To the Editor:

I am considerably surprised by the recent action on the part of James Stevens and Ralph Stephenson, the Democrat nominees for the legislature from this county, in their late endorsement, without qualifications of the "Townsend plan" and was equally surprised by the endorsement of these candidates by the members of the Townsend club.

According to such information as I have been able to secure, neither of these gentlemen seem to have ever before openly supported the Townsend movement or given any evidence of their sympathy with, or their belief in, the Townsend old age relieving pension plan. If either of them did believe that the "Townsend plan" was workable or worthy of support it is not strange that neither of them seem to have taken any active interest in the movement until they became candidates for the state legislature?

It seems quite apparent that the sudden action of Mr. Stevens and Mr. Stephenson in endorsing the plan, unqualifiedly, the day before the election, was merely a device to secure the endorsement of candidates for certain offices, in its itself very significant, and strongly suggestive that these two gentlemen may be more anxious for votes than they are sincere in their endorsement of principles.

Deer hunting in southern Oregon remained a hit and miss proposition through the week, with fewer killed so far than at a similar time last year by at least 50 per cent, a check-up Saturday showed.

The Applegate sector and the Umpqua divide country yielded an average crop of venison but other spots were poor. Sergeant Ed Walker, on game detail with the state police reported that the last rain had curled all the little twigs on the floor of the forests.

Increasingly dry weather has hardened the twice when now snap and crunch under the hunter's feet with the result that it is extremely difficult to surprise animals at close enough range for good shooting.

Eastern Oregon, a usually dry country, is no drier than usual and conditions there are more favorable to the hunter. Many big mule deer are being brought in almost daily and the Medford Joe and Storage Company is now holding about two dozen.

Lyle Durrell and Fred Manis, grogery tycoons, brought back a buck which dressed out at 153 pounds, also killed on the Applegate. It was a four pointer.

Most of the hunters who hope to try their luck near home are waiting for the first rain, a notion that coincides with the advice of the forest service to be extremely careful of camp fires with the woods in tinder condition.
