

LOGGING OPERATIONS AGAIN PERMITTED IN SO. OREGON FORESTS

A proclamation from the state forester's office to District Fire Warden Dwight Phipps lifting the closure law in southern Oregon forests on those industrial operations in Jackson and Josephine counties which could meet the specified requirements, was received late Wednesday.

The proclamation reads: "The closure law is lifted by state forester's office on those industrial operations in Jackson and Josephine counties which have satisfactory telephone communications with the district fire warden's office and have no excessive fire hazards or burning fires at the present time."

"The closure may be put back in effect at any time, due to low humidity or serious fires in the district, and where the operator is not complying with instructions from the state forester's office. This does not lift the ban on entry into the timber by the public, but allows responsible operators to open their operations subject to restrictions."

The above notice applies to all logging operations in the two counties. Warden Phipps announced, it does not apply to hunters, who are and will be barred from timbered and brush areas, probably until the first general rain.

All fires in southern Oregon were under control today, and only three were still smoldering, on Sardine, Birdseye and Carls creeks. Mop-up crews were watching the three carefully, with all danger areas now safely trailed, it was stated.

CARIS CREEK FIRE PUT IN CONTROL

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 2.—(AP)—A 3,000-acre brush and timber fire in Jackson county just east of here was believed under control last night, Kenneth W. Schwartz and Warden Roy J. Kay reported.

Because of emergency conditions on the coast, only 40 men were available when 200 were needed, they said. The fire started Saturday at Carls creek, flared up Single creek, swept across Carls creek to the heads of Foota and Birdseye creeks and down the watersheds of the two creeks about a half mile with an outline of three miles across the front of the fire.

The scant crew was handicapped also by precipitous ridges, taking two or three hours to climb in some instances.

Liner Delayed By Striking Seamen

STATE MAY HAUL OWN RUM ORDERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Requesting an answer from truckers by this afternoon, the Oregon liquor control commission today considered the possibility of entering the hauling business if an adjustment in rates cannot be obtained.

Yesterday, Arthur K. McMahon, chairman, told truckers the commission would save \$20,000 a year by purchasing and operating its own trucks.

Despite the fact that the commission believed existing rates too high, operators said they had not made a profit in recent years. They feared a shift in freight classifications to meet the commission's demands would lead to a general breakdown.

Oregon paid \$86,000 for freighting liquor outside of Portland for the year ending July 1, the commission announced. Figures were offered to show that the state could establish its own carrier system with an investment of \$30,000.

Rioters Injured At Hosiery Mill

READING, Pa., Oct. 2.—(AP) Twenty-one persons were injured, several seriously, in disorders at the huge Berkshire knitting mills today as several hundred union hosiery workers went on strike.

Hosiery union officials called the strike in what they said was an attempt to restore NRA code working standards, obtain higher wages and improve working conditions.
