

### WALLACE STRAFES FREE COMPETITION POLICY OF LANDON

#### Secretary Says G. O. P. Agricultural Program Would Return Law of 'Tooth and Fang'—Defends Spending

APRORA, Ill., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace told a farm belt audience today that "free competitive enterprise" advocated by Gov. Alf M. Landon was "cut-throat competition," and "a system of agriculture operating for the most part according to the law of tooth and fang."

His address to the Chicago Pure Milk association, a cooperative dairy producers' group, was the first of five political speeches scheduled for this week in the corn belt.

Wallace said the Republicans had proposed a combination of the Smoot-Hawley tariff act and the federal farm board "as an agricultural program and that recent speeches by Landon had set forth "the governor's negative philosophy of farm policy."

Spending Defended. Farmers, he said, "have been made a special target for claims that the government is guilty of waste and extravagance which will burden future generations with debt."

"We have spent less than half our world war outlay for destruction of lives and property," Wallace said of recovery program costs, and added that the "net increase in the public debt" after allowing for "recoverable advances" was "about seven billions."

Wallace said this debt, addition would cost about \$1.40 a year in "carrying cost per person," and instead of reckless extravagance the expenditures for recovery look like the best investment in history.

Wallace said the administration plan for dairymen had involved a "three-way program" for removal of surplus; marketing agreements, and eradication of disease in cattle.

The first, he said, bridged "the gap between the great surpluses and the disastrous prices of farm products, on the one hand, and on the other the hunger of millions of city people who had no money to buy these surpluses."

Wallace said there was a campaign "to frighten people into believing that the government is promoting scarcity" and he termed this "non-sense." He contended that marketing agreements had increased milk producers' income by millions of dollars.

Wallace said the 1936 soil conservation program "tends to prevent cut-throat competition between dairy, beef cattle and pork producer groups, and to avert disastrous price slashing." Referring to Landon's statement that the act was a "subterfuge," the secretary said:

"The man who, posing as a political champion of the dairy industry, seeks to stir up ill will of dairymen toward other groups of farmers, aiming to create dissension among the groups, so as to discredit and destroy their co-operative program and make farmers return to unbridled competition—such a man is no friend of agriculture."

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### TAPS SOUNDS FOR ADMIRAL SIMS OF WORLD WAR FAME

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BOSTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—"Taps" will sound in Arlington national cemetery Thursday for Admiral William Sowden Sims, caustic tongued commander of America's European fleet in the World war.

Admiral Sims, who "taught the navy how to shoot," died here late yesterday at the age of 77, ending

after 14 years' retirement a career which President Roosevelt described as a "remarkable period of service to his country."

That service encompassed 42 years, during which Sims unsparringly attacked naval weaknesses, and frequently met attacks upon himself.

Burial in Arlington with all naval honors, will be the nation's final tribute to the man who refused a distinguished service medal in 1919 on the ground it had been awarded to others unwisely.

President Roosevelt, former assistant secretary of the navy, was "deeply grieved" at his Hyde Park home. He said Admiral Sims' death "marks the closing of a brilliant and colorful career in the navy, the end of a remarkable period of service to his country. Dynamic and forceful, he was admired and respected by friend and foe alike."

"He was the central figure in almost every great naval controversy during his time," Admiral William H. Standley, chief of naval operations, recalled after he learned of Sims' fatal heart attack. "The entire navy will deeply regret his passing."

Admiral Standley termed Sims "a stormy petrel, always battling for what he considered the good of the service." Josephus Daniels, war-time secretary of the navy, paid tribute to "one of the most brilliant officers in the American navy."

### MARSHALL GIVEN 20 YEARS IN PEN ON THREE CRIMES

Wesley and Ryan were first arrested and sentenced to the county jail for ten days for defrauding an Ashland pin-ball machine from which they obtained \$3.80.

Police records failed to show that Ryan had any previous contact with the law but revealed that Wesley had been held at Fort Beach, Cal., Fort Morgan, Colo., and Wichita, Kan., for investigation and had served a term on a Florida chain gang on a vagrancy charge.

Richard S. Doty, charged with the burglary of the H. C. Fredette store in this city and on parole from burglary sentences imposed in Klamath county, plead guilty and was sentenced to an indeterminate sentence of not less than three years in state prison. His mother presented a plea for him through a letter presented to the court before sentence was passed.

### ECONOMIC BEDLAM SEEN BY KNOX IF DEMOS REMAIN IN

#### Universal Uncertainty for Three Years is Claim of Vice-Presidential Nominee in Michigan Talk

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Col. Frank Knox, Republican vice-presidential nominee, told the state Republican convention today that the American people must choose in November between "economic bedlam" in federal government or "simplicity, economy and certainty."

He asserted that for three years there has been "universal uncertainty" and said the people of Michigan "have special reason for a deep interest in the outcome of this election."

Pointing to the state's agricultural production, its mills and factories—especially the automotive industry which he termed "one of the economic wonders of the world," Knox said: "All Industries Suffer."

"There is not an industry in your state that has not suffered at the hands of the New Deal. Your pigs were slaughtered, your wheat production curtailed; on what was left of your agricultural production they put a processing tax."

"When that had been accomplished they proceeded to negotiate a reciprocity treaty with Canada to cut into what was left of your potato and livestock and dairy industries. And when the supreme court put an end to the agricultural adjustment agency, they were just on the point of regimenting your potato industry."

"Now they have passed a tax law to make it difficult for your industries to renew their equipment to store up reserves against emergency, and to create surpluses to protect workers against slack times and lower employment."

Job Insurance Bill. "On top of this they have installed a so-called social security law under which the payrolls of workers are to bear a heavy tax to pay for remote and problematic and uncertain benefits."

Knox said the kind of federal government the Republican party offers is not a "do-nothing government that lets people starve, that encourages the exploiter and the trickster, the monopolist and the gambler, entrenched greed and economic despotism."

"It is a government that looks before it leaps," he said.
