

Wolfe To Pit Scissors Against Cowboy Chick's Lariat Spin Tonight

DROP KICKERS TO DISPLAY WARES IN MIDDLE GRAPPLE

Backers of Rope-Legged Texan Look for Victory Over Chick—New Meanie Meets Prince in Opener

Tonight is the night that Les Wolfe, rangy Texan who turned naughty in two battles with Prince Mihalakis, faces Dude Chick in the main event wrestling match at the Armory, for what many believe will be his debut into the loss column in Medford, Wolfe, despite the knavery that turned hundreds of fans against him, may still boast backers, an informal survey over the week-end disclosed.

The figure-4 hook scissors with which the Texan has downed a dozen or more victims, is still believed by some to be effective enough to stop the big cowboy, and there are a few who believe that grip is the best ever seen here, in contrast to the majority holding that Chick's spin deserves the honors.

This much remains certain: The two have the longest victory records in Medford. To date Chick has not been hurt by any grip applied to him, and he has downed each opponent with almost monotonous regularity. The assumption that he will obtain Wolfe with the same treatment has swelled advance ticket sales to near record heights.

The middle event, the first meeting here of two drop-kick specialists, is stealing much of the main event's thunder, with Pete Belcastro, Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion, firing his number tens at the handsomeness of Gene Moore. The drop-kick is usually conceded to be the most spectacular attack in wrestling, and when two advocates meet, the results are expected to be revolutionary.

Belcastro won the coast crown largely through the effectiveness of his leg thrusts, and Medford fans have seen him down foe after foe with the attack. Last Monday they saw Moore unwind just one luscious kick to finish Pat O'Brien. What other tricks Moore possesses remain to be seen, for he has no chance to wrestle that evening.

A new blood-and-thunder meanie makes his bow to Medford in the opener, when Billy Burns, of Atlanta, Georgia, tries to flay Prince Mihalakis of Arabia. Not much is known of Burns other than reports that he is big, tough, and with an antipathy to clean grappling. The Aran may abandon the clean tactics that lost his two Wolfe matches, and go berserk, as he has on one or two previous occasions. The bouts start at 8:30.

BEAVERS WITHIN GAME OF TITLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 28.—(AP)—The Portland Beavers were within one game of the Pacific Coast league championship today following a 14-to-3 victory over Oakland here yesterday. It was Portland's third win in the title series.

One more success will give Portland the series, the championship and \$5000 bonus. The teams went to Oakland today, where the remaining games will be played, starting tomorrow.

Cracking out 21 hits, Portland made certain of the game in the eighth inning by driving home eight runs.

More than 10,000 persons, one of the largest crowds of the season, witnessed the contest. The spectators overflowed onto the playing field, making it necessary to establish special seating rules. A bit into the crowd went for a double and Portland walloped out 12 of these.

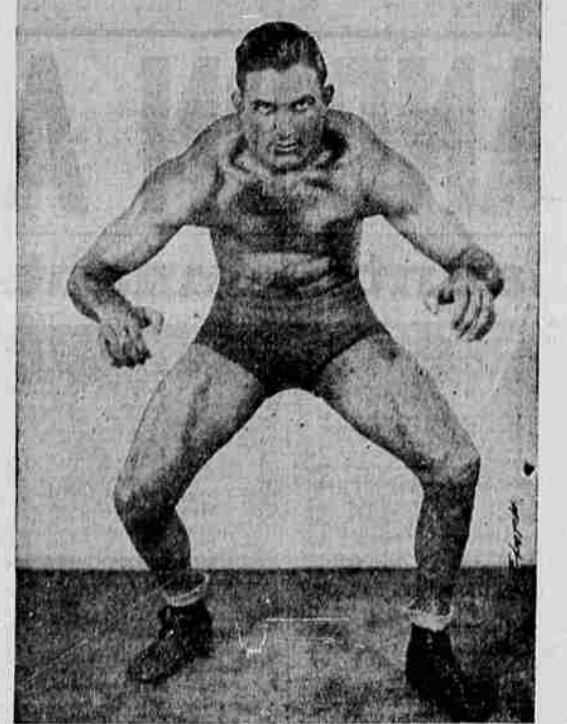
Wes Ludolph, the Oaks' top pitcher, was the victim of Portland's drive.

MID-WEST TOPS WEST ON GRIDS

(By the Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Far western football untangled itself today from the greatest opening pigskin scramble in its history to reveal a week-end of conquests and defeats which established mid-west football as superior to the coast variety and saw the downfall of the three-in-a-row Rose Bowl contender, Stanford university.

University of Minnesota's 14-to-7 defeat of the University of Washington in the country's most important inter-sectional clash settled for the time being long heard arguments as to whether the Big Ten or coast conference teams play a stronger brand of ball.

In a Sunday encounter St. Mary's college came from behind in the second half and defeated Gonzaga university, 28 to 15. The Gaels revealed crushing power, with a heavy yet pliable line. They drove through the buildings for 77 yards on one thrust 49 yards on another and 42 yards on a third.

YANKEES, GIANTS LOUD IN CLAIMS AS SERIES NEAR

Fans Expect Hubbell to Stop Yankees in Opener—Yanks Tops in Betting for Balance of Series

By Sid Feder Associated Press Writer. NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The opening shots on the world series were fired from the rival camps of the Giants and Yankees today, while the front offices dust off the "sold out" signs for reserved seat tickets.

The Yankees came right out and picked themselves and their batting power to take the series, starting Wednesday, in five games.

Bill Terry announced his probable starting lineup and put himself on record as backing his Giants to finish on top because of the old, old, baseball theory that good pitching can silence heavy hitting any time.

The Yankees will entertain the third, fourth and fifth games, scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, in their stadium on the opposite bank of the Harlem river.

In his pre-battle statement, Terry named his Giants for their "exceptional pitching," overlooking the Broadway betting odds of 11 to 20, up or down, with the Yankees favorite, and the fact that his number two pitcher, fat Freddy Fitzsimmons, looked in anything but championship form in the season's finale yesterday.

Terry also made it known that he's starting himself at first base in the opening game, which "King Carol" Hubbell is expected to pitch. The rest of his lineup will be unchanged.

Yank Pitcher Unchosen Manager Joe McCarthy, returning from Washington, left no one in on his starting lineup. Although the regular eight men will undoubtedly take the field as they have all season, the pitching problem is still up in the air. However, it was believed "El Senor Goofy" will have the call over big Red Ruffing to go against Hubbell in the first game.

Although the Yanks were favorites in every book, betting skyrocketed. Hubbell and the Giants—were listed to stop the Yanks in the opener, but that was the only bet on which the National leaguers were tops.

DON BUDGE WHIPS ENGLAND'S CHAMP

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 28.—(AP)—California's gift to American tennis, torch-topped Don Budge, moved on to a San Francisco tournament today, carrying a double victory over Fred Perry, England's world champion.

Battering through the Briton's off-form game in the Pacific southwest singles final, Budge also teamed with Gene Mako to trounce Perry and Francis X. Shields of Hollywood in the doubles Sunday.

The Red Comet from Oakland, beaten by Perry this year for the Wimbledon and United States titles, whizzed through him in four sets, 6-2, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3.

In the doubles, Budge and Perry broke Perry's service for the second time in the first set to win, 14-12, then took two more, 6-3, 6-0.

Another major upset of the finals was provided by Gracy Wheeler of Santa Monica when she edged out Alice Marble, national women's champion, 7-5, 2-6, 6-4.
