

ROOSEVELT MAY COME TO COAST ON SWING WEST

No Dates Or Places Definite Beyond Next Week's Syracuse-Pittsburgh Trip Many Speeches Planned

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 25.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today his first campaign swing into the west coast would end at Denver, but that he still might go to the west coast. Talking about his personal campaign plans for October at a press conference at the summer White House, the chief executive said no dates or places were yet definite beyond next week's Syracuse-Pittsburgh trip, but that he probably would announce his initial western trip next Wednesday in Washington. Like to Visit Coast

He said if conditions permitted he would like to visit the west coast, but that he would have to be determined when the time came to start the journey.

Previous to the press conference, White House officials had announced the president would make six speeches in New York, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and New Jersey next week.

Asked about his campaign conference late yesterday with 27 New Deal leaders and advisers, the president said they talked over all the various possibilities. He reiterated he did not want to get too far away from his Washington base on any campaign trip and that any plan made would be subject to cancellation on three minutes' notice.

Final Speech October 31
One new definite date announced was October 31 in New York harbor when the president will speak at Franco-American exercises celebrating the 50th anniversary of the dedication of the Statue of Liberty.

This came three days before his final pre-election speech at Madison Square Garden the night of October 31. President Roosevelt has sent a message of thanks to Alfred E. Smith for postponing his broadcast time the night of October 1, the White House staff disclosed.

The six addresses specifically set will be made at:
Syracuse, N. Y., shortly after 4 p. m., September 29, in laying a cornerstone for a new medical college at Syracuse university.
Syracuse, from 10:30 to 11 p. m., September 29, before the state Democratic convention. Officials said only state issues would be discussed.
Elkins, W. Va., about noon, October 1, where he will witness the coronation of the queen of the Mountain State forest festival in the amphitheater of Davis-Elkins college. Pittsburgh, 9 to 9:30 p. m., October 1.
Jersey City, N. J., 11 a. m., October 2, in dedicating a new medical center.
Long Island City, N. Y., 4 p. m., October 2 at ground-breaking ceremonies for the Queen-Midtown tunnel.

Between the last two ceremonies the president will attend a world series game in New York city. He will return to Hyde Park from Long Island City.
Cities tentatively discussed for Roosevelt speeches later in October included Denver, Omaha, Chicago, Detroit, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Buffalo, Albany, Rochester, Springfield or Worcester, Mass. The president will close his campaign in Madison Square Garden, New York, the Saturday before election.

CHINA'S DICTATOR TO TAKE CHARGE SHANGHAI AFFAIR

International settlement after an attack on three comrades Wednesday, moved into the Chinese district with pistols and rifles with fixed bayonets.
Search Foreigners
Traffic was limited on two main highways and even foreigners, driving to two golf courses north of the city, were stopped and searched.
Many foreign residents of Shanghai condemned the Japanese action strongly but the only reply was "We must protect our nationals."
Three Chinese suspects were brought into a Chinese court for preliminary hearing in connection with the fatal shooting of one marine and the wounding of two others but no definite facts were disclosed during the court session.
The Japanese patrol lines in the Hongkew area were shortened slightly as the marines marched into the Chinese district.
The highest Japanese authorities representing the Tokyo foreign office, war and navy ministers, were summoned to a secret conference, the nature of which they declined to disclose.
Representatives of the armed Japanese forces, however, declared loudly from the "period of conferences is over. From here on their will be nothing but action."

brought to the front from Torrijos to prepare for heavy fighting.
Another fascist army, pushing along the main highway to Madrid, slowed up similarly in an attempt to consolidate its positions beyond Maqueda.
Loyal Losses Heats
Government losses in scattered engagements were declared heavy while the attacking insurgents suffered only a few casualties.
The retreating socialist troops abandoned quantities of war materials in hasty flight before the advancing insurgents, an official announcement declared.
Strong reinforcements of legionnaires and regular infantrymen joined the fascist drive after an enthusiastic send-off in the public square at Talavera. Soldiers and civilians sang patriotic hymns to the accompaniment of a military band.
Fascist commanders declared their planes dropped supplies of food and ammunition to besieged comrades in the raised Alcazar at Toledo toward whose rescue the insurgent advance is aimed.
(The headquarters report conflicted with government statements the fascist drive on Madrid and Toledo had been halted with a flood of water from the Alberche river dams.)
Plans Shifted
Aides of Gen. Francisco Franco, commander of the southern fascist army, said plans for the military campaign had been shifted to allow one column to push toward a point midway between Madrid and Toledo on the southern highway.
This change was made, they said, in an attempt to cut the capital from the provincial city.
(Official reports from Burgos, seat of the insurgent provisional government, declared the fascist troops on the southern battle line had advanced beyond Torrijos, on the road between Maqueda and Toledo.)
