wolfe said today. He intimated that he would grab the big cowpoke with the grip at the start of the match and squeeze his insides out of shape so effectively that Chick won't be able to spin a good yarn when he gets through.
