Captain Of Zephyr

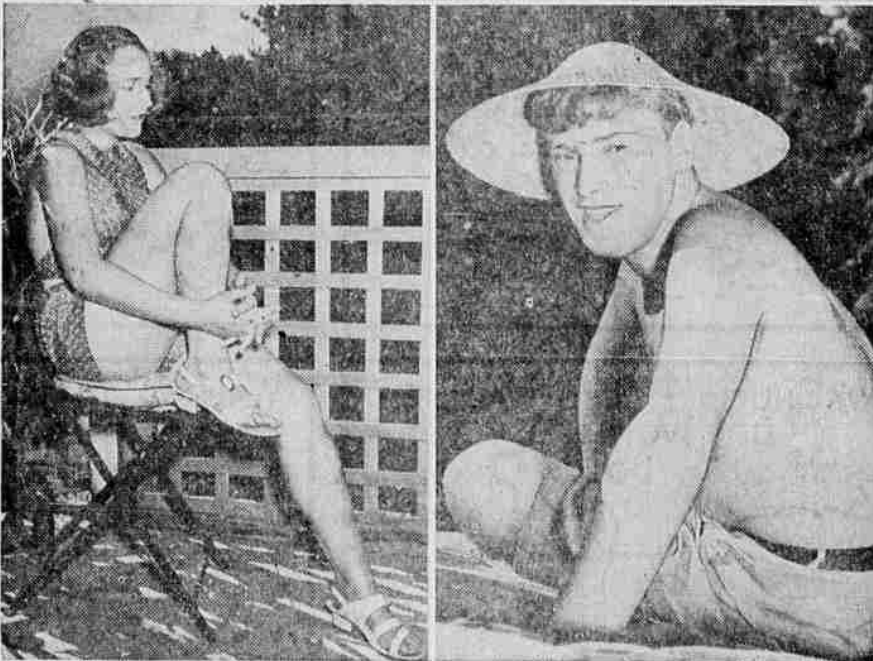

ST. MARY'S GAELS ON THE WARPATH



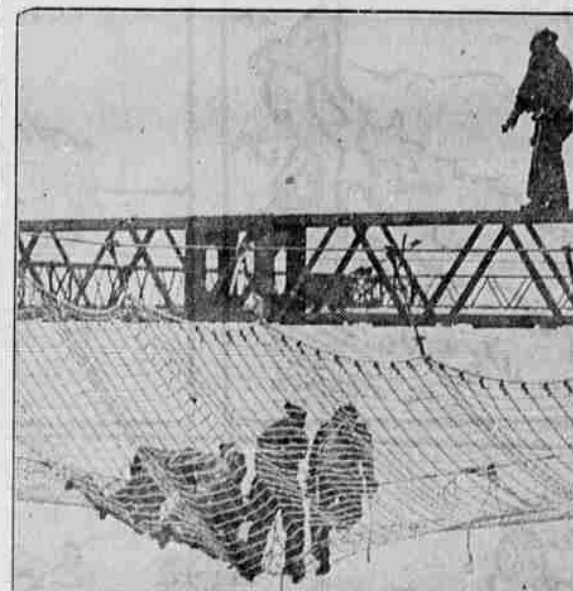
