

Tigers Meet Eureka Squad Saturday To Initiate New Turf Gridiron

SEASON'S OPENER HARD ASSIGNMENT FOR LOCAL TEAM

Game Called for 2 P. M.—Injuries Cut Potential Strength of Bowermanites—Craters Plan Stunt

With the kick-off set for 2 o'clock sharp, the Medford Tigers tomorrow officially open the 1936 football season against a strong Eureka eleven on the new turf field on South Oakdale, the first game ever to be played on grass in southern Oregon.

Already injuries have cut into the potential strength of the local line-up. Root, two-headed end, Ettinger, blocking back, Earhart husky tackle, and Todd, underslung guard who started last week's Alumni game, will view the carnage from the sidelines.

Root has a pulled muscle and the starting gun will find Woodcock at the right wing post, Richardson, who has been improving rapidly, has beat Wilson out for the starting assignment at the other end of the line, giving the Tigers two new but aspiring drive-in men.

Many injuries Ettinger is suffering from an infected foot and was not in school yesterday. Earhart is favoring a broken toe, snapped in scrimmage this week. Todd is still complaining of a side injury.

To offset the gloomy angle Ray Lewis, universal-jointed halfback out of the Alumni struggle because of a pulled muscle, has responded to treatment and last night raced through his plays without a spawd of a limp. He will start the game, supplying the scoring punch lacking in the earlier struggle.

In recent workouts on the velvety turf field (which critics have declared without equal on the west coast) the kickers have been bombing out long twisting punts that have fired hopes of great defensive strength. Not only Olsen, who is still receiving plaudits for a 70-yard boot in the last game, but Maruyama and Bayles have been booming out spirals from 45 to 60 yards, the most promising sign that Coach Bowerman has seen to date. "It will take a really great team to overcome a 40-yard kicking average," Bowerman said last night in expressing the hope that his punter would retain the knack they seem to have acquired.

Interest high Interest in the game is higher than any in the history of Medford openers. Townspeople, civic organizations, the Crater club, and nearly every school pupil in the city are showing marked eagerness for the fray.

A pep rally was held at the Senior high school at 1 o'clock this afternoon followed by a serpentine parade downtown, with the high school band and the drum and bugle corps, furnishing the noise. The Junior high school drum and bugle corps cooperated in the parade, and also advised the Junior game held this afternoon against the Jacksonville high school.

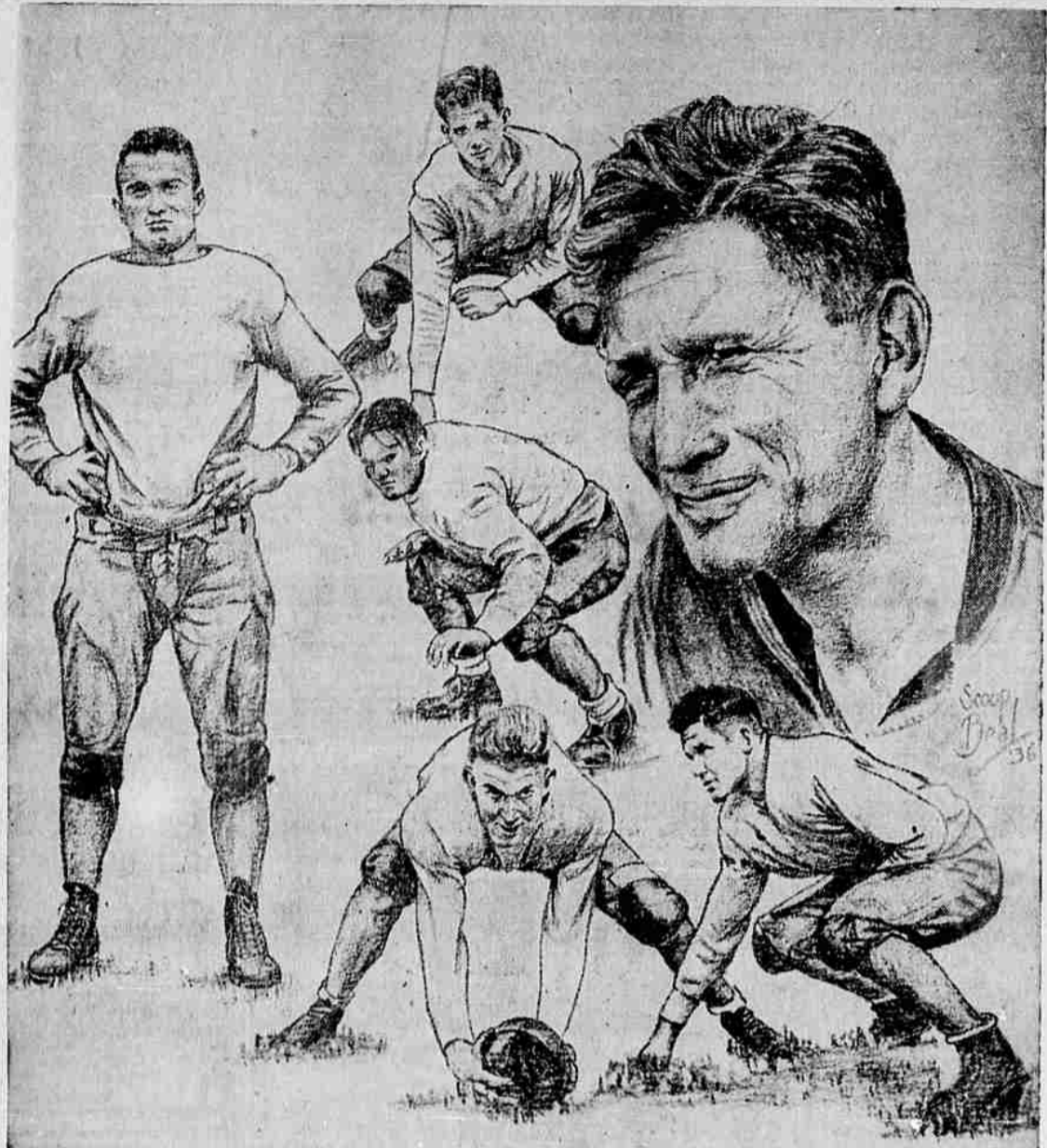
The big grandstand at the new field, while not yet entirely completed, has been rushed into shape to accommodate at least 1275 of the estimated 2,500 spectators. The arena was yesterday clipped to an even surface, the clipping showing that the dirt of a week's hard practice have not damaged the surface in the least. Bleachers seating about 600 have been set up on the east side of the field, and will be reserved for Junior high and grade school students.

Parking Room Provided

The street to the east of the field has been graded, and spectators who arrive in cars will be given that territory for parking. Parking will also be permitted along the roads surrounding the athletic plant, but no autos will be allowed into the graded inclosure near the practice field and the baseball diamond for fear of rutting the surface.

With forests of western Oregon and Klamath county closed to entry by proclamation of the governor, hunting is definitely out for the coming week-end. This also applies to fishing, camping and other recreational uses of the forest.

To those, perhaps, who have looked forward to a hunting trip, this is disappointing, but there are other things to be considered. Those who live in Jackson and Klamath counties are probably not as keenly aware of the potential destructiveness of a forest fire as are the people of Coos and Curry counties. However, the newspaper and the radio have given us the picture of what has happened and is happening, and as a result, it is not difficult to visualize what can happen in this locality.

Weather conditions in this territory were almost identical with those on the coast, and while at times conditions have improved materially, there has been considerably less improvement in this territory. Accumulated drippings of the forest cover still remains, and is, of course, more serious than during the summer months. Smoke drifting in from the fires is seriously interfering with the detection of fires by the lookouts. The humidity has remained as low as and even lower than summer levels. Consequently, the extreme hazardous condition still exists.
