

RECOVERY CURBED BY PRICE BOOSTS, KNOX COMPLAINS

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 25.—(UP)—Frank Knox, Republican vice presidential nominee, concluded his campaign tour of western states here last night with the assertion that "rise in the cost of living" under the new deal is holding back recovery. Earlier in the day at Colorado Springs he delivered the most bitter personal attack upon President Roosevelt of his entire coast to coast stumping trip.

"Within the last three years," Knox said at Colorado Springs, "we have seen a man, drunk with power, try to break down fundamental principles of government. You have seen him seek to allocate to himself all legislative authority. You have seen him reduce to a rubber stamp the consent of the United States. You have seen the contempt in which he sought to bring the decisions of the supreme court. You have seen before your very eyes a man seeking to break down this division of power and take it upon himself—yes and confess it."

"I warn you to be on your guard, because liberty in America is being challenged. Silently in the night they are creeping up, seeking to impose upon us before we realize it, a new and alien kind of government."

At a press conference Knox, questioned about the reaction of the voters through the territory in which he had been traveling, was enthusiastic.

MINERAL SURVEY MEETING TOPIC

Two important issues, a mineral survey similar to that now under way in Douglas county for all counties in southern Oregon, and the proposed state bureau of geology and mining, will be the chief topics of discussion at the regional mining and mineral conference to be held in Roseburg, Saturday, October 3.

Governor Martin will be present for all of the conference, and with others will spend some time inspecting the actual work of the Douglas county mineral survey. Governor Martin will also deliver the main address at the luncheon session to be held at noon.

Following the inspection of the Douglas survey, representatives of each of the six southern Oregon counties—Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Jackson and Josephine—will answer the question, "Will a Mineral Survey Be of Value to My County?" It is expected that actual steps to get some of these surveys under way will be discussed at this time.

United States in 1895, residing at St. Paul, Minn., for eight years, and came to Medford in 1908.

He leaves to mourn his departure one daughter, Mrs. Mona E. Macpherson, and one granddaughter, Mona Therese Macpherson, of this city; also one sister, residing in England.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Sacred Heart Catholic church Tuesday at 10 a. m. Father Francis W. Black officiating. Interment will take place in the Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery. Recitation of the Rosary will be held at the Perl funeral home Monday evening at 7:30.

Find Missing Truck At Bottom Of River

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Discovery of a railway express agency truck in the Willamette river cleared up a three-weeks' mystery here. The truck, still in second gear and with the ignition on, was hoisted to shore, A. C. McClure said the vehicle, which apparently had been struck by a ship as it lay in the river, disappeared from a parking place September 4 while it was being used to haul merchandise from the Blumauer-Frank Wholesale Drug company at which a teamsters' strike has been in progress.

claring they would shut down after September 30 unless sufficient men appeared at the docks for work.

Harry Bridges, district president of the International Longshoremen's association and fiery leader in the 1934 strike, declared the maritime unions would fight to retain the halls.

Expect Trouble.

He declared the employees were proceeding with preparations in the expectation there would be "trouble."

He offered, however, to continue work under the present agreement pending further negotiations.

McGrady also stated he would offer his services in efforts to settle the dispute, while E. P. Marsh and E. H. Fitzgerald, labor department conciliators here, appealed to employers and union leaders to "co-operate in preventing a stoppage of work and commerce on October 1."

The employers have notified the

unions they will consider the agreements terminated on September 30 unless the matter is submitted to arbitration.

In preparation for an expected tie-up in shipping, trade has boomed and heavy cargoes are moving into coastal ports.

Large quantities of canned goods were being purchased by housewives in the Hawaiian Islands and in coast cities in expectation of a possible food shortage.

TAVERN KEEPER KILLED BY AUTO

THE DALLES, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—State police said today that Nicholas Pappas, tavern proprietor, was struck and killed early today by a car driven by Walter Stevens of The Dalles.

Police said that in making the first report of the accident Stevens said his car was being driven by Wayne Kensington. The state officers said he later admitted he was driving the automobile. Police said manslaughter charges would be filed against one and possibly both of the young men.

Pappas was walking to The Dalles from his tavern two miles east of here when struck.

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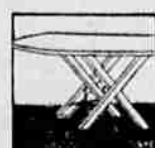
