

AUGUST TRAFFIC TOOK HEAVY TOLL

SALEM, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Automobile fatalities during August increased 27 per cent above the number for the same month a year ago, the secretary of state announced when 33 deaths were reported for that period.

The August increase brought the year's total deaths to 155 as compared to 122 for the first 8 months of 1935.

Other figures dealing with traffic casualties increased accordingly. Persons injured last month stood at 782 for the year's total of 4948. Accidents reported were 3068 for an eight month's total of 19,150 in Oregon.

Thirteen of the fatalities were pedestrians, while eight were the result of non-collision accidents. Multnomah county led with seven deaths. Other fatalities were reported from Marion and Polk with three each; Clackamas, Lincoln and Yamhill, two each; and one each from Baker, Benton, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Harney, Jackson Josephine, Klamath, Lane, Linn, Morrow and Tillamook.

FEDERAL CONTROL OF RAILS FEARED

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Business and agricultural leaders carried away from the annual north-west advisory board session here a double caution against possible government control over the nation's railroads.

The advice came from a shipper and a railway executive. "Shippers must help the railroads protect themselves from further legislation which eventually will force government ownership," declared L. C. Newlands, of Portland, a cement company manager and new president of the board. "We want the railroads to remain in the hands of their stockholders."

Carl R. Gray, president of the Union Pacific Railway company, expressed the hope the government never again would operate the railroads.

The advisory board session, drawing nearly 700 persons, was primarily for railway and shipping interests to discuss fully their business prospects, and related problems.

JAILED SPINSTER BALKS AT FINE

RUTLAND, Vt., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Freedom for a slim, gray-haired woman, confined in a reformatory for the past 58 days because she failed to meet a court judgment of \$519 following an automobile accident, was deferred today for at least five more days.

Mary Cassidy, 73-year-old Poultony Spinster, was to seek permission before the county commissioners to take a poor debtor's oath—but the hearing was put over until Tuesday. Under a Vermont law, Miss Cassidy can be confined indefinitely unless she is permitted to take the oath or meets the judgment.

A farm she operates alone, she declared, is burdened with a mortgage, while her income is not sufficient to meet taxes and interest payments. Her milk truck was involved in an accident.

ARKANSAN INDICTED ON SLAVERY CHARGE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A federal grand jury investigating alleged peonage in east Arkansas returned an indictment late today against an unnamed defendant charging violation of the anti-slavery statutes of the United States.

U. S. District Attorney Fred Isgrig announced return of the indictment and said it named only one person. "The indictment charges abetting and abetting in holding a man in slavery," said Isgrig.

CHINA NEEDS SLAPPING SAYS JAP ARMY CHIEF

PEIPING, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Armed Japanese action against China was predicted today by Maj. Gen. Takayoshi Matsumuro, chief of the Japanese military mission at Peiping. "China is a bad boy needing coercion following the failure of more gentle methods," commented Matsumuro. "If he doesn't listen to Japan's peaceful lessons, he is likely to have his face slapped."

"Japan is determined to bring peace and order to China, if not in the entirety at least to North China."

POOR JUDGMENT SEEN IN HUNTING TRAGEDY

PRINEVILLE, Ore., Sept. 25.—(AP)—Max Ruef of Stayton came to his death as a result of an accident and "poor hunting judgment," a coroner's jury reported here. Ruef was wounded fatally Tuesday, in the woods between Prineville and Mitchell.

He was hunting with a neighbor, E. L. Castle. Coroner Percy Smith said testimony indicated a deer ran between the men.
