

SIXTEEN STUDENTS RECEIVE BENEFITS NYA IN MEDFORD

Money From Part Time Employment Mostly Goes for Books, Clothes, School Lunches, Transportation

Work ranging from clean-up to sign lettering was given to 16 students, 9 boys and 7 girls, at the senior high school during the month of September in connection with the national youth administration to aid those who otherwise would not be able to enter or remain in school properly. The NYA allotments to the local school are made for three months' periods, the sum to be proportioned during that period as school officials see fit. At the Medford high school, the sum is to be divided evenly between September, October and November, according to C. G. Smith, principal.

Students present applications for the part-time employment for the whole year and school officials make selections from the group according to need, character and scholastic work. Students to be eligible must be 16 years of age or older.

All Applicants Aided. So far, Smith stated, practically all students applying for the aid have been given it, as the number is not proportionately large. At present, those receiving aid are approximately the same in number as last year at this time, but are expected to be less later on, according to Smith. For the most part, the same ones continue working throughout the year, unless the student's financial condition is improved or unless it is shown that someone else needs it more. The arrangement is purposely flexible.

The maximum that any student may receive for the month is \$5, or \$54 during the entire year. Hourly wage scales at the local high school range from 25 to 35 cents an hour, according to type of work being done. Most of those working are receiving the maximum pay at present. The money received goes toward books, clothes, food (school lunches), transportation and other school necessities, which must be stated definitely on the application.

Help School Staff. Many of the students working under this arrangement are assigned to various staff members of the school for aid in clerical or similar duties. Two are at present employed in the school office. Three or four are given outdoor work on the grounds, keeping lawns and shrubbery in shape, taking care of outdoor recreation fields and other such activities. The home economics department absorbs a few girls who keep the rooms cleaned and straightened or serve in the cafeteria during lunch hours.

Those with particular talents are given the opportunity to use them whenever possible, and are paid accordingly somewhat higher wages than those engaged in purely manual duties. One student at present is constantly employed at lettering the numerous signs necessary about the school or for outside purposes. Another, who showed a definite carpentry ability, is kept busy repairing chairs and other school furniture.

Arrangement Convenient. This year's arrangement whereby the applications are made and decided upon by the principal and teachers was declared by Smith to be much more convenient and workable than having the administration handled through the local relief office, as it was done last year. School officials are able to keep a constant check on applicants and because of constant association to know better the actual needs of each student.

The student receiving this aid does not necessarily have to be a child from a family on relief. Outside of the age, character and scholastic requirements, the student need only show that without the extra employment he will not be able to enter or remain in school properly and to certify that he will perform faithfully and to the best of his ability whatever job may be assigned him. The national youth administration was established in 1935 to provide opportunity for young people to continue their training and education. Last year in Oregon approximately 1800 high school pupils and 1500 college students were enabled to continue their education through work provided by the various educational institutions and funds provided by the N.Y.A.

December 27, 1934, which was kept secret until a public ceremony a little later in San Diego, Cal. The couples separated October 12, 1935.

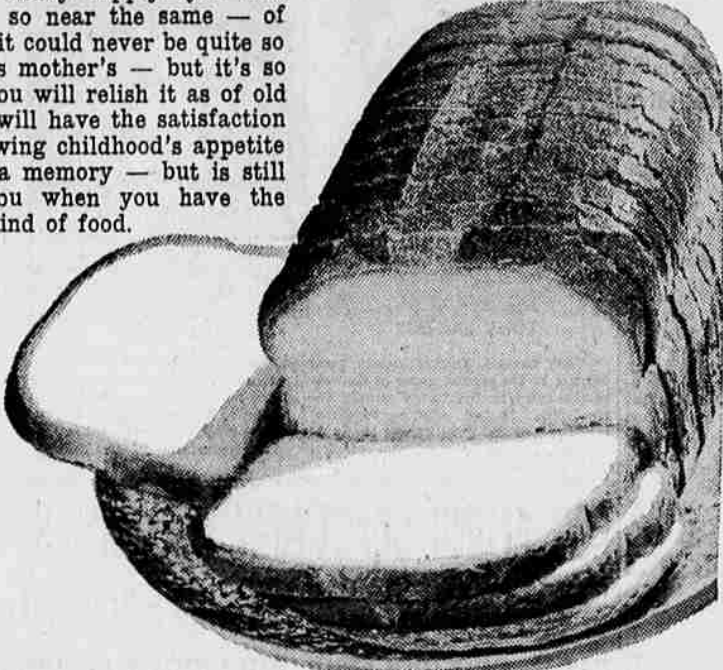
