

### IMPETUOUS ONES LEARN LETTERS HARD TO RECALL

Post Office Department Has Special System for People Who Mail Letters and Then Want 'Em Back

By EDDIE GILMORE (Associated Press Staff Writer.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The postoffice department revealed today it has a system for handling impetuous people who mail letters and then regret it.

"Remorseful wives," said Frank Ellis, assistant superintendent of post office service, "are always wanting their letters back, but they don't get them without going through a set procedure."

Under no circumstances is the carrier allowed to return the letter—even if a fair lady weeps, pleads and falls in a faint at the mail-box.

"She can't even see it," explained Ellis, "unless she comes down to the postoffice."

Even then she has to look up the postmaster, request an application blank and think up a pretty good reason for the change of heart.

Dilly-dallying is fatal, for after the letter is mailed each minute sees the postoffice machinery speed it toward its destination.

"We won't even admit we've got the letter," said Ellis, "until 12 questions have been answered satisfactorily."

The questions mostly concern identification of the letter. The applicant has to say where it was mailed, the date and hour, the amount of postage, whose name is on the outside and even a description of the envelope.

Must Give Reason. "You just can't say 'It's a purple envelope,'" explained the official. "You've got to say 'purple envelope, square and heavy paper.'"

The real sticker among the 12 questions, however, is "reason for holding." This means that if a wife was angry when she mailed the letter and then cooled off, she'd better say so.

Wives are not the only remorseful letter-senders. Sometimes it's the husband. Experience has shown, though, that rather than go through the routine, men say, "Oh well, I'll explain to her later."

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Mayor Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls, Democratic candidate for the United States senate, expressed regret here yesterday when informed the Landon-Knox sound truck had been halted in the southern Oregon city for violation of an anti-noise ordinance.

Mahoney, campaigning in Lane county, said if the damage could be undone he would call a special meeting of the council and suspend the law. He was told the truck had left the state for a tour of California.

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Operators of the Landon-Knox sound truck, bringing the Republican campaign message into southern Oregon, landed in the courts here yesterday. Violation of the city's anti-noise law was charged.

M'NARY SEES HOPE FOR U. S. LUMBERING

EUGENE, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Re-admission of American lumber into British markets, relief from the pressure of the need to liquidate private timber holdings and sustained yield operations in American logging camps in the near future were predicted by Senator Charles L. McNary in an address before Lane county lumbermen here this noon.

Senator McNary declared that in his opinion the agreement between the United States, Canada and Great Britain, whereby Canada was allowed to ship up to 250,000,000 feet of lumber into the United States at half the former tariff, was a "grave mistake."

### BUILDING ACTIVITY PACING RECOVERY ON PACIFIC COAST

Twenty Large Cities Report Permits Totalling \$15,787,000 in September—Other Lines Also Prosper

By Walter Warren SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Surveys of some 30 lines of economic activity in the far west show further gains for general business. The surveys, made by the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, brought out these chief trends: Industrial production increased more than seasonally during August. Building activity increased further. Twenty large cities in the seven western states had permits totalling \$15,787,000—the largest total for any month in recent years. It was up 78 percent from last year. Residential building continued to expand. Engineering contracts, as tabulated by the reserve bank, declined. These figures fluctuate considerably on a monthly basis. Most trade measures showed declines from July, but gains over last year.

Industrial employment increased, but less than seasonally for the district. Oregon employment, however, gained more than seasonally, though the state's payrolls did not keep pace.

The important coast fruit canning industry, at its peak in August, expanded about in line with expectations.

Other industries, such as steel, glass containers, furniture, sugar refining, oil, tires, boxes and power production showed output gaining or better maintained than in most recent years.

Lines which failed to keep up with seasonal trends were department store sales, freight carloadings and new automobile sales.

Agricultural conditions continued favorable, both in production and marketing. Commercial bank loans expanded seasonally.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—A man sober enough to make out worthless checks and forge endorsements is sober enough to be responsible for his act. Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly ruled here this morning in sentencing D. W. Yeastell of Steamboat CCC camp to a term of one year in the state penitentiary.

Yeastell asked the court for leniency, stating that he was intoxicated at the time the checks, three in number and in denominations of \$10 each, according to District Attorney Hallmark, were passed at Roseburg beer taverns.
