

AMERICAN TRAVELERS GROWN SOPHISTICATED EUROPEANS DISCOVER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Commerce department officials today sized up the American travelers abroad and decided that he isn't what he used to be.

At one time, remarked Charles E. Lyons, chief of the department's European information section, Americans abroad were "innocents" who "left a trail of gold dollars."

But now: "That day is past, and they are as sophisticated as any European traveler; they even expect to get their money's worth."

Lyons, who spent several years in Europe as one of the department's foreign representatives, said that "most American travelers are no longer tourists in the old sense" but are "largely business people on a fairly definite errand, some of them going abroad three or four times a year."

Although Americans are going abroad in large numbers this year, the total still is below the boom years of the twenties, when, Lyons said, pleasure seekers stopped at the best hotels or rented villas, patronized the best shops and restaurants "and rarely asked the price."

COLUMBIA STUDENTS SAY ADMINISTRATION DICTATORIAL, RUTHLESS

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The administration of Columbia University was called "arbitrary, dictatorial and ruthless" at a mass meeting of students today, called to protest the expulsion of Robert H. Burke of Yonkers, N. Y.

"There is not much difference," said James A. Wetmore, director of publications for the American Student Union, "to a spirited but orderly crowd of about 500, 'between the minds of the administration and those of Nazi leaders who control the German universities.'"

Although a strike of students to express their displeasure over refusal of Dean Herbert Hawkes to reinstate Burke as a student, had been discussed, no action was taken by the meeting to put one into effect.

Burke, who said he worked last summer for the John L. Lewis committee for industrial organization among the steel workers, also addressed the crowd, assembled before Hamilton hall.

He said he had apologized to President Nicholas Murray Butler "approximately six times" for disorderliness, but added: "The thing I refuse to apologize for is going to Dr. Butler's house to express an opinion."

Cougar Prowls On Williams Creek

WILLIAMS CREEK, Sept. 25.—(Spt.)—Reports of a large cougar prowling in this vicinity were given further credence last week when Mrs. Fay Mullen saw the animal early one morning on the outskirts of an old orchard on the Mullen place. The orchard is in an isolated section at the foot of a hill which is one of several leading to Sugarloaf mountain.

Bears are frequently seen in the orchard, having seemingly acquired a decided taste for the apples found there.

Poultry Industry Increase Is Seen

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—The force of economics as Williamette valley breaks into smaller farms is certain to bring an increase in the poultry industry to this state, A. S. Burrier, head of the farm management of Oregon State college, told the thirteenth annual Oregon Poultrymen's convention today.

Burrier, one of a dozen speakers on the one-day program, said that while the total acres of improved farm land in western Oregon remained nearly stationary the past 3 years the number of farms had nearly doubled.

War Hero's Estate Valued At \$20,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—The will of Major General Ulysses Grant McAlexander, retired, who died last Thursday, was admitted to probate today. The estate being estimated at \$20,000.

The chief beneficiaries are Perry H. McAlexander of Portland, a son, Tallmadge T. McAlexander, a grandson, and Adeline and Barbara Shaffer, daughter of Joel and Bertha Shaffer non-residents of Oregon.

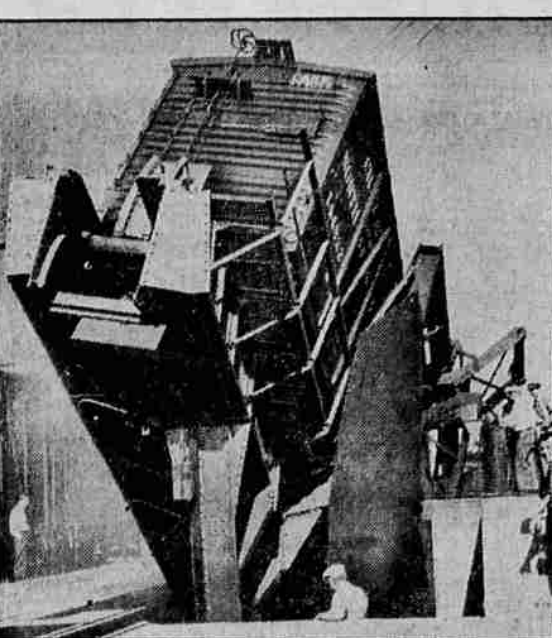
Eleven Indicted In Bank Shortage

ERIE, Pa., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A federal grand jury climaxed a long investigation of an alleged \$1,000,000 shortage in the Commercial National Bank of Bradford, Pa., today by indicting eleven persons.

Stenographers and bookkeepers were accused in a long list of charges along with some of their superiors. The 11,000 depositors, who had approximately \$4,485,000 in the bank, were protected by federal deposit insurance.

BOOTLEGGING PROBLEM/FAKE LIE DETECTOR SWITCHED TO CANADA USED ON STUDENTS BY AMERICAN REPEAL OF NEWARK SCHOOL

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The flying chief of Canada's famed "Mounties" — in 30 days he made an 11,000 mile inspection of posts which once required three years—declared here today that U.S. prohibition repeal turned the tables on Canada.

Whereas smugglers once swarmed the south, the tide has turned north until "get your man" now means get the bootlegger, said Maj. Gen. Sir James McTear, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., commander of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

"They constitute the most serious enforcement problem facing our country today," he asserted.

"In one six weeks period we seized 60 automobiles south of Montreal carrying contraband liquor. We have had the tables turned on us."

Sir James ascribed the development of rum running in the dominions to the difference in customs duties between the United States and Canada. "Rum runners are attempting to reap a harvest through the illegal liquor traffic," he said, "because of the higher duties imposed on liquor imports by Canada."

"Another factor is the manufacture of illicit liquor in the United States. An attempt is being made to smuggle much illegally distilled American liquor over the border to avoid paying custom duties."

FUNCTION OF ENZYMES VIEWED BY SCIENTISTS THROUGH NEW METHOD

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Yale university today solved the mystery of enzymes — invisible things which keep man's tissues alive — by showing one of them at work for the first time. The enzyme revealed itself as a mere chemical, gross in action as soap in water. For many years scientists suspected that enzymes were alive.

The university announced the enzyme action was made visible by Dr. Kurt G. Stern, visiting lecturer in physiological chemistry.

He used the enzyme catalase, a red colored protein plentiful in the liver and a spectroscopic to see the catalase in action in a transparent solution.

The catalase could be seen changing hydrogen peroxide into water and into gaseous oxygen. Although some steps in the transformation were too rapid for the eye, a photo-electric tube recorded them in fifths of a second.

All changes were observed in a test tube. The next step is to place in the tube the chemicals which the enzyme uses in the living body, and look at a life process enacted visibly under glass.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was on record today as believing it is a right and duty of citizens to make such contributions as they wish "toward the legitimate expenses of the political party in whose principles and leadership we have faith."

He replied to Democratic criticisms of Rockefeller contributions to the Maine Republican campaign in a letter.
