

OFFICERS AND MEN OF MEDFORD AREA OF CCC PRAISED

Major General Frank P. Simonds, commanding general of the ninth corps area, visited the Medford CCC district this week and complimented Major George R. Owens, district commander, on the smoothness and efficiency of the district organization during the recent emergency fire activities.

General Simonds was especially pleased with the work of the district supply organization which furnished tons of food and supplies to the thousands of men on fire suppression work as well as other tons of clothing and equipment rushed to the Bandon relief area.

General Simonds had been on a trip to Fort Lewis but came south to inspect the Bandon area. From there he continued to Medford to inspect the headquarters here. He arrived to find the CCC organization functioning smoothly and taking the Bandon emergency requests in its stride.

Twelve hundred sets of cots, blankets, kitchen and mess equipment, besides a similar number of mattresses, quantities of clothing and tent stoves were among the supplies sent to the Bandon area by Lieut. Fred W. Greene, property officer, and his staff.

Capt. H. J. Meiring, district quartermaster, Lieut. Ernest J. Brugger, district subsistence officer, and their organizations were complimented on

the smoothness with which the job of feeding and supplying the needs of the scattered fire camps were carried on.

Meantime, two major fire organizations were set up in western Oregon with Capt. W. C. Ryan headquarters at Gold Beach and handling the camps on the coast, while Capt. R. T. Gilbert, with headquarters in Coquille, commanded the camps in the northern area.

Capt. C. L. Pierce has been on duty at Coquille coordinating the activities of the two fire "armies," and Capt. Franklin H. Canlett spent the early part of the week at Coquille and represented the CCC in the Bandon relief activities.

Officers and sergeants from all parts of the district were sent to administer the camps and see that the men were properly fed and cared for during the strenuous days on the fire lines. The district strength has been greatly increased by the addition of hundreds of men from the Vancouver Barracks and Fort Lewis districts. They will be returned as soon as the danger of a renewed outbreak is past.

CCC enrollees who fought fires for long hours and under all sorts of conditions were commended by General Simonds on their courage, willingness and stamina. Those who are returning home to the middle west at the end of the enrollment period may be proud of their record here, he said.

Forest service officials were in charge of the actual fire fighting activities, with the army officers responsible for the feeding, care and administration of the emergency camps. The forest service has received widespread public approval for its work in the recent major fires in western Oregon. Although all danger is not yet past, the fires are believed under control.

Best and others of Bandon for 1 second foot water from Mitchell creek for mining in Douglas county; George W. Hennings of Alsea for 1 second foot water from the south fork of the Alsea river for irrigation in Benton county.

DR. PHIPPS HAS PUREBRED HERD

The only herd of Brown Swiss cattle in southern Oregon is being developed by Dr. I. D. Phipps on his orchard five miles out on the Crater Lake highway. Dr. Phipps purchased the parent stock from Hull Brothers of Painesville, Ohio, five years ago. The Hulls imported their first stock from Switzerland.

Brown Swiss are particularly adapted to dairying as they are great milkers, according to Dr. Phipps, who states the sire of his herd's grandmother was a world champion. The mother of another of his cows is grand champion of Oregon and its sister won first prize in the Portland Pacific International Stock Show.

Dr. Phipps ships young stock from his purebred herd up and down the coast.

CAPITOL BIDS TO BE OPENED NOV. 20

PORTLAND, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Bids on the construction of Oregon's new capitol will be opened about November 20, the capitol reconstruction commission announced at its meeting here yesterday.

The exact date will rest upon the arrival of revised plans from New York.

The commission decided that there would be no immediate construction of the western steps extending into Wilson park, a section not allocated by the legislature at the special session.

Commissioners Dalton, Lake and Olinger will head an interim committee to hear persons wishing to discuss suggestions for the statehouse.

BUSINESS URGES BUDGET BALANCE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(UP)—The nation's businessmen will insist upon a balanced federal budget during the next fiscal year, regardless of who is elected president, it was announced tonight as the board of directors of the chamber of commerce completed its last pre-election meeting.

Spokesmen for chamber of commerce members, owning billions of dollars in capital investments, made it clear that they will demand economy from the next administration. A program outlined by chamber committees calls for a cut of at least \$500,000,000 in federal spending during the next fiscal year, and counts upon an increase of a like amount in government revenues.

Plan Budget Cut—LA GRANDE, Oct. 3.—(AP)—La Grande tentatively plans to reduce its budget figures for the next fiscal year. The budget committee's early figures indicate that there will be \$2637 less to be raised by taxes this year than last.
