FILM PLAYERS ASK AUTOGRAPH



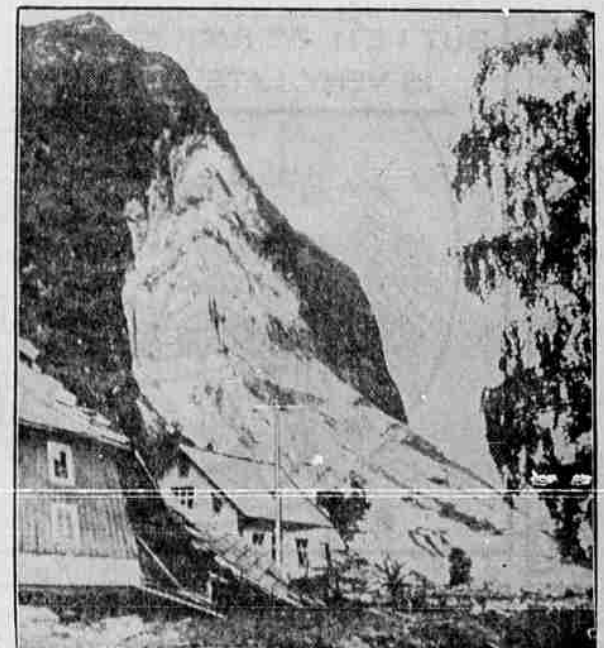

GUN TOWERS GUARD SHANGHAI



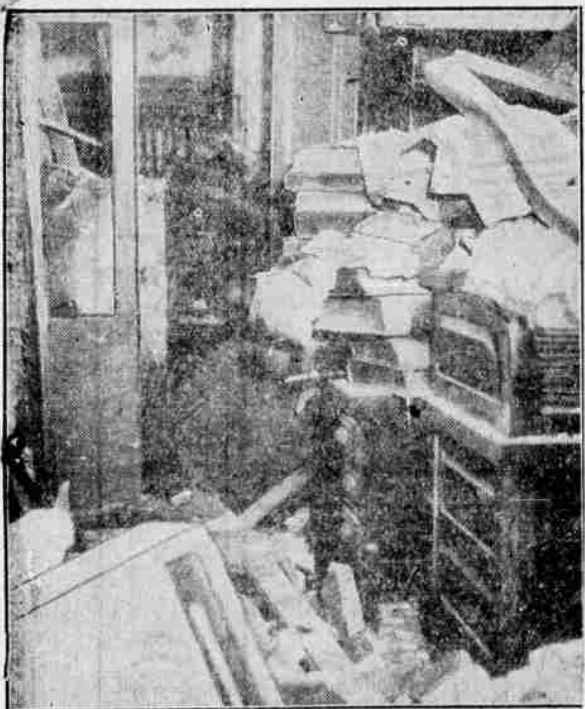

RICHMAN, MERRILL BACK HOME



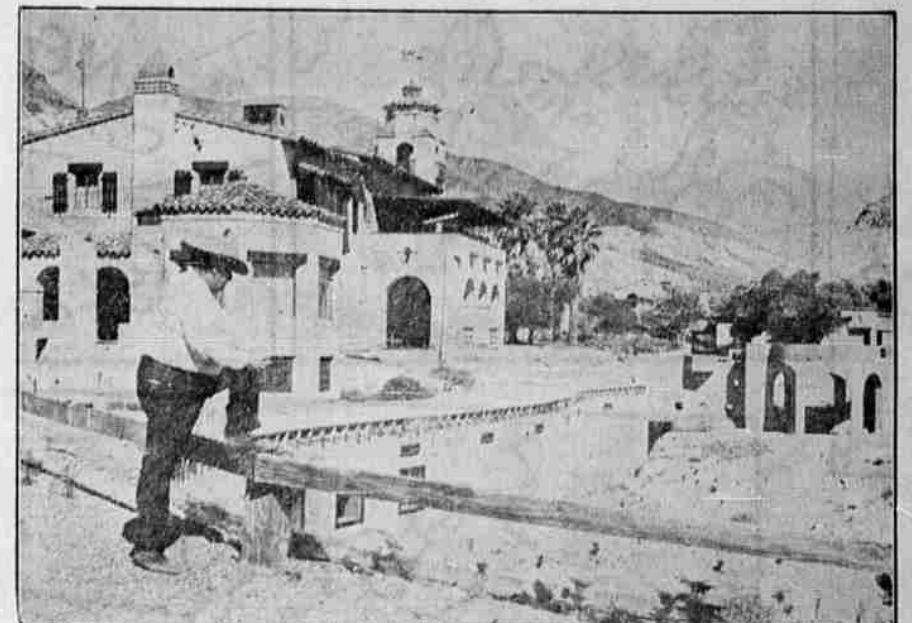

ARMCHAIRS PROVIDE 'EASE' ON FIRING LINE

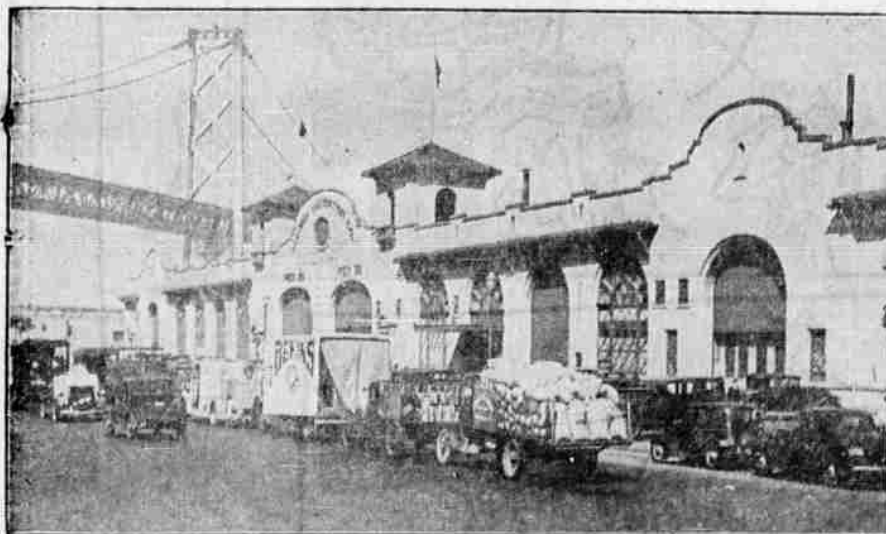
