## EUREKANS POWER IMPRESSES FINCH N SCOUT JAUNT

Medford Line Coach Saw Coast Team Wallop Ferrdale 40-0 — Bowerman Optimistic Over Chances

The Eureka, Cal., football team which last Saturday steam-rolled over the Ferrdale eleven, 40-0, did so while playing under wraps because a Medford scout was in the stands. It was learned today in a communication sent by request from a Eureka sports editor.

Coach Jay Willard of the big green and red coast squad, stated that he had instructed his quarterbacks to omit the flashiest and most dangerous plays and stick to straight football. Breynton Finch, Medford line coach, was in Eureka Saturday on business and drove to Ferrdale for the game.

He brought back an impressive tale of Eureka power and speed, and no impression that the coasters were under wraps in any way. Coach Bill Bowerman of Medford today refused to be disheartened by the report, which he admitted was probably true, and said that he was not yet ready to admit defeat.

"If we don't think we had a good chance of dumping Eureka we would not be playing them," he said today. "We know that Eureka is tough. We know it when we asked them for the game. That's the kind of ball game we want, and if we can't get by the tough opposition, maybe next year we'll get down into a slower league. But this Medford ball club isn't going to be anybody's set-up this year, and we're going to be out there to win."

Minor injuries have cropped up in the Red and Black lineup. Root, scrappy red-headed end, will not be in harness for the game. He pulled a leg muscle in scrimmage and Bowerman is afraid to use him in the coming skirmish. Woodcock, heavier and as fast as Root, but with less experience, will probably start at the wing post.

Todd, starting guard in the Alumni game, has been complaining of a rib injury, and may not see action unless the trouble heals by today. To fill Todd's shoes Bowerman has Grow, 195-pounder who played end last year. Lewis, halfback held out of the Alumni encounter because of a pulled tendon, has not been in scrimmage this week but will probably start, Bowerman said. He limped the first part of the week but has overcome the injury now.

The Medford coach has been drilling on line play and fundamentals, and said today that the Tiger running attack has improved greatly since the Alumni battle. He said he did not know what attack would be needed against the heavy Eureka, but intimated that the running work would be liberally interspersed with passes.

On paper each team has advantages over the other. Eureka will outweigh Medford on the line but will give away poundage in the backfield. The Tigers have no outstanding passers while Eureka has two, and Medford has good pass anglers while Eureka is believed not strong in that department. On punting Medford has a decided edge when Olsen is in the game. His 70-yard boot last week ushered him into the higher brackets of high school punting ability, while the coast team boasts no siege gunners.

## JUNIORS TO PLAY J'VILLE FRIDAY

Coach Russ Acheson's Junior high school football team, victorious last week over the Ashland Juniors at Ashland, will tomorrow afternoon tangle with the Jacksonville high eleven on Van Scoyoc field at 3:30.

The game will be the first for the Jacksonians. They have secured football equipment for the first time in the history of the school, and are expected to present formidable opposition to the Bulldogs. A green team, they will rely on straight football and passes, rather than attempting the intricate shifts and versatile attack that marked the Junior high offense in their opening game.

Acheson will start Scheffel at left end, Howard at left tackle, Newman at left guard and Newton at center. On the right side of the line will be Lewis at right guard, Bell right tackle and Miller right end. Thurman will bark signals, Stead and Clegg will hold down the halfback berths, and Newland will play full.

Only a small admission is charged townspeople, and the game is expected to attract a good crowd for the first home game for the Medford team. The outfit has been declared by observers to be as strong as any junior high team in the history of the school.

## REMATCH DROPKICKERS FOR MAIN TUSSLE AT ARMORY MONDAY NIGHT

Last week's battle of drop-kicks at the Armory which saw Gene Moore down the Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion, Pete Belcastro, with the Lethal Latin's own pet leg wallop, aroused so much animosity on the part of the champion that he has agreed to battle Moore in a return battle and sacrifice his entire purse if he loses. It was announced today. Promoter Mack Lillard has assigned the grudge match to top spot on next Monday's wrestling card.

Joe Hubka, powerful and smooth ex-football player from the University of Nebraska, will return after a brief absence to settle once and for all whether his own python-like scissors are enough to counter Les Wolfe's famous figure-four paralyzer. The two will meet in the middle event. Both men have outstanding records here, with Hubka known as one of the ring's best at taking the starch out of mean grapplers. ## TWO YOUNG PITCHERS SIGNED AT TRYOUTS; CAMP HERE DISBANDED

The Cincinnati Reds try-out camp that has been conducted here since Monday was disbanded today. Mickey Shader, manager of the camp, said that despite the disappointing turnout he had signed two young right-handed pitchers to go with the Durham, North Carolina, club of the Piedmont league with all their expenses paid next spring.

The camp was, according to Shader, one of the most successful ever held despite its minute size. The two youths selected were Lyle Turpin, 18, of Klamath Falls, and Paul Gearman, 21, of Bend. Both are outstanding twirlers, according to Shader, who declared today that both of them looked like "cliches for the majors."

The camp will move from here to Spokane for a week before heading into the late circuit in California. Shader said the camp here was the best little camp he had ever seen, and that it would be held here again next fall. He said that the townspeople and school officials had treated the pitchers and the aspiring ball players very well. He particularly thanked Superintendent of Schools E. H. Hadrick who donated the senior high grounds and put the infield in condition each day.

## Striking Students Return To Classes

## SONS BIG SQUADRON FACES INITIAL TEST SATURDAY, ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Oct. 1.—(Sp.)—Six lettermen, two former Ashland high stars and a tackle weighing 271 pounds will be included in the starting lineup that Coach Jean Eberhart of Southern Oregon Normal's SONS will throw on the field at 2 p. m. here Saturday against Pacific college in Ashland's first college ball game of the season.

The huge tackle, who formerly played for University High of Eugene, is Harry Johnson; and, according to Eberhart, has all the earmarks of developing into one of the best linemen ever seen here.

With Johnson topping the line that is the heaviest in years—averaging 193 pounds per man—the SONS will present a team that after three full weeks of tough practice, seems ready to erase the memory of last year's disastrous season with a vengeance. At the ends will be Letterman Percy Williamson, 187, and Jim McBride, 193, from Portland. Working the other tackle will be big Bob Napier, 194, from Klamath Union high; and at the guards will be two veterans, Fred Carlson, 161, and Everett Sandberg, 173. Former Ashland high star, Hedrick Baughman, 176, will bend over the ball at center.

In the ball carrying left halfback position will be tiny Arba Ager, 150, who runs, passes and kicks; Clyde ("Tubby") Dickinson, 183, at fullback; Ken Schilling, another former Ashland high player, 164, at right half, and Harlie Cornett, 168-pound transfer from Willamette, at the blocking quarterback position. Ager and Dickinson are the two backfield lettermen.

Although it is the first game of the season for Pacific as well as for the SONS, reports from the north are to the effect that the team coached by Hal Chapman is one of the strongest ever developed at the Quaker school in Newberg. Pacific college is a member of no conference, but every year plays most of the northwest conference members, always giving a good account of itself.

## ASHLAND TACKLES G. P. FRIDAY NIGHT

ASHLAND, Oct. 1.—(Sp.)—Skeet O'Connell's Ashland high Grizzlies, underated and unscored upon in two games, face their first major test of the season at Grants Pass Friday night when they battle the reputedly powerful Cavemen in the Southern Oregon conference opener. The game will begin at 8 p. m. and will be the second time this season the Grizzlies have performed under lights.

With all injuries received in the tough Yreka game entirely healed, the Grizzlies expect to open the battle with the same lineup that has defeated Crescent City, 19-0, and Yreka, 6-0. Don Gettling and James McCallister will be at the ends; Bill Wimer and Jim Brady at the tackles; Bud Etzweiler and Cliff Bromley at the guards, and Roland Schreidreiter at center. In the backfield, Leonard Warren and Walt Lee will start at the halfback positions; Charlie Warren at quarter, and Steve Fowler at full.

## BEAVERS DROP OAKS TO CAPTURE PENNANT AND PLAY-OFF COIN

OAKLAND, Calif., Oct. 1.—(AP)—A seasoned, hard-hitting team, with a steady corps of flingers, held the 1936 Pacific Coast league championship today.

Which is to say that Portland's Beavers wrapped up the hunting last night by knocking off Oakland, 8-3, in the deciding game of the Shaughnessy plan finals. Portland last won the championship in 1932.

Portland left no doubt in the minds of fans as to which was the best team in the league. The Beavers finished on top in the regulation race, polished off Seattle in the playoff semi-finals with four straight wins, then took four out of five from Oakland.

Portland grabbed off \$5500 of the \$10,000 playoff fund, which means a "cut" of about \$220 to each player. The Beavers won \$2500 for finishing ahead at the end of the schedule, and took 60 per cent of the \$5000 going to the playoff finalists. Oakland will divide \$2000 among its players, while Seattle and San Diego, the semi-final losers, split \$2500.

## LEVIN'S MAT TITLE RUINED BY LOPEZ

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Dave Levin's last vestige of the heavyweight wrestling championship was reported gone in California today as Vincent Lopez, his conqueror last night, filed claim to title recognition.

Forty-eight hours after he was trounced in Philadelphia by Dean Detton of Salt Lake City, Levin, ex-Brooklyn butcher boy, met a similar fate at the hands of Lopez, Idaho Mexican.

A capacity house of 10,400 fans saw both grapplers tumble out of the Olympic rings and Lopez scramble back to win the first fall. Levin retaliated with a hammerlock to reverse the second part on the back by the referee. The deciding fall resulted when Lopez whirled Levin with an airplane spin.

## AIR LINE TO KEEP SCHEDULE INTACT

Retention during the fall season of its full set of schedules between Medford, British Columbia, California and the east was announced today by United Air Lines through L. G. Devaney, field manager here. Devaney reported that the heaviest autumn traffic in history has decided the company to continue flying three daily roundtrips the length of the Pacific coast in addition to numerous inter-city schedules. On its coast-to-coast route the company is operating twenty-five per cent more passenger seats than in any previous fall season.

According to advice received by Devaney, United carried approximately 5,000 more passengers in September than in the same month of 1935. Under the new schedule he said almost 1,600,000 miles per month will be flown on the company's Pacific coast and coast-to-coast routes.
